STOP PRESS

Bishop Keith's visit to WFA on 1st
October was an opportunity to talk to representatives from Kalyra about the McLaren Vale site, and to meet with the Futures Group to talk about his vision for the Diocese.

As the meeting was only a few hours

before this issue went to print it has not been possible to do justice to the discussion in this paper—wait for the November issue—but Bishop Keith emphasised the importance of being clear about the "why" question: **why** we do what we do. This will help us to be clear about **what** we need to do, and then **how** to do it, and **where**. We live in changing times, and we need to be flexible, but the unique role of the church, as distinct from other organisations, is to bring people into a personal relationship with Jesus. He said he was really pleased with the way Fr Simon and WFA were tackling hard questions, and looking to the future.

Snippets from Western Fleurieu Anglican Parish Council, 8th September 2020

Update on Yakalilla Rectory: An air conditioner has been installed and it's "working a treat". There are still some odd jobs to be done such as the painting of the sash windows (when the weather is warm enough). Draining is still an issue to be dealt with. The work on the rectory over the past months has had a bonding effect for the parish.

COVID-19: the churches reported on their various ways of handling the morning tea situation. Delamere had had a morning tea, with individual biscuit packets, and observing COVID-safe practices. Yankalilla was about to start, with people bringing their own cups etc St Margaret's had had morning tea, served by one person; byo cups etc with paper cups for those who forgot, and following careful

cleaning and disinfecting procedures.

St Stephen's was about to try offering refreshments. St Nicholas': there was no chance of having morning teas at present; it would be too complicated doing it in quarters shared with the other churches. When the weather warms up they plan to have morning teas outside. Fellowship meetings had resumed, though, and this allowed social interaction.

The Bishop's visit: Bishop Keith would meet with Kalyra representatives at St Margaret's on the 1st October, and after that, would meet with St Ann's representatives and the Futures Group at St Ann's.

Parish picnic – see Br Simon's letter in the September *Grapevine*. It had been a great day, enjoyed by everyone, although the weather had stopped some people from




coming. It was planned that a parish picnic should be held once a year on the nearest fifth Sunday to March. In 2021, the fifth Sundays would be in January (too hot) or May (could be chancy weather).

Report from Diocesan Council: Ted reported on a presentation by Bishop Keith similar to that in the *Murray Anglican* pp 11-12, and Zoom input from Natasha Copley, Human Resources Director at DXC Technology, from Victoria.

Fr Simon said that he thanked God for all members of the parish, and for all the work they do. He encouraged the parish to be responsible for its own decisions, and was glad to see people taking initiatives, with new people taking roles in the worship and gaining confidence. He has two months' leave owing to him, and three months' long service leave. Fr Brenton would be taking two weeks' leave in October. Dn Peter would be relieving as FMC chaplain in September and October. Br Simon would take his services.

Treasurer's Report: Margaret reported that we were doing as well as could be expected. It was encouraging to see that the parish giving was holding up, but fundraising and other means of support had dropped due to COVID-19.

Expenses (other than those relating to the Yankalilla Rectory) were less than those of 2019. We had not been charged for SCC when it was closed. The only costs really up were rectory expenses, since running costs had risen. It was disappointing that Kalyra had not wanted the parish to lease the McLaren Vale rectory, as this would have provided us with an income.





Observations from the churches:

Christ Church: work had been done, benches repaired etc. The pavers were still a matter of concern.

St Margaret's: maintenance was ongoing.

The importance was noted of all churches keeping lawns mowed and grounds looking cared for so that the churches didn't look closed.

St Stephen's: the driveway really needed to be done; bad patches were marked with cones. The cost would be about \$10,000. So far only about \$3000 had been raised. Car parking was bringing in \$20-30 a week.

St Nicholas': the painting had been finished and the carpet was going in; they would soon set up an office again. They would be re-purposing things as they did so. The café was open and doing well; doing a good trade in takeaway roasts on Fridays. The op shop was open on reduced hours. Jobkeeper support was helping for office staff.

News from Yankalilla & Delamere



The fabulous and historic **Yanhalilla Strawberry Fete!**Saturday 21st November, 9.30 am

The fabulous Christ Church Strawberry Fete will be held on November 21st, COVID-19 permitting! Research by current parishioners reveals that our Fete has been running at least since 1867, and we'd like to think that 2020 won't be any different.

The Fete was first called a bazaar, with funds going to the Endowment Fund for Christ Church, and in 1890 it was held as the Annual Easter Festival. In 1904 the date was changed to later in the year and renamed The Strawberry Fete.

Over the years there have been a myriad of activities run at the fete. Sports competitions included obstacle races, skipping and quoits. Postcard and poster competitions were held with school students involved. Concerts including magic lantern views, Maypole dances, comic songs and recitations were held. Tea and cool drinks were available and "useful items" were on sale. One year featured a sit-down dinner for 200 people!

In 2020 our modern Strawberry Fete is a fund-raiser run by the Guild. The Cake Stall and the Plant Stall provide a huge range of produce all cooked and/or grown by our talented parishioners, and there is a bottle stall. Our White Elephant stall continues the tradition of selling "useful items" and you can buy books and jewellery. There will be a sausage sizzle, morning tea with cakes and of course strawberries, with lashings of cream and ice cream.

So please, put this in your diary and come and join in the fun! See you at Christ Church, Yankalilla on November 21st from 9.30.

From St Ann's, Aldinga

Main South Road

St Ann's Church is located on Stonehouse Lane Aldinga, but Main South Road is so close that we cannot be unaffected by its traffic and by changes to its configuration.

On 2nd September 2020 the following was emailed to dpti.communityrelations@sa.gov.au:

When will the Concept Design for Stage 1 of the Main South Road Duplication Project (the duplication of approximately 10 kilometres of Main South Road from south of Griffiths Drive in Seaford to Aldinga) be published?

The DPTI Website says "Planning for Stages 1 and 2 will be complete in mid 2020 at which time the concept design for Stage 1 will be released": it is now September 2020, which is well past "mid 2020".

The question is raised on behalf of the Congregation of St Ann's Anglican Church, Aldinga, which is located adjacent to Main South Road and consequently has a direct interest in knowing what is planned.

A reminder was sent on 22nd September 2020.

On 24th September 2020 the Consultant to the Department of Planning, Transport and Infrastructure, with whom the Parish Council met in 2019 (*see page 9, The Grapevine, August 2019*) responded by telephone, stating that the Concept Plan would be published as soon as the Minister had approved its publication. On being informed that the Bishop is to meet with the Parish Council at St Ann's on 1st October 2020 and desires then to ascertain the effect on the St Ann's property of the relevant content of the Concept Plan, the Consultant indicated that she was well aware of our concerns (having met with the Parish Council in 2019) and that, as soon as practicable after the publication of the Concept Plan, she would arrange to meet again by way of further consultation.




Apart, but together. Sunday 19th September

How a Hymn came into being

The chorus of a well-known hymn (which was the part of that hymn which was written first) is

Trust and obey, for there's no other way to be happy in Jesus, but to trust and obey.

The story behind the creation of the Hymn is told in My Life and the Story of the Gospel Hymn (1907) by Ira D. Sankey.

"From 1885 the composer of the tune, Daniel Brink Towner (Rome, Pennsylvania 1850-1919 Longwood, Missouri) was the soloist, and conductor of a 1,000-voice choir, at meetings of the Evangelist Dwight L Moody.

At one such meeting, in Brockton, Massachusetts, in 1886, Towner was the song leader and he asked people to share how they had been saved.

Several stood and spoke of how certain they felt of their salvation. But then a young man rose and said, 'I am not quite sure, but I am going to trust, and I am going to obey'.

Towner couldn't forget that testimony. He jotted it down and sent it to John [Henry] Sammis [Brooklyn, New York 1846-1919 Los Angeles, California], who had recently left a career in business to enter the [Presbyterian] ministry. Towner asked Sammis to write a hymn text on trusting and obeying . . . later, Towner supplied the tune".

The Hymn was first published in *Hymns Old and New* in 1887. Ultimately it was included in some 397 Hymnals, of which 50 were published after 1979.

In Luke 4: 18-19, Jesus reads from the book of Isaiah: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor.

He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour."






New again!
