

Rev Bernice Elford took us on an amazing visual trip through her activities in India – and gave an informative talk on the things she saw and experienced. We had about 30 people at the Supper, a mixture of members from the congregations at SCC, as well as from the WFA.

The money raised (\$120 after expenses) was given to Bernice and will be used to support the men's shelter in India – an amazing outreach ministry by the Christians in that region, supporting homeless men, many of whom have disabilities or mental health issues, and are shunned by their families and

community.

The greatest danger, they said, in sailing around the world, can be the breakdown in relationships under the tensions of sharing so small a living space! They rejoice in the fact that their marriage survived! as did their faith.

News from St Nicholas', Seaford

Ministry: We have been fortunate to have Fr Simon and Fr Ted taking our services this month. Fr Ted attended the Ecumenical Prayer Service on Sunday 18th March which was attended by people from all the denominations at SCC. The service was followed by delicious soup and bread as usual.

Youth Worship Our service this month fell on Palm Sunday. We all met at 10.45 for the Ecumenical Liturgy of the Palms followed by a procession into the different worship spaces. The centre resounding with the sound of joyful singing and much palm waving! This month the service had a different take on the usual Palm Sunday Service. We were told of

two parades, one led by Pontius Pilate with soldiers, horses, armour, banners and flags and standards bearing great carved golden eagles, and one with Jesus, down the Mount of Olives on a donkey: on an agricultural "tool", not a war machine, saying loud and clear



that real power and authority begins and ends with the peace of God. And so, we are asked, "Which parade will You join?" "What path will your feet take?" A thought-provoking drama and reflection, based on Luke, which challenges us in our actions today. We know Christ walks the road beside us, whether the road is easy or hard, so, in this Holy Week, we invite everyone to walk the road to Calvary with Jesus and uphold him – just for a change!

Prayer Group/Lenten Bible Study We have met at 10.30 each week with prayer for the local community, the church, and any personal requests. The prayer group will continue to meet each Tuesday at 10.15 (slight change of time) and for selected weeks each term it will be followed at 10.30 by Bible Study. We have had a very successful Lenten Study Group following *The Third Day* study by York Publications. Our group has ranged in numbers from 8-12 depending on commitments. We have had lively and thought-provoking discussion each week, but never managed to answer all the questions! Sometimes we drifted off at a tangent, but all found the sessions interesting and informative and a wonderful source of fellowship in Christ.

Our final session on Tuesday March 20th was an opportunity to summarise the studies, comment on the style and usefulness of the study and meet and have coffee and cake in the Café at SCC. The group has decided to continue with a further study in the second school term with much discussion about what topics we would like to look at and study further. We hope to make the study group a regular activity with studies of 5-6 weeks each school term.

Fellowship We celebrated Mothering Sunday with Simnel Cake beautifully made and decorated by Lyn Hann, and small prayer cards, given out by the young people in our congregation. Special prayers were said for the day, again led by our young people. Our meeting in

Clive Auricht

The son of an Anglican priest, Canon Ernst Auricht, Clive trained as a doctor, and visited PNG as a fourth-year medical student. This awakened in him a deep affection for the people and love of the country, and he worked in PNG for various periods from 1956 until 1963. He wrote of his experiences in his book Medicine Beyond Kokoda (2011).



Returning to Australia with his young family in 1964, he worked at the "Sturt Clinic" in Mitcham, then moved to Elliston and later Cleve for many years as a GP. On retirement from full-time practice he was involved in rural training for GPs, and in 2002 he was awarded an OAM for services to Medical Records and Rural Medicine.

He and Helen moved to McLaren Vale in the 1990s. For the past few months they have lived at Kalyra.



Gordon Burnard

Gordon enlisted in the Navy at the age of 16½, and after the war took up farming under the Brecon soldier settlement scheme, getting land at Willalooka in 1954. He and Andrew Cheesman and Martin Chittleborough, priests in nearby parishes, ran camps for young people at Salt Creek and in the Flinders Ranges.

In 1977 Gordon and his wife Joan and their four sons moved to Wattle Park. Having holidays at Port Willunga, they loved the place and bought a house, and moved to live here in 1981. Gordon worked for SA Water until he retired.

An enthusiastic supporter of the Aldinga Aero Club, Gordon was himself a pilot, and involved with Angel Flights for non-urgent medical transport. He was a much-loved member of the St Ann's congregation and was skilled at calling "ORDER" in discussions. With failing health, he and Joan moved to Allity in Walkerville in 2015.



We were sad, too, to hear of the illness and recent death of **Gerry Worden.** A member of the Aldinga Bay Baptist congregation, Gerry taught at the Southern Vales Christian College, and was instrumental in establishing and running the Aldinga Advent Pageant with participation from that school. She had a lovely way with the children, and her cheerful involvement and wisdom will be greatly missed.

News from the Western Fleurieu Anglicans Vestry Meeting 2018—our WFA AGM

The meeting was held in St Ann's Room and was chaired by Ted Sandercock. Matters discussed included the following:

Finance Report

The Treasurer congratulated the WFA for achieving an ambitious 2017 target and achieving a surplus. Last year the giving budget was increased by \$10,000. Giving last year actually increased by \$13,000, which is excellent. However, this is not enough for a full stipend and, in fact, a stipend was only paid in full from September after Fr Simon arrived.

She said that it had been impossible to draw up a firm budget for 2018 as there were so many unknown factors. Challenges to be faced include a proposed increase in assessment (to be discussed at Synod) and the fact that assessment is to be levied on all income including Special Purpose Funds (but not including giving to missions). There has been an increase in Insurance from \$6,500 to nearly \$12,000. Possible changes to the ministry team would also affect expenses.

The WFA Combined Budget for 2018 budget was:

Total income	\$208,000	
Total Expenditure	\$238,500	
Deficit for the year	\$29,520	

Margaret concluded her presentation with prayer. She was thanked for her work as Treasurer and applauded for her help to the Diocese in financial matters. Heavenly Father, we acknowledge you are the owner and we are the managers of what you entrust to us. Help us to live for you each day and to generously share the time, talents, treasures, and things you have given us. AMEN.

St Philip & St James' Church

A major issue under discussion at the meeting was the future of the 1852 church of St Philip & St James, Old Noarlunga. Judith Wells presented a report on the church, which had been closed as unsound since 2016.

The SSPJ congregation had explored in detail the options for the church building and for the congregation, identifying these as two separate issues. They had asked some serious questions about themselves as a faith community in Old Noarlunga and what directions they wanted to take.

Given the complexity of the restoration required for the church building, the anticipated cost of its restoration, the lack of financial assets and the small numbers and the age of the congregation, they had decided sadly at their pre-vestry meeting "that St Philip & St James be closed and that the remaining members of the congregation will join other congregations in the Western Fleurieu Anglicans".

This meant that a decision about St Philip & St James' was about preserving a State Heritage building, not about the future of a faith community. With the building deteriorating, action had to be taken urgently to avoid heavy fines and costs, and a decision needed to be made by the whole Western Fleurieu Anglicans Vestry. It was noted that Lucy Drought had been working on a feasibility study for the property, *pro bono*.

The issue was whether members of the WFA would be prepared to undertake a major restoration project for a heritage building (which would not be continuing as a church)?

If not, the matter would be handed to the Diocese, with the questions:

- * Would the diocese be prepared to form a committee to take on this restoration project?
- * Or would it sell the entire site to a developer, with the new owners taking on the restoration responsibilities required by the State Heritage listing. (Curation of the cemetery to go to the local Council.)

The decision of the Vestry was that it would not be possible for the WFA to undertake such a project. A delegation consisting of Judith Wells, Fr Simon, Brian McMillan and Peter Chapman would take the matter to the April Diocesan Council meeting.

The former congregation of SSPJ, and Fr Simon, Brian McMillan, Peter Chapman and all who had been involved in the difficult decision-making and the preparation of the report, were thanked for their work.

The appointment of Wardens was confirmed (see p. 12) and Synod Lay Representatives elected as follows: Lynn King (Christ Church) Brian McMillan (St Ann's), Pam Gowling (St James'), Julia Drought (St Margaret's), Joan Dare (St Nicholas') and Ted Sandercock (St Stephen's) with additional reps Margaret Cale and Joan Rawlings. (Substitutionary Synod Lay Reps Ann Gardiner & Wendy Sandercock).

Notes from the Western Fleurieu Anglicans Council meeting, 20th March

The meeting was held at Christ Church, Yankalilla and was chaired by Ted Sandercock. Some of the representatives met for dinner at the hotel before the meeting. Matters discussed included the following:

- The website: Management has been taken on by Lorraine Nitschke, who is experienced in Wordpress, and will train members from each church on how to manage and update their church news.
- **Service Rosters**: Fr Simon can only get to each church once every five weeks. The only consistent thing he can offer is his presence at St Stephen's on Saturday evenings, the Eucharist at St Margaret's on Wednesday mornings and the Bible Study at SCC. Fr Peter and some licensed clergy are helping out. Fr Peter will be leaving at the end of June. Maintaining three clergy services per Sunday costs \$350 a week in petrol/service costs (\$18,000 a year).
- **St Philip & St James'**: The decision of the Vestry (*p. 9*) was discussed. It was good that the congregation had been able to conclude with dignity and respect for all those involved. Their congregation had planted St Nicholas' and their legacy continues they had passed on the baton. The questions that the SSPJ congregation had asked themselves were ones that each church should consider. Jane & Ted will re-write them. How can we ensure that we pass on the flame?
- Information was being gathered for an updated **contact list and parish directory.** All forms to be handed in (if you haven't done so please speak to your Wardens) before the next WFA meeting (17th April) and the Directories should be out by May.


