



News from Pastoral District Council

As the January PDC was on the 31st of January, it was not possible to include a PDC report in our February issue. Highlights from both January and February meetings are included in this issue. Both meetings were ably chaired by Ted Sandercock.

January

At the January PDC meeting the **Mission Action Plan Vision** was adopted: **Proclaiming Christ in word and action: Growing in care, love and service. Action Groups** for the Mission Action Plan were confirmed (see opposite page).

Setting up a Pastoral Care group for the PD: (This was part of the third mission aim)

This team will be a support group for the parish priest to assist with: *parish visiting of the sick, elderly, lonely or those in any kind of need - in their homes, or hospitals or care homes, *taking Holy Communion to the sick, *a ministry of welcome to new people, *care for a particular group within the church, eg young mothers, or men, * keeping contact with those who are on the fringes of the Church, * assisting with care for families of those who are baptised, * being the first point of contact for those seeking marriage, * praying with and for those who are sick, * various aspects of Church led social action. The "Respectful Encounters" day (see p. 1) would be of value to team members and wardens.

Lenten Studies: to be led by Brian McMillan (St Ann's), Judith Wells (SS Philip & James), Greg John (St Margaret's) and Ted Sandercock. Written by Bishop John, they would be participatory sessions, based on the readings for the Sunday. They would require the use of a laptop. Ted would copy the programme and readings at the office.

Financial Report: Financial figures for the January meeting were prepared in time to be printed in the January issue of *The Grapevine,* which can still be viewed on-line at www.southernvalesparish.org. Retired Treasurer Margaret commented that she was disappointed in the final figure for 2014 as she had hoped that the deficit might be eliminated. Collections were \$2,500 under budget and donations did not reach the budgeted \$5000, but the fundraising figure was good. All bills were paid, and there was no debt.

February

At the meeting on Saturday the 21st of February the first item on the agenda was the **Mission Action Plan** (MAP) (see opposite page.) Other matters discussed included the following, while others appear elsewhere in this issue.

Audiovisual equipment approved in January had been purchased and was already in use: a 4,000 lumens Epson data projector (strong enough for daytime presentations), a tripod, screen, Logitech speakers, cables, case for the projector and bag for the screen—to be funded from the Shirley Garfit fund, which she had wished to be used for spiritual education growth.

The **SSPJ Organ** is to be exchanged for the better organ at present stored in the Rectory. Clare Baker to be consulted on future use or otherwise of the SSPJ organ.

Ted and Wendy had attended the installation of **Pastor Andrew Dockerill** in the Lutheran Church, McLaren Vale, and had conveyed a welcome on behalf of the Anglican Church.

Some breakdowns in communication have highlighted the need for proper procedures to be formalised for **wedding** and funeral planning. Information about events must be provided to the PD Secretary, the churchwardens and, where cemeteries are involved, their curators.

Pre-vestry meetings to be held at all centres before the Vestry, to be chaired by Priest's Wardens, whose positions had already been approved by the archdeacon in the absence of a parish priest. St Ann's and SSPJ, knowing in advance of the absence for a period of time of their proposed wardens, could nominate stand-ins for the time of their absence.

Easter services: Fr John Edwards had offered to take Holy Week and Easter services for the PD without fees, in exchange for which, accommodation at the Rectory would be provided for that period.

Fundraising: The Guilds to inform PDC of major fundraising events to be held through the year to avoid clashes.

A Tibetan blessing

On Thursday the 19th of February Sue MacKirdy and Anne Chittleborough, who were at Granny Annie's, and Bill Cale who was cutting the grass at St Ann's, were visited by Sue's Tibetan son-in-law Thupten and his wife Ann, and Thupten's brother Choewang from the Drepung Buddhist monstery in South India. It was an opportunity to show Choewang our church and explain about our church life and worship, and for him, interpreted by Thupten, to tell us about his faith and his studies. He had been studying since he was 13 years old, and had another

seven years to go. He presented St Ann's with a beautiful *khata* with a blessing. In exchange, he was presented with a Southern Vales calendar which he says he will take back to India with him.



Christian workers in our schools

On the 22nd of February at the Coast and Vines church at Willunga, the Pastoral Care Workers (chaplains) for our schools were invited to talk about their work, and were blessed and commissioned by Pastor Rod Dowie and the Rev. Coralie Evans.

Each of the chaplains shared in their own way their inspiring commitment and their passion for the work. As one

of them said, when she started the work she felt clearly that "this was what I was made for". Building relationships of friendship and trust with the children and staff enable them to be there for them when things fall apart, and when the unexpected happens. Many of the children come from single parent families, and many boys have no men in their lives, so Jamie Wells' role at Aldinga R-7 is an important one, and the shared husband-and-wife work by Jamie and his wife Natalie is significant as a role model. Increase in numbers at the schools and the impact of family breakup was a recurring theme at all schools.

Paul Hodgson of the Schools Ministry Group spoke of the need for ongoing and increased support for the PCWs. There are hundreds of students in the schools, and Government funding covers only 8 hours a week; fundraising provides extra hours for them. He emphasised the need for prayer support, too, especially as their work can involve difficult and sometimes hostile situations.

Our PD raises funds for their work through our Gold Coin appeal on the first Sunday of every month—please give generously. We also assist by running a sausage sizzle at the Quarry Market, Willunga, on the third Saturday in October and November. For more details contact Ted Sandercock, ph 85564535.

English Rose Funerals have withdrawn their advertisement from this paper because a few people have expressed to them the opinion that it was inappropriate for them to advertise here.

It should be noted, though, that the option of taking paid advertisements to help defray the cost of printing was thoroughly discussed in 2013 before being passed by PD Council.—Ed.

St Ann's, Aldinga—150 not out (cont'd) A church built, and an argument breaks out.

With the decision made to build a church at Aldinga, an acre of land was given by the South Australian Company and a foundation stone laid by Mrs Short, wife of the Bishop, in 1865.

It was resolved that no debt was to be incurred, so work continued as funds came in to build the walls, roof, floors and doors. For the last £250 needed to finish the job, the six trustees were asked to lend £40 each without interest, with the loans to be repaid by pew-rents. The church was opened for services by Dean Farrell in 1866 as the Bishop was in England at the time. Fifty to sixty attended, and more than 70 seats were let. In four years the whole cost, £785, was met, without any help from the Synod or other church funds and the church was able to be consecrated, with Mrs Short presenting a fine communion service.

Quite a storm arose

The services were held in the evenings, and the rector, E. K. Miller, tried to arrange for a lay reader to take a service at Willunga once a month to allow him to conduct a morning service at Aldinga, but at this "quite a storm arose. Some [at Willunga] were a little jealous on account of Aldinga succeeding in what most Willunga folk had pronounced an impossibility: while others contended that, as a morning service had always been held at Willunga, they ought not to be deprived in any degree of it. I explained, that if they would procure lamps I would hold an evening service at Willunga on the Sundays when I would be at Aldinga in the morning. But it was all no use. A resolution was passed that service at Willunga should be continued as it always had been, and no alteration permitted."

Resolution

Allowing a little time for the excitement to subside, Miller found a lay-reader, bought some lamps, and proceeded to carry out his plans regardless of the vestry's decision. This caused another furore, but he eventually managed to get the assistance of more lay readers and was able to have services morning *and* evening at *both* centres. "After a while this met with general approval," he wrote in 1895. "I believe no one now would wish to see it altered."
