Wednesday 27th February

Fr David Hand, Police Chaplain.

In response to popular request Fr David returns to speak of his work as a Chaplain to officers and support staff of SA Police.

Ordained priest in 1968, his ministry included parishes



in all three dioceses of our Province, and he is known to many through his work for Bush Church Aid. He began as a Police Chaplain with the Communications Branch in 1999, began visiting the Call Centre about 2 years later and took on the Transit branch a year after that. He has recently been asked by a staff member to visit the State Crime Prevention Section.

Wednesday 6th March The Rev. Peter Palmer: Fly-In-Fly-Out: a chaplaincy to miners.

The Rev. Peter Palmer has been working with mines since 2008 when he and his wife Joy moved to Coober Pedy. He is now a full time Priest flying in and flying out of mine sites in South Australia (FIFO Chaplain). He has had a very interesting life both as a minister and in secular life. He has been self-employed, worked in children's prison in QLD, been an orderly in hospitals, and police chaplain, among



other things. He will be with us to talk about his work in the mining industry and where he prays it will lead in the future.

Wednesday 13th March Lenore de la Perelle: Living with dementia.

Dementia is not a normal part of ageing, but as our population ages and we live longer, more of us are at risk of developing dementia. Understanding normal ageing and the impact of diseases that cause dementia will help us all to keep our brains active to reduce the risk of dementia, and to support and connect with family, friends and members of our communities who live with dementia.

Lenore de la Perelle is a passionate advocate of inclusive services for older people and people living with dementia . She has worked in counselling, policy and management positions in Government, Private Not for Profit and Community Services for over 30 years. and is currently the Manager of the Dementia Learning and Development Unit in ACH Group, providing training for staff and volunteers and service development across ACH Group services in SA and Vic. She will talk about reducing the risk of dementia, identifying the signs of dementia and how to communicate with a person living with dementia. The reflection for the evening will be on finding the spirit within the person and transcending the condition of dementia.

Bible Studies for the season of Lent

Bible studies for Lent follow the York series again. This year's study, Glimpses of God: Hope for Today's World tackles subjects like "Where is God when we need him?" "Facing our fears", and "From search to discovery".



Fr Paul writes...

The month of February brings back for many people a return to the school year and the routine of another year with work and other activities. It is a month where some of us are wondering when summer will end, especially given some very hot days over the past month. It is a month when people are paying off the last of their bills from Christmas, but it is also for couples who celebrate their love for each other on St. Valentine's Day. This is well publicised and is the high point of February sales for a variety of businesses: florists, greeting card manufacturers, chocolate makers, restaurants and entertainment venues.

St Valentine's Day is not a good way to start the season of Lent, which is the day before on Ash Wednesday. Ash Wednesday is when we implement the traditional Lenten disciplines of Prayer, Fasting and Giving. The disciplines are meant to be opportunities for remembering who we are in God's eyes, and what God calls us to be and do as "ambassadors for Christ."

Certainly, the tradition is that Shrove Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday, was a time when we used up all the "fat" which would be then avoided over the following 40 days. The word "Shrove" comes from the old English word, "shriven" which is associated with confession and repentance. Preparing for Lent and Easter involved putting aside not only the luxuries of life but also setting aside rebellion against God and our resistance to God's place in our lives – to repent, confess and make a fresh start under God's grace.

In recent years, we have marked this preparation for Lent the night before Ash Wednesday with a Pancake Supper. If you are able to, come to St Margaret's at 6 pm on the 13th of February for Evensong and then stay for pancakes, both savoury and sweet.

Certainly Ash Wednesday along with Good Friday are days of abstinence when we should fast and not eat meat. We should also attend one of the services on that day (at 9 am at St Margaret's or at 7 pm at St Ann's). There will be the imposition of ashes from last year's palm crosses.

Taking part in our Lenten Study is another way of making the most of this period leading up to Easter. The study this year, as it has been for the past two years, is from York Courses. The study is well produced, easy to use and well produced. This year, the course draws on the Bible and where we can find strength and encouragement as we live in turbulent times. Under the title *Glimpses of God*, this course brings a message of hope.

The most difficult part of a Lenten study is going to it! There are four venues in our Pastoral District this year, so I would encourage you to seriously consider joining in on one of them. They are a good time of fellowship as well. Please check p. 2 of *The Grapevine* for the dates and times of the Lenten Studies.

If you intend to keep a 'good Lent', at least consider the time to take something on, and don't just celebrate St. Valentines Day!

"What's that big wooden thing?"

The up-side, though, is that it invites people who wouldn't otherwise enter a



church door, to come inside. Several people have said something like "I have lived here for thirty years and always wondered what the church was like inside." There's a simple response to that, but it wouldn't be helpful to give it. Those who spend the time to look around, love what they see.

The last two jumble sales have brought children who asked questions about the church. On both occasions, they pointed at the cross on the wall and asked "What's that big wooden thing?"

"That's a cross", I said. "We have it there because Jesus died on a cross to save us from our sins and we honour it because of that."

The first child, in November, looked thoughtful. "It looks like a big 'plus' sign," she said.

What a big plus sign indeed! Makes you think, doesn't it. Out of the mouths of babes...

The second child, in January, had a different response. "Jesus didn't really exist," she said.

"Yes, he did exist," I said. "People think different things about Jesus, I know, but he certainly existed."

It turned out that the child did in fact know about Baby Jesus—perhaps she thought he was as mythical as Santa Claus.

Neither time was an occasion to develop a deep theological discussion, but perhaps, God willing, we may have sown a seed in the mind of a child?

May God bless these children, and help us to welcome them to our churches.
