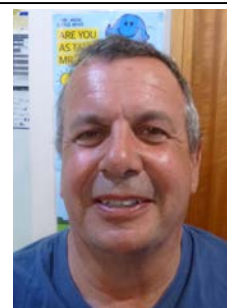
**Julia Drought,

Fr Paul writes...

We approach the great season of Easter. It is a time where we enter into Holy Week and follow Jesus through the institution of the Lord's Supper on Maundy Thursday, experience the drama of his crucifixion on Good Friday, his absence on Holy Saturday and then celebrate his life rising from death on Easter Day.

Holy Week begins on Palm Sunday where Jesus enters Jerusalem as King Jesus, the Son of God and Son of Man. Within a few days, there is a reversal as even his closest friends desert him. Palm Sunday takes us through the optimistic excitement of the palm procession to the suffering and silence of Good Friday. It is a lot to handle in a short time. The mixed emotions and attitudes of Holy Week are condensed, enabling us to share a small portion of the distress and confusion that must have beset everyone close to Jesus. On Maundy Thursday we remember the traditional account and understanding of the Last Supper. It is an institution where we today share in the bread and wine and where Christ's earthly presence is recalled. Here Christ is spiritually present in the bread and wine, in providing us spiritual sustenance in our daily lives. On Good Friday, we follow Jesus to the cross and his death, then the emptiness of Holy Saturday, before the wonderful joy of Jesus risen on Easter Day. Here, we celebrate Jesus destroying death after three days in a tomb and raising us to eternal life with him. As a result, death becomes meaningless for those who believe in him. Jesus broke the rule of nature, the rule of creation, the rule of life and death, the natural conclusion to our existence, and has ensured that death has no meaning for us.

I encourage you all to follow Jesus during Holy Week starting on Palm Sunday, in our daily services during the week, reliving the experiences of Jesus's walk to the cross on Good Friday, before the celebration of Christ risen on Easter Day.

It is with mixed emotions that I have announced that I have been appointed as the Parish Priest for the Pastoral District of the Riverland. Bishop John Ford made this offer to me in January and it is something that he and I have been discussing since then. The decision to take up the appointment was a difficult one knowing the love and support you have given me in my nearly four years in my ministry as the Priest Assistant in the Southern Vales. In the end, after much prayer and reflection, I have with Helen's support accepted the offer.

It is a big challenge, being Parish Priest of four former parishes which have become two pastoral districts. They include Renmark, Loxton, Berri-Barmerra and Waikerie. The move is anticipated to be in July or August. Please pray for me and for Helen as we prepare to make this move but also for the Pastoral District of the Southern Vales as it looks to the appointment of a new priest.

On Tuesday 11th March, after a shared meal, the Council met at 7.00 pm chaired by Fr Paul. Matters discussed included the following. Other items appear elsewhere in this edition.

NBN Connection

This is now connected and the rectory is running on the internet service provider iinet and is very fast. The technician was on site for a full day instead of the usual two hours as finding the relevant Telstra cable in the grounds was difficult. There are two, one of which runs from the footpath to the church which must have been to allow for a phone in the vestry.

Willunga 175 Program – participation Discover Willunga Fair, May 4 2014

Ted Sandercock spoke of the Fair which is one of the major events in the program and an opportunity for all offices, clubs, local groups to have a stand, conduct fundraising and highlight Willunga's rich past. It was moved that we have a stall from 12 noon onwards following the St Philip & St James Patronal Festival at 10 am.

St Philip & St James porch plastering

We rejoice that there have been several new people from the community "dropping in" at Granny Annie's. Our door is always open, and the kettle on, on Thursday mornings.

Mothering Sunday (30th March), also known as Refreshment Sunday, in the middle of the season of Lent, was celebrated once again with simnel cake, and posies for mothers. The Simnel cakes were decorated with the traditional 11 marzipan balls, representing the disciples, but without Judas.

For St Philip & St James' church, Di Wells made the posies and Stephen Wells made the Simnel cake.



Vestry 2014

The Pastoral District vestry meeting was held at St Margaret's on 16th March, and was chaired by Bishop John Ford in a spirit of friendship and good humour. The reports presented to the Vestry have been separately printed and circulated by the Secretary, and a full report of the Vestry meeting will be available later. In summary, however, matters dealt with included the following:

Financial Report for the year ending 31st Dec. 2014:

Retiring Treasurer Margaret Cale reported:

Total Income	\$80,612 (ambitious \$89,000 budgeted)
Total Expenditure	\$89,923 (approx 8,000 under budget)
Missions	\$6,038 (up on previous year)
Deficit	\$9,612 (-\$9,000 budgeted)

She reported that we had met all our financial obligations for the year although it had been a challenging year for the Pastoral District. The balance had been drawn from assets. She thanked the Wardens for their counting and banking of the weekly donations.

Budget 2014: The Treasurer presented a challenging budget for the coming year, which included a full Priest's stipend, which would be needed for DC to allow us to resume our status as a parish.

Total Income:	\$95,000
Total Expenditure:	\$103,641
Deficit:	\$8,641

She pointed out that although we had been working with a deficit budget we had been able to meet all our Diocesan commitments in the 8 years she had been Treasurer. The Bishop cautioned that in accepting a deficit budget we were under moral obligation to work hard to try to achieve that budget. It was passed, in trust that God would enable us to do what is needed. Margaret was thanked and applauded for her excellent work as Treasurer.

The Vestry requested the Diocesan Council to reconsider **Parish status for our Pastoral District**, and that we be informed of what is required to achieve this. The Bishop advised that the first requirement would certainly be that we could pay a full Priest's stipend.

The **Wardens' appointments** for the coming year were confirmed: *St Ann's*: Pat Roper (People's Warden), Peter Chapman (Priest's Warden), *St Margaret's*: Julia Drought (People's Warden), Greg John (Priest's Warden), *St Philip & St James*: Stephen Wells (People's Warden), Bob Smith (Priest's Warden), *St Stephen's*: Joan Lunn (People's Warden), Ted Sandercock (Priest's Warden). The Bishop thanked those who had served and those who would be serving as Wardens, affirming their role as essential to the life of the church. In his eyes, he said, the Wardens were the Bishop's lay officers, working collaboratively with the Bishop and clergy.

The Vestry recorded its appreciation for the dedicated work of the Pastoral District Council over the past 12 months. Those standing down were recognised and thanked: Joe Saunders, Warden at St Margaret's 2013, Greg Roberts (photo A), Warden at St Margaret's for 3 years, Margaret Cameron (B), Warden since the late 1980s at St Stephen's as well as fulfilling many other roles in the Pastoral District, Wallace Mausolf (C), Warden at St Philip & St James since 1982, an equal record with Mary Blagrove, as well as being a Lay Reader, and Margaret Cale (D) who had ably served as Secretary and then as a meticulous and efficient Treasurer for eight years. They were presented with gifts of gratitude and rounds of appreciative applause.

Fr Paul noted the urgent need for a Treasurer to replace Margaret this year.



Pastoral District Council: Several motions requested that the **Treasurer and Secretary be allowed to vote at PDC meetings**. The Bishop said that the Ordinance at present stated that only Wardens could vote at PDC meetings. However, the Ordinance was due to be revised by the end of 2014. Other motions requested that **observers, including the Editor of *The Grapevine*, be permitted to attend PDC meetings**. The Bishop believed that Council meetings should not be behind closed doors and that other people may be present at meetings although they may not participate or vote.



They may be asked to absent themselves when a sensitive matter is being discussed. While the issue of **Substitute Wardens** to attend meetings when a People's Warden is unavoidably absent has been a matter under dispute, the Bishop felt that the appointment by Vestry of Deputy Wardens would be appropriate to the way we are and the way we need to work. The matter would be put to DC for consideration. The Vestry recorded its appreciation of the work of the Pastoral District over the past twelve months.

Fr Paul and the PD: The Bishop was requested that attention be given to proper training and refreshment of Fr Paul, who as an assistant priest in what was officially a "Vacant Pastoral District", and with a number of Diocesan tasks, had been working under a very heavy load. The Bishop had extended Fr Paul's licence to the PD for another 6 months to June while he works out the best way forward. He affirmed his belief that proper in-service and ongoing training were very important for clergy. He himself would undertake Paul's supervision and would have 24 hours with Paul the next day. Fr Paul would be authorised from now on to chair all Pastoral District meetings.

The Vestry approved a motion that the Pastoral District consider a weekend retreat or camp as one of its activities for 2014, to be led by someone outside the PD.

Support for the Bishop: Other motions affirmed support of the Bishop's lead in developing openness in Diocesan operations and activities, and enthusiastic support of the Bishop's "Taking the Plunge Together" programme.

The Vestry meeting was an occasion when parishioners voted with red stickers on which projects to support through the Anglican Board of Mission. Selected were: Building Local Skills: Assistance to Anglican Schools, and Disaster Risk Reduction. Further information in later issues of the Grapevine.

LENTEN MEDITATIONS
