Margaret Cameron

The people of the Southern Vales were saddened by the recent death of Margaret Cameron.

Margaret was the wife of Fr George Cameron, priest of the parish of Willunga from 1969 until his death in 1981. Margaret was always a pillar of the parish and continued to live in Willunga until retiring to Life Care in Aldinga.

Margaret served at different times as a Eucharistic Assistant, Lay Reader, Sacristan, Sunday School teacher and Warden. She compiled a scrapbook of the history of the parish, and was involved in work on the parish archives in 2010.

Margaret was a strong supporter of the Mothers' Union from 1969, and served terms as President of the Willunga MU branch, MU Magazine Editor and as Deanery President. Her needlework brought life and colour to the churches of St Stephen's and St Margaret's.

Margaret was born at Merriwa, NSW, where her father was the Rector. She married George, son of the Rector of Mosman. They lived 2½ years in Alice Springs, where their first daughter was born, then moved to Ceduna, where George set up a radio station for BCA and where their other three daughters were born.

When they returned to Adelaide,

George, who had been studying his ThA, completed his studies, while Margaret worked at St Augustine's Kindergarten, Unley, to help support the family. George was priested in 1965, serving at O'Halloran Hill until 1969, when he moved to Willunga.

Margaret worked at the Morphett Vale East kindergarten for 6 years. In 1978 their second daughter, Judith, was tragically killed in a motor vehicle accident, and in 1981, while they were on holiday in NSW, George died of a heart attack. Margaret moved out of the Rectory, to St Jude's Street.



In May, 2009, Margaret was presented with a Mothers' Union Life Vice-President's badge at the Lady Day service at Victor Harbor by MU Chaplain, Bishop Stuart Smith. Margaret joined the MU in 1965 at Crafers, when Winifred Chittleborough "took

her under her wing", and has served terms as President of the MU Willunga Branch and also as Deanery President. In July 2010, Margaret retired as MU Magazine editor.

Hi All

As we explore in our sermons and chats how we can let people in our surrounding communities know about the faith by striking up conversations with them, I thought it would be helpful to show how the young Anglicans in Malaysia are trying to solve this problem.

We know that in Malaysia the Christian church is a minority group and under considerable persecution; however, the young Anglicans in the congregations are actively advertising their faith loud and proud.

They are doing this by wearing T-shirts that advertise I am not suggesting that we all need to design and the faith and a Christian message to let people know that they are proud of their faith and are prepared to share it. They wear the T-shirts when they are on their way to and from church and other mission activities, as well as at other times.



In this way they are encouraging each other to have the courage to share their faith and not to be silent in fear. They are also letting others who are not Christians know that their faith is important enough for them to take the risk of public declaration and so may be worth exploring.

They even have a parish bus with such signs that they use for mission.

Order in Church Grounds

Paragraph 31(c) of the *Parochial Administration*Ordinance 2001 provides that "In addition to those duties prescribed in the *Book of Common Prayer* the duties of Churchwardens shall include the following . . . To maintain order in the Church and Church grounds . . . ".

In accordance with this provision the Wardens, with Peter Chapman, former Warden, attended at St Ann's on 25 June 2018, as a person unknown, apparently in a high vehicle, evidently chose - for unknown reasons - to drive into the Grounds and, instead of passing under the electric cable then strung between the Stobie Pole on South Road and the Church Tower, struck the cable, pulling it out of the wall and the junction box off the Tower and leaving the broken cable - live of course - on the ground adjacent to - but fortunately just not touching - the metal northern boundary fence, and drove away, leaving no clue as to identity.

Business Arising May meeting MAP co-ordinators' meeting to be held Sunday 19 August 2.00 pm at St Ann's.

The second passage of motion for the sale of the church and property of St Phillip and St James was passed. The sale can now proceed after the Registrar has completed the required procedures (sign the declaration and lodge it with the Land Titles Office).

Discussed possible organisations that may be interested. The preference is the to sell both titles as one transaction. Also discussed the church contents: while this is a Diocesan responsibility this matter is to be raised at Diocesan Council by WFA DC members. It was also suggested that items on the SSPJ Inventory List be reviewed so that the WFA Council is aware of significant items. There is a need to check that items moved to St Margaret's have been formally documented.

Website training for representatives of each church has been undertaken by Lorraine Nitschke. The Calendar is a most useful part of the website. Special thanks to Lorraine.

Rostering of weekly services in July was discussed. Simon advised that the ordination of Peter Chapman as Deacon will take place on Saturday, 7 July, 4 pm at Seaford followed by a shared tea. Ministry: This month, Fr Simon was our minister at the first service in the month, and was able to stay and share lunch with us and other members of SEM following the service.

Fr Peter Simmons was with us one last time before he goes on Long Service leave and Fr Ted presided over our regular healing service on the second Sunday.

Youth Worship: This month, our Youth Worship was based on the Gospel Reading in Mark Chapter 4, the theme being, "Do not be afraid."

During the reflection and drama, we were asked to remember the times when we had been afraid or fearful for others, and asked the question "Why
