Clean Energy

On Monday 1st October the Mothers' Union hosted a talk by Susan Jeanes on Clean Energy. She began by outlining the

different forms of energy available and their different uses and challenges, pointing out the changing nature of electricity use today as more homes come to rely on air conditioning at peak times.

As Chief Executive of the Australian Geothermal Energy Association, she went on to talk about "hot rocks" and the process by which geothermal energy is acquired. A major difficulty, she said, is attracting funding for this stage of its development.


Pastoral District Council decided at its October meeting that money raised for the Anglican Board of Mission this year should go to 2 of ABM's projects, Myanmar-Burma, and Newton Theological College.

The **Church in Myanmar** has many challenges. Support for community development projects in Myanmar helps provide farmers with rice winnowing (threshing) machines, small capital to start duck-raising, and small fish ponds to raise extra income. Other projects provide engine-repair training for villagers whose main economic activity is river-based, and simple water and sanitation systems to ease the burden of others who have to fetch water from miles away. A Bibles for Myanmar project allows the

people of Myanmar a greater chance to read and study the Bible as well as providing education opportunities to church leaders.

Newton College is the theological college for the Anglican church in PNG. Located near Popondetta, in the Oro Province to which we are linked as a diocese, the college trains priests for the whole country. It is seeking support for a curriculum review—something that has not been done for 10 years—to professionalise its teaching and learning program, improve the quality and content of theological education in the PNG context, and provide a sound teaching and learning framework. Advent Pageant 2012

I was inviting one of the shopkeepers at the Aldinga shopping centre to be involved in the Advent Pageant which tells the story of the birth of Christ. "Mary and Joseph will come in looking for an inn for Mary to have her baby... ..you know the story," I prompted.

"No," she said blankly.

It's true that today in Australia many people do not know the events which have led us to celebrate Christmas for the last 2000 odd years— "the reason for the season", as the saying goes.

Thanks to the initiative of FUSION-Australia and their Awakening programme, the tradition of Advent Pageants was established at locations all around Australia and some overseas, and taken up in the Aldinga area.

On Friday 30th November children from the three Aldinga schools, accompanied by volunteers from all the local churches, will parade to the Aldinga Central shopping centre where they will perform a nativity play and sing Christmas carols, before celebrating the birth of Jesus with a cake and "Happy birthday Jesus". At the exact same time, children from many schools around Australia will be doing the same thing. The crowd of shoppers and parents will be encouraged to join in the singing of the carols, and will be given printed booklets with the carols and the nativity story, together with times of Christmas services and contact details for the churches.

Fr Paul writes...

Many a thinker has argued that we humans are all alone in a hostile and unfeeling universe. They make it even darker by saying that we are just accidents in the universe's development and there is no sense to our lives. This theory has been promoted recently by Richard Dawkins who was in a debate on the ABC program Q & A with the Catholic Archbishop of Sydney, Cardinal George Pell, on whether there is a God or not. Even without the help of pessimists we may feel that way at times, especially when events in our lives render us lost, forgotten, crushed. A serious illness in the family, in ourselves, with a friend, or some tragic accident or failure - any of these can make us believe that no one or nothing cares for us.

Paul's letter to the Ephesians in Chapter 2 verses 12 to 19 gives us encouragement on our journey in life. Paul says the coming to earth of Jesus, his life, death and resurrection are all for the purpose of telling us who we are when previously "having no hope and without God in the world". Paul informs us that the death of God's Son shows us that God is closest to us in sorrow and death and that He is always near and always cares. As St Paul says, we "who were once far off have been brought near by the Blood of Christ". Paul also describes the existence of many people who are "without hope and without God in the world". But for those who follow Jesus Christ, we "are no longer strangers and aliens". We achieve this by being receptive to God's grace, and in contact with God through the Holy Spirit in a daily life of prayer and in regular worship.

Paul says that our bodies are built together spiritually into a holy temple, into a dwelling place for God. Perhaps the greatest gift will come through our realisation that our family extends to many brothers and sisters in Christ. We are fellow citizens with the saints but also members of the household of God, built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone.

God works with us in three persons; that is God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit. A symbol of this is being seen in the addition of new candles at St Margaret's. These candles, which are a gift, complement the existing two candles on the altar. The two candles highlight the two natures of Jesus, human and divine, but the three candles on either side of the altar represent the three-fold nature of God; Father, Son and Holy Spirit. I hope the candles encourage us to be more mindful of God working in us through the Trinity; that is God in three persons.

The season of Advent is not far away. While we start to think about our preparations for Christmas, also take the time to spiritually prepare for the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ at each of our churches. As part of that preparation, Bishop Stanley Goldsworthy will preach on the four Sundays during Advent at St Philip and St James, Old Noarlunga, starting on December the 2nd. I will preach at the other churches, with the help of Fr. John Devenport and Fr Martin Chittleborough at St. Ann's.

I would like to appeal to anyone who may consider being the Parish Secretary. Susan Smith has resigned from the position given her other work commitments. I thank her for role in the position since earlier this year. I encourage anyone interested in this important ministry position to contact me to discuss the role. Ted Sandercock has agreed to be the Acting Parish Secretary until the end of the year.



May the souls of the faithful departed rest in peace...

Bob Bishop, 30th May 1929—13th Oct 2012



Bob Bishop was born at Melrose and moved to Willunga, where his father had bought a farm, at the age of 16. He was warmly welcomed by the Willunga community and church, and joined the local choir, which he loved. It was a mixed farm, and Bob started to milk a few cows, his wife Jac said, so he could get married. They were married in St Stephen's Church on 20th Oct 1956 and had 2 children, Peter & Sally.

Music, farming, family, fishing, and gardening were all things Bob enjoyed. He cleared the land but was judicious in the areas he left timbered, firmly believing that the land was ours only on loan. He was known for his rejuvenation of soil.

Bob was committed to his church, which he served as Priest's Warden for 26 years, as a Sunday School teacher, and as Diocesan Synod Representative for the parish.

The funeral was held in the Bishops' garden, on the 56th anniversary of their wedding, and it is likely that the Bible used in the funeral was the very one used at their wedding. Music was provided by the Sisters of Abundance. During the service about 40 heifers came to the fence in what looked like a farewell tribute.

Annie "Nan" Carne, 5th Apr 1922—18th Oct 2012



John & Nan Carne had enjoyed almost a whole lifetime together, beginning with John "dinkying" her home from St Columba's Kindergarten on his tricycle in 1927. While John was on active service during WWII Nan carried out voluntary work as one of the WANS, and they were married at St Columba's Hawthorn after the war. They had two children, Jen & Steve.

On moving to the south twenty-odd years ago they first attended church on Commercial Road and later attended St Philip & St James' at Old Noarlunga. As well as their regular attendance at services Nan and John have given active support by church cleaning, fund-raising luncheons, garage sales, Almond Blossom stalls and generous financial assistance.

With the onset of health problems in latter years Nan was unable to attend church, but she appreciated the loving care given by John and her immediate family as well as the Pastoral care provided by clergy and fellow parishioners. She will be remembered as a truly loving person and a good friend, and we are all the better for having known her.

News from Pastoral District Council

As the new Administrator of Southern Vales Fr Dirk van Dissel chaired the meeting of the PDC on 9th October, setting aside half an hour at the beginning of the meeting to discuss the Outreach Committee's report. PDC focused on the Family service, and agreed half an hour to be set aside at the November meeting to look at other outreach subjects. Matters discussed included the selection of music suitable for children, the need for amplification and the best ways to achieve it, and the level of the children's talk/sermon. Other matters discussed at the meeting included the following:

Resignation of Parish Secretary: Susan Smith regretted that with her work commitments she was unable to continue as Parish Secretary. PDC passed a motion of appreciation for the work she had done in recent months and Ted Sandercock took the minutes of the meeting. (N. B. Susan has since taken on the valuable task of updating service times in local papers.)

Confirmation: Fr Paul reported that it had been a joyful occasion. The class of confirmees had been enthusiastic, and two or three of them were coming regularly to Bible Studies on Wednesdays. The luncheon had been Fr Dirk's first attendance at a parish function, and he had been welcomed.

Calendars: With most of the original print run of calendars sold, another print run of 45 had been ordered. Calendar sales to be encouraged in order to make a profit.

St Margaret's Driveway: Greg Roberts was accepting Earthworx's quote of \$1800 as they seemed best in touch with the needs of the location. Fr Paul reported that from time to time a semi-trailer would come up the driveway and park while the driver went across the road to buy a pie!

The Rectory inspection for 2012 had been completed by Greg Roberts and Bill Cale with Fr Paul and note was made of some minor repairs and improvements needed.

A **Working bee** to be held at St Margaret's on 13th October.

St Stephen's Cemetery: Complaints had been made about the state of the cemetery. The Curator is awaiting a quote for getting the area cleared a.s.a.p.

Car Boot Sale at St Margaret's: The Diocesan Secretary had advised that the Insurer would assess how much it would cost to insure such an event. However it had been decided that there would be no car boot sale in conjunction with the St Margaret's Jumble Sale.

The **New Sign at St Ann's** was going ahead, at cost price, as a joint project of the church and the Council. Additional sections will be needed to advise passers-by of occasional changes to service times and places for combined services.

A request for an **overview of PDC operations** was not accepted on the grounds that the matter should await the appointment of a new Bishop for the Diocese.

PDC attendance: To another request, that when Wardens are unable to attend meetings their place could be taken by a "reserve", Fr Dirk replied that under the Constitution this was not possible.

Theft of memorial bench at St Philip & St James: The matter had been reported to the police, and the donor had been informed. The original cost had been ascertained, and quotes for its replacement will be obtained.

ABM projects: Fr Paul suggested that money to be sent to the Anglican Board of Mission be given in support of chosen projects: Burma and Newton College (see p. 2)

Advent Pageant: A donation of \$100 to be given to help cover costs of the Advent Pageant this year.

A **Publicity Officer** was needed for the PD, to keep abreast with promotional opportunities in the local papers etc.
