The service was taken by Bishop Stanley Goldsworthy, who preached on the church as a Eucharistic community. Following the service Stephen Wells thanked all those involved, and Wallace Mausolf paid tribute to three members of the congregation who had been and still were, with their wives, active contributors to the church but now had difficulty in attending: Clarrie Bartlett, John Carne and Ray Gorton. Of the three, only Ray was able to be there to receive a tribute from the church.

It would not be an SSPJ festival without a verse from Wallace, and his poem, "A Tribute to a Terrific Trio", says it all:

Now here's a well-known trio, called Clarrie, Ray and John Who served their church in different ways to keep things moving on. The skills they have are numerous, but each in his own way Gave freely of both limb and mind and looked for no re-pay.

Clarrie has a host of skills, from working on the farm, He also is a first-rate cook, and added to this charm He is a first-class spinner, a master of the yarn. Ray is a computer whiz, and a handy-man to boot, Especially good with door-locks, and finding things that suit A fund-raiser of some renown; he really is quite cute. Our John has given his full share of time and dedication To parish functions of all kinds; he's really a sensation; An assistant to the Wardens in money calculations.

So, thankyou, fellows one and all, for all your love and care You're still a valued part of us; you've truly done your share.



Fr Paul writes...

Encouragement. Who does not need it! You may be struggling with life in general or with a subject at school or University, and to receive encouragement from others is an impetus to keep going. Being assured of what we do, and encouraged and complimented, is important and certainly a way of supporting each other in life. Our friendliness, good cheer, interest in others, a willingness to help others with their burdens and even their lesser needs – all this constitutes a kind of encouragement to others. Much of our ability depends on encouragement and tells us that what we are doing is worthwhile.

The Acts of the Apostles and the letters of Paul all attest to concerted efforts to encourage others who had already received the good news of Jesus Christ. Paul in Acts Chapter 14 verses 19-28 shows this act of encouragement. Paul had been left for dead after being stoned but when his disciples surrounded him, he got up and went back into the city. He continued his missionary tour and retraced his steps, visiting those who had already received the good news. Along with the other disciples Paul was able to encourage the young believers to continue in their belief, and to give them realistic advice. They told their own story and encouraged them in the face of hardships with the account of all they had been through.

Giving encouragement could well be a matter of recalling the Gospel, the message of Christ, for our friends and those whom we want to help. Otherwise it may be simply encouraging others by affirming them, backing their efforts, with good will and letting our own faith and trust shine through in a good spirit of hopefulness. We do this as Christians as we know that God is a God of peace, who assures us of his love for us. There are some reassuring words in Hymn 546 in the Australian Hymn Book: "Lord of all hopefulness, Lord of all joy, whose trust, ever childlike, no cares could destroy, be there at our waking and give us we pray, your bliss in our hearts, Lord, at the break of the day." The hymn assures us that God is there in our labours, a God who is kind and gentle, and is with us throughout every day.

The apostle Paul had a large network of colleagues and co-workers who worked alongside him in ministry, in a bid to encourage others in their faith. As a result, the Pastoral District Council has agreed to set up a pastoral care group, where those trained in safe ministry will support me in pastorally caring for church members and those connected with the church in some way. A team of people, led by me, aims to assist those who need fellowship and a helping hand.

In other news.....confirmation classes start on Sunday May 19th at St Margaret's, McLaren Vale. There are a number of adults and children interested and I would encourage you to think about being confirmed if you haven't done so. Confirmation allows you to affirm the vows made at your baptism by your parents and godparents. The confirmation classes are an opportunity for you yourself to say "yes" to Jesus' call to follow him on our journey through life. I am hopeful the confirmation can be held in September.

Thank you Bishop Stanley Goldsworthy for presiding at the Patronal Festival at St Philip and St James'. I gather it was an excellent day. Bishop Stanley has continued to assist at SSPJ when I am not there and it is very much appreciated.

- * The Lenten Bible studies provoked some interesting discussions from those who attended the various sessions with the lead-up to Easter.

Thanks go to Trish Simon who organised the donkey, and also to its owner Jim Lekkas and the float owner Tim Humphrys who made it all possible. Fr Ken led an inspirational service and a shared luncheon was held in the hall.
- * Services were held at St Ann's on Tuesday, Good Friday and at 9am Easter Sunday. Good Friday had the Stations of the Cross Service at midday. On Sunday the service was again a joyous occasion with many visitors including children who had lots of good activities with Anne and helpers, and again our floral cross adorning the church and later placed by Main South Road as our Easter gift to the community. A special thanks to Val Martin for all the work she undertook to ensure these days ran smoothly. We feel it would be appropriate to have a morning tea after the Easter service next year.
- * We had a moderately successful Jumble Sale in March, raising monies dedicated to the R&M for repairs to the church windows etc. but our band of workers is finding that age and ill health is catching up with us. With smaller numbers of helpers, the task of running these sales is quite difficult for the rest. We are addressing the issue of the need for more help, and endeavouring to raise awareness of the benefits achieved by these sales.

The first meeting of the newly appointed PDC on 16th April, chaired by Canon Dirk van Dissel and minuted by Di Best was attended by an interested group of observers. It began with a motion of good wishes and prayers for Pat Roper, who was absent following an operation.

Matters discussed included:

- * Pastoral Care Committee: Those who had expressed interest to meet on 30th April to progress the formation of the Committee. Another Safer Ministry training to be held on 15th June at Tailem Bend.
- New Pastoral Assistants: Fr Paul and PDC
- recommended to Diocesan Council that Louise Webb & David Mills be made Pastoral Assistants.
- * Home groups will go ahead from 1st May, to be he ld on the first Friday of the month at the Chapman's home from 7 pm (see p. 3). Peter Chapman to report on this to PDC. The Chapmans were thanked for their hospitality.
- * Review of PDC: Members of the PDC were asked to write brief responses to the PDC Activity Review 2012 which had been presented to the February meeting. In this was an analysis of activities and discussions held on the themes identified as part of our parish vision by the Future Directions consultation 2010: worship, mission, outreach, pastoral care, stewardship, growth, Anglican presence, and administration. Wardens' responses to be collated by the Secretary and discussed at the next PDC meeting.
- * Fund-raising Committee: The committee, cooks and organisers of the event were congratulated on an excellent result from the dinner at the McLaren Flat Community Club on 12th April, feeding 101 people and raising between \$1200-1300 (see p. 2). Another event on 29th September (Pertaringa wine and cheese) was being planned.
- * **ABM Sunday** had been a Provincial event and would be held annually on the first Sunday of Lent. The amount raised in the special collection on that day had not been identified from the total Lent collection, but a cheque for \$1,300 was to be sent to ABM.
- * Synod representatives: Since the elected representative Brian McMillan was unable to attend Synod on 24th-25th May 2013, the first reserve for the PD, Bill Cale, would take his place.
- * Organ proposal: The temporary locating of the Greg Trott organ in St Margaret's, enabling it to be wired up and used as the console for the existing virtual pipe organ, was approved by PDC.
- * Fire Extinguisher training: Following a recent baptism, this training would be offered free of charge on a suitable occasion. The generous offer was appreciated.
- * Willunga 175th Anniversary 2014: It was agreed that it would be good to have Southern Vales' participation in this. Ideas included an art exhibition or a musical event as well as a historical exhibition in the church.
- * Sponsorship for *The Grapevine*? Fr Paul had been approached by two businesses offering to sponsor *The Grapevine*. This would cover printing costs (approx \$30 an issue—the Editor and Ted Sandercock provide their time free) and provide an income. Issues discussed included whether advertisements would be an appropriate inclusion in our parish paper, and whether advertisements of, for example, a funeral business or car sales, would be taken as an endorsement of them. To be discussed at the next PDC. [*It's your paper—what do you think? Talk to your Wardens.*]

The Treasurer commented that collections were within \$400 of Budget. The monthly expenditure had been high with our whole year's insurance being paid, which was more helpful to the Diocese than our paying in instalments.

It was noted that a letter addressed to the Chairman of PDC expressing concern about Fr Paul's workload and his visits to Tatiara (see last issue) had not been listed under Correspondence. When the matter was pursued Fr Dirk allowed the letter to be circulated, but without discussion.

Next meeting Tuesday 14th May. Observers welcome.
