

A Word from Fr Peter

Dear People of the Pastoral District of Southern Vales,

I am writing this just after our Wednesday Lenten study group, when we considered the Samaritan woman at the well and each person was invited to say what stood out for them in this story (John 4.5-42). One of our group perceptively spoke of the statement Jesus makes, "The hour is coming when the true worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and in truth". ("...no longer on this mountain nor in Jerusalem").

I found this very insightful. We do tend to stray into thinking we've got the God-

business "sewn up" and regard God as contained in our formulae or dogmas, or even walled up. It is a mistake to think we can control or manipulate God or contain God in a particular place or building, a "god-box". God continues to surprise us by going before us and appearing in unexpected places; as at the Resurrection. The hymn says: O thou within no walls confined, inhabitest the humble mind. Where'er we seek thee thou art found and every place is hallowed ground.

Jesus foreshadows the hour when he will be glorified, when the new covenant of grace and forgiveness is ushered in, through his holy dying and rising. The liberty of the Spirit was to replace the tight bound merit-scoring regulation of Pharisaic observance. The law, bound in letters of stone, is replaced by the freedom of the Spirit. It took the first disciples some time to fathom this profound truth and the finely honed theology of St Paul describes this new relationship: By grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God. (Ephesians 2.8)

The other momentous truth of this New Covenant is that the dividing wall between Jew and Gentile would be abolished by the Cross, so the Samaritan place of worship (on this mountain) and the Jewish place (Jerusalem) would be superseded. From then on, the true place of worship would be in spirit and in truth, the realm of the Kingdom of Heaven. This is the wonderful gift of God which we celebrate at Easter, the ushering in of the Age of the Spirit and the New Covenant relationship. It took me years to learn to apply the significance of this. After growing up in an inspiring church in downtown Sydney, where seamless liturgy and peerless music combined with fine art and passionate preaching, I had to learn the true worship of God could be offered in a former army hut (which was the Chapel at St Michael's House) and then in my first cure in Elizabeth NW in a multi purpose drab besser block mission hall.

In the Elizabeth days, three congregations had decided (with Diocesan help) to join as one. Leaving their mission halls behind, they worshipped first in a temporary home at the Elizabeth Mission, before the new Church of the Holy Cross was built. The leaving behind was painful, until their new future opened up. (I hoped I could handle it more graciously if ever placed in a similar position again). Every time a priest is called to leave one parish to go to another, there is a leaving behind of the security of one time and place to embrace a wider vision of where God is at work among God's people. There is a dying and rising with Christ, into which we enter at our baptism.

I hope these thoughts may be useful for this time and place in the PDSV. God bless you as together we pass over with Christ to newness of life in Him, this Easter.

Vestry 2017

The Annual Vestry meeting of the Pastoral District was held at St Margaret's on Sunday 12th March. Speaking as a newcomer, as he said, Fr Peter Thomson opened the meeting with a "Clayton's" Priest's Report (the report you give when you are not giving a report) and then handed over to the PD Secretary, Ted Sandercock. In his opening remarks, Fr Peter spoke highly of Ted, for his hard work and administrative role which were holding the PD together in the absence of a parish priest. He also praised the degree of co-operation he noticed between the five



centres of the PD, and the energy he found here. We had been given permission by Bishop John to try some new ways of doing things, beyond those set out in the Parochial Administration Ordinances, and were in fact breaking new ground. And having worked out what we should do and be, we can then work out how best to do it, "form following function". His role as requested by the Bishop, was to be primarily a pastoral and sacramental one, leaving us to work out our way of operating.

In presenting the audited accounts for 2016 the Treasurer noted that most giving had been down on the budgeted amount for 2016; the only area up was that of fundraising. She paid particular tribute to the Almond Blossom Festival on which all the churches worked together, which had raised over \$1500, and also the rose pruning by the little Prickle Team which had raised an amazing \$1,450. We had managed financially because we had only paid 6 months of a clergy stipend. For the 2017 budget she had included a full stipend, which gives us a challenging budget to work to. **Budgeted income for 2017: \$138,790 (deficiency \$13,790)** (for details see Annual Report)

St Philip & St James: Brian McMillan, representing the SSPJ Restoration Committee reported on the status of the Old Noarlunga church of St Philip & St James, where the problem had been identified as the east wall moving eastwards and taking the vestry with it. They had been advised that the east wall should be stabilised with a water injection system (as had the other three walls of the church) and the vestry should be underpinned. When the movement of the wall had stopped, the church could be rebuilt. However, advice from Heritage Stone Restoration had been that it would be better to underpin both the east wall and the vestry. The Committee is therefore working on getting a design for underpinning, and getting it costed. When the estimated cost is established—and the desired purpose of the building is determined (should it be a church with the same use as previously or should it have a use more open

to the community?) — fundraising can begin. Judith Wells reported that there are at least three groups from Old Noarlunga who have expressed interest in helping.

Services in Nursing Homes: The work done by Greg Roberts in visiting nursing homes was greatly appreciated. At Kalyra and Colton Court there were services run by the Ministry Group of Southern Vales. Life Care at Aldinga, run by the Church of Christ, did not involve support from the other churches, and we might like to support them.

Ministry District of Southern Vales: The development of the proposed Ministry District was part of our response to "Walking the Way". Margaret Cale spoke of the need for a vision for our ministry district and the need to think outside the square—should we be thinking of a place in the shopping centres? Should we be thinking of re-fashioning St Philip & St James' building? Should we be holding events outside the churches, such as pancake day—and talking about why we do it? Should we consider holding our harvest festival in a winery instead of a church? And having decided what we should do, then we can work out what we need, to go about it. We need to make new goals, to prioritise them. "Don't just think outside the box", she said, "think like there is no box!"

The Grapevine: Anne Chittleborough spoke about the effect of the growth of the Pastoral District, and the development of the PD website, on the future of *The Grapevine*, and her wish to have a support group to help with

decisions on the way to go in future, and also assistance in practical matters of preparation and production of the *GV*. Responding to a query about the funding of the paper, she said that while she believed that it should be free, it was always helpful when people

donated towards its cost, especially those who receive it in the mail. Mailing to people outside the PD boundaries amounted to about \$30 a month. Donations could be given to her directly or put in the offering, marked "Grapevine". We are also assisted by sponsorship by Simplicity Funerals.

Special Votes of thanks were offered by acclamation to Ted Sandercock (PD Secretary), Margarel Cale (PD Treasurer) and Di Best (Minutes Secretary)

At work in our schools...

A special service for the Christian Support workers (chaplains) in our local schools was held at the Uniting Church, Aldinga on Sunday 5th March. Chaplains Sue Camac (Willunga Primary School) Karen Prenzler (McLaren Flat), Chris Oxenham (Old Noarlunga) and Jamie Wells (Aldinga R-7) were introduced by John Anderson (Chair of the Schools Ministry Support Group).

Each had a different story of what moved them most in their work—knowing the children from Reception up, and so being available to help where teachers identified a problem, working with children in a veggie garden, helping a family where the mum had cancer or where there was a family tragedy, working with a child as his mentor and enabling his school's response to his wish to help poor people... and in all the stories the value of their work, their relationship with the children and with the staff, shone through.

Government support provides 8 or 9 hours a week contact time in the schools, but this doesn't go far, especially in

the larger schools. Aldinga R-7 has over 700 children. 60% of South Australian schools have chaplains, and as John Anderson said, while it is sadly true that at this time the churches have a bad name among some people, and deservedly so, everywhere there is praise for the chaplains.

We can support them in prayer, in donations (our gold coin collections monthly and our 2 months at the Quarry market sausage sizzle) and sometimes in providing support activities for the chaplains.

There have been several notable events at St Margaret's recently.



Thankyou Brian. Special thanks also to those who helped with preparation and catering, especially ladies from the Little Sisters choir who supported the whole event.


The carpets in both buildings have been flattened out and no longer pose a tripping hazard. The Sunday School room furniture was quickly moved out and back in by young men

News from Ss Philip & James, Old Noarlunga (see also Vestry News)

News from Pastoral District Council, 21st March

The meeting was chaired by the PD Secretary, Ted Sandercock, with Fr Peter Thomson in attendance. Matters discussed included those briefly reported below. (Various other matters are included elsewhere in the issue.)

Appointments: Newly appointed Wardens Greg Roberts and John Strachan were welcomed. Margaret Cale was appointed PD Treasurer and Di Best appointed Minutes Secretary. Ted, who had been appointed as Ministry District Representative at Diocesan Council announced that he was not standing for re-election as PD Secretary but would hold the reins until a new secretary was appointed. A central task, he said, was to maintain contact with the Diocesan office, and also to answer mail. PD requested time to consider a possible replacement and pray about it.

Representatives of Southern Vales were appointed to take part in the **Ministry District meeting** on Tuesday 28th (However the meeting was later postponed as representatives from Yankalilla/Delamere were unable to attend.)

Cemetery: The Diocese had requested a decision on a new Curator for St Ann's cemetery. PD appointed Margaret Cale .

Annual Vestry Meeting: Numbers attending were disappointing. Suggestion that an interesting discussion could be planned for the Vestry next year. ABM projects had been voted for, the three to be adopted being Child Nutrition at the Al Ahli Arab Hospital, Jerusalem, a Water & Sanitation project in Myanmar and the Guwara education project at St Andrew's school, Sydney. (More on these later.)

The Rectory: A new air conditioner has been installed in the study. Fr Peter, who travels to us from Westbourne Park, uses the Rectory on Wednesdays and Fridays.
