Sunday 27th January was a great day for the Western Fleurieu Anglicans when Bishop John Ford confirmed six candidates at St Nicholas', Seaford. Two of the young candidates, Isabel Berry and Brenton Jackson, with the Bishop's permission, had planned the service and written some of the prayers, as is their custom on this Sunday of the month, and they assisted the bishop in administering the Eucharist (see below L).

A word from Fr Brenton

As a disciple of Christ we are all compelled to speak up about our faith outside the four walls of our safe space, the church building. We are to take up the challenge that Jesus gave to his disciples when He sent them out to proclaim and preach the word of God. Public speaking can sometimes be daunting, but when we speak about something we believe in, and with God's grace, it can be a very fulfilling experience. I hope the following article based on Luke 21: 5-19 will show that we all have a part to play publicly in our ministry, and need not be afraid to speak about our faith to others.

No doubt about it; there is a lot of scary stuff going on in this passage. We hear the drum beat of conflict on a massive scale, of earthquakes and famines and plagues, of nations and even families at an impossible impasse. People are going to be hauled off by the authorities, and some won't be coming back. It is hard to read this and think that the writer is not speculating about the future but reporting on the present.

And yet let me suggest that for many of God's people the scariest word in Luke's text is not about the world coming apart at the seams— it's the promise that we're going to have to do some public speaking. According to Luke, Jesus puts it like this: when you get hauled off to court for being my disciples, "this will give you an opportunity to testify". As if being arrested and persecuted for your faith weren't enough! Now, he is telling us, we're going to have to make a speech! Not only that, but we're not supposed to use any notes or anything: "Make up your minds not to prepare your defence in advance; for I will give you words and wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to withstand or contradict."

Well, how comforting! There is a famous line attributed to St Francis, the one about "preach the Gospel at all times; if necessary use words". Most people who have heard that seem to like it – and I think one reason is that it gives them an easy out when it comes to talking about their faith. Now I agree, living the Gospel beats talking

about it nine times out of ten. But sometimes, says our text, it is necessary to use words, necessary to counter false words, the beguiling words, the misleading words that rulers of this age would have us believe.

But this doesn't make the idea of needing to testify any easier to digest. On my list of the top ten things I'm most afraid of is— what? Public speaking! It even beats the fear of death. I can well remember my first attempt at public speaking. Butterflies in my stomach, shaking, sweaty palms, jumbled words... I made a mess of it and I thought I would never do it again.

But the reluctance to speak goes way back and is nothing new. We have lots of good company within our faith tradition alone. Paul himself admits to the Corinthians that when he first preached to their community, "I came in weakness and in fear and much trembling. My speech and my proclamation were not with plausible words of wisdom." His ancestor Moses surely would be nodding agreement: "That's what I'm talking about." He himself had made a similar appeal to God when he got his marching orders to ask Pharaoh to "let my people go": "O my Lord, I have never been eloquent, neither in the past or even now that you have spoken to your

servant: but I am slow of speech and slow of tongue."



There are times when God needs us to speak. There are times when God needs us to speak truth to power, and the Gospel of love in the face of prevailing assumptions about the way the world works. After all, imagine if no one spoke for the kingdom. Anna Carter Florence has

written about testimony, "the cost of not speaking is continued captivity" to the lies of this world, no matter how slickly they are packaged.

Marriage Celebration

On 12th January 2019 we took advantage of the flexibility now available for configuration of the space within the Church building, by reason of our new chairs, to set up a local Celebration of the Marriage, which occurred recently in the United States, of Morgan and Jonathan Brown.



When the celebration concluded, we sang "Amazing Grace", and the couple departed to the sound (to which they had entered) of "Simple Gifts".

After their holiday in Asia they will be working on the next vintage in New Zealand. We hope that they will be keeping in touch – and returning in due course.

Simple Gifts

We know this American 19th Century Shaker tune, in the version to which the hymn "I danced in the morning when the world was begun" is sung: the original words, perhaps not so well known here, deserve study. They are:

'Tis a gift to be simple, 'tis a gift to be free; 'tis a gift to come down where you ought to be. And when we find ourselves in the place just right, 'twill be in the valley of love and delight. When true simplicity is gained, to bow and to bend we shan't be ashamed, to turn, turn will be our delight 'til by turning, turning we come 'round right.



They have endeared themselves to us during the times when they have been joining in our life and worship.

On the day, invited in by Father Simon, they processed down the aisle, between tables laden with food, around which the chairs were arranged so everyone faced the aisle (and each other). On the tables were examples, provided by Morgan, of American dishes, such as grits with shrimp, and Ugly Biscuits.

Morgan graciously chose to wear her wedding dress, specially brought from the USA, for us to appreciate. Father Simon began the feast by consecration of bread and wine in which we all shared, before continuing with the other food, and the fortunate among us sampled wine made by Morgan and Jon of grapes they had themselves picked (they had bottled the wine on the previous evening).



Communion In The Round

On 20th January we used the seating configuration from the previous day's celebration, but with the Holy Table in the centre, for Father Simon to celebrate the Eucharist. Again, people could see each other, and the centrality of the Table made even more clear our "single Truth" – "that God was man in Palestine and lives today in Bread and Wine" (from "Christmas" by Sir John Betjeman CBE).


Love, actually ...

News from Delamere and Yankalilla



Christ Church celebrated its first locally led Praise, Prayer and Proclamation Service in January. It was ably led by Belinda Rosser and John Morgan (see above). As a further part of the transition, at our February meeting (14/2/19) we will look at changing the Council

to a Combined Anglican Churches of Yankalilla/Delamere Management Committee. This will mean that we will keep a lot of the day-to-day functions and responsibilities at the local level with oversight from the WFA Council. If this change is approved we would then decide the composition of the Management Committee and have the necessary elections/appointments at our local Vestry Meeting/s.

The Western Fleurieu Anglicans Vestry Meeting will be held at St Margaret's, McLaren Vale at 2 pm on Sunday, March 10th. Wardens and representatives on our various local committees need to get their reports in by 14/2/19.

We have received notification that State Heritage have allocated \$500,000 towards Heritage Grants with a closing date for applications of 15/3/19. The guidelines and application forms can be accessed at https://www.environment.sa.gov.au/topics/heritage/heritage-grants . There has been some discussion about the repainting of the Christ Church roof along with internal plaster and salt damp repairs. This would fit the grant criteria (bear in mind the grants are for up to 50% of the costs involved), but someone needs to take responsibility for the proposal and discuss it with State Heritage and get quotes.

If someone is interested in progressing this, please speak with the Wardens.






