To all the Western Fleurieu Anglicans and *Grapevine* readers, Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

During this Christmas season we become acutely aware of the preciousness of available time and the importance of priorities.

We seem to be rediscovering this truth at Christmas time every year, so this year let us all take this hard learned wisdom with us into 2018.

One way we can put this wisdom into practice is to set time aside regularly to reflect on our walk with God through life each day. By taking this time to reflect we can give ourselves the time with God to prioritise the competing demands before us.



If we don't include God in our daily preparations, then our priorities will be dictated by whatever is "shouting at us the loudest" (money, bills, deadlines, demands, desires, needs, wants, expectations, and other stuff). God does not usually "shout", so by giving ourselves the time to reflect with God on these competing demands we are able to consider what we put our time and energy into; which may not be that which "shouts" the loudest (even some churchie stuff).

When reflecting on these things I was reminded of something Jesus said: "The thief comes only in order to steal, kill, and destroy. I have come in order that you might have life—life in all its fullness" (John 10:10). God is always with you


