

Vestry 2021

Vestry—the Annual General Meeting of the Parish, at which offices are confirmed and/or voted for, and matters raised for discussion.

Vestry this year was held at St Nicholas', Seaford, The Wardens for each church were appointed (see church information on p. 12) and also the Synod representatives: Margaret Cale, Joan Dare, Julia Drought, Alison Dutton, Wendy Sandercock and Lynn King. Our two additional Synod Representatives will be Helen Cook and Brian McMillan.

The Treasurer, Margaret Cale, presented the Financial Report, thanking everyone for their efforts over the past year. It could have been a disaster, she said, but more people had stepped up to direct deposits or managed to get their offering to the church somehow. Overall, total income was down approximately \$15000, mainly due to our inability to fundraise. We benefited from the Government Job Keeper subsidy by about \$36000 over 6 months, but after September the Diocese was no longer eligible for it. Introducing the Budget for 2021 she noted that the sale of St Margaret's site will impact both income and expenditure. We will lose the hall income at St Margaret's of around \$5000 per year but we will only have to pay a nominal lease to Kalyra for use of the Church and we will not be

paying for services, maintenance, or utility costs. We will have 2 stipends to pay for. Assessment remains at 16% on ALL income including from SPF funds.

The budget is usually based on the previous year; however 2020 was not a usual year so planning this year's budget has had its challenges.

Margaret finished her presentation with the Iona Prayer:

Reshape us good Lord, until in generosity, in faith, and in the expectation that the best is yet to come, we are truly Christ-like. Make us passionate followers of Jesus, rather than passive supporters. Make our churches places of radical discipleship and signposts to heaven, then, in us, through us, and if need be, despite us, let your kingdom come.

Amen

Other business on the day included an appeal from Wendy Sandercock for a generous response to the BCA Box Appeal, at this time when funds were needed more than ever.

Joan Dare spoke of the importance of pastoral care, noting that while visiting is done regularly by parishioners, older people particularly like to see a priest sometimes for home communion, either at home or in residential care. Fr Brenton responded that the clergy were happy to visit anyone, but relied on the eyes and ears of lay people to let them know when a visit was needed or requested.

As part of Pastoral Visiting, the guide for a *Sunday Table Service* continues to be distributed to Willunga families and available to visitors on a Saturday morning.



Our services have reflected this in the readings and homilies given each week, from the Baptism of Jesus, His temptation, His promise of eternal life and His command to follow Him and accept the cross.

Mothering Sunday was a lovely service and included the Blessing of the Simnel Cake, generously made by Lynn Hann, and given out – safely pre-packed COVID safe – to all those present and also to those members who were unable to attend.

Regrettably, we are still unable to take communion all together, but the Uniting Church and Church of Christ will join in our Anglican celebration of communion at the end of the service.

Lenten Bible Study The Bible study has been going well, with two groups meeting on Tuesday and Wednesday mornings each week. Approximately 15-18 people have taken part in the study and we hope to do another ecumenical study in the weeks leading up to Pentecost.

Fellowship This year the fellowship decided to try Kytons Fundraising as part of our fundraising for the year. We will have raised nearly \$100 and had the benefit of eating great hot cross buns and lamingtons, while still managing to raise some funds. Thank you to all those who participated in the event.



At our March Meeting we again made Palm Crosses, once we all remembered how to make them. We soon had a whole stack ready to give out to some of the other churches in the parish. It was a great time of fellowship, as usual, with much laughter and frustration as we tried to get our fingers around the palms. (above and p. 14)

Vestry. Our pre-vestry put forward Helen Cook as People's Warden and Helen Cook and Joan Dare as our Synod Representatives. They, along with those elected in the other centres, were all accepted and confirmed at the Annual Vestry Meeting in March.

SEM: Tuesday Night Dinners are now "back on the menu" at SCC with dinners being offered on the 1st and 3rd
Tuesday of each month at 5.30 pm. With the added task of COVID cleaning it was decided to make the community dinner a two--course meal; Mains and Dessert in terms 1 and 4, and Soup and Mains in terms 2 and 3. This makes sure our volunteers can still get home at a reasonable time despite having to clean everything after our patrons leave. COVID restrictions mean we cannot seat more than 40 at present and people cannot attend until after 5 pm.

In May SCC plans to hold a car boot sale (see next page) and St Nicholas fellowship will be having a table to sell good quality used items, preserves and other goodies. More details to come.

The Story of a Hymn

Come, O fount of every blessing tune my heart to sing your grace; streams of mercy never ceasing call for songs of loudest praise.

The author, Robert Robinson (1735-1790), went from Norfolk to London as apprentice to a barber in 1749. In 1752, he attended an evangelical meeting, to heckle the believers and make fun of the proceedings.

The Evangelist was George Whitefield (1714-1770); his text was But when [John the Baptist] saw many of the Pharisees and Sadducees come to his baptism, he said unto them, O generation of vipers, who hath warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Matthew 3:7 KJV. Robinson may have come to scoff, but he remained to pray, and must have continued to do so, as, in 1755, at the age of twenty, he responded to the call he felt three years earlier and became a Christian. Three years later,

when, as a Calvinist Methodist Pastor, he was preparing a sermon for his church in Norfolk, he wrote the hymn.

Calvin Institute of Christian Worship, through hymnary.org tells us that

Using imagery of Christ as the giver of living water and the shepherd gathering his sheep back into the fold, this hymn reminds the worshipper of the ever-bountiful grace of God. Like Robinson, we too are "prone to wander," and are quick to seek redemption through our own power. But God continues to bring us back from our wandering, until, songs of praise on our lips, we dance forever before the mount of His redeeming love.

Professor Wesley Milgate (1916-1999), in Songs of the People of God, tells us that "It has been remarked that Robinson, in becoming successively a Calvinist Methodist, a Congregationalist, a Baptist and at last a Unitarian, gave by his life a poignant irony to the phrase 'prone to wander'".

The melody of *Sharon*, the tune to which this hymn is sung, was composed by William Boyce (1710-1779), first published in A Collection of Melodies in 1765, and harmonised by Samuel Sebastian Wesley (1810-1876). Brian McMillan, Choirmaster


Snippets from WFA Council meeting, 9th March 2021

St Margaret's There are always new thoughts and new questions about Kalyra's taking over St Margaret's, and how this will affect the congregation and the services. A variety of matters—from Easter Services to cleaning arrangements—are regularly being discussed and worked through. It is suggested that one person from St Margaret's be responsible for communicating with Kalyra.

Priest's report: Fr Brenton reported that people were working well together, and big thanks were due to the retired clergy who are helping us out.

Lay Ministry Training: a 12 module curriculum had been put together and approved by the Sydney Diocese. It would come at a minimum cost.

Treasurer's Report (see graphs below). Margaret pointed out that the funding of the St Stephen's driveway is the reason why the deficit is so large at this early stage of the year. St Stephen's will continue to fundraise for this project. Collections for the year have been higher than in 2019 although donations and fundraising have dropped by about \$14000 because of the COVID shutdown and following restrictions. The Op Shop has still managed to bring in funds but money from hall leasing is down. We have been well supported with the Job Keeper payments for part of the year and also the giving from all centres either through Direct Credit or the offering plate.



Outreach: A list had been drawn up of outreach activities in which the parish was engaged, and Council members were encouraged to note further such activities.

From the churches:

Yankalilla had lost two of the "old" families. Their farewell had been attended by about 38 people. They had been pleased to welcome a young woman with a baby, hoping for baptism. There had been a number of Indian people visiting the shrine. The Guild had finally folded, after 120 years of work (see May Grapevine)


St Ann's; A suggestion had been made that the church should hold a Blessing of the Vines for the northern end of the parish.

St James' Delamere was looking forward to celebrating its 150th in May. Due to size they would not be able to host the whole parish on that day.

St Margaret's had had a baptism and a funeral They had started resuming visits to nursing homes. Members of the congregation were getting old and frail but were plodding along.

St Stephen's had had a marriage blessing outside the church, followed by a visit to the Tinkhams' home.

St Nicholas' reported being very busy. Fr Percy's funeral had been taken by Fr Alex Stone, a former priest at St Nicholas'.



A Eucharistic Reflection

Jesus shared his last Passover meal with the disciples just before his arrest. In the Jewish marriage tradition, a Father would hand his son a cup of wine. The son, in turn, would offer it to his future wife and say, "This cup I offer you." In effect he was saying, "I love you and I offer you my life." If she drank of the cup she was accepting his life and giving him her life. In the Passover feast the last cup to be drunk from was called the cup of salvation. It was with this cup Jesus said, "This is my blood of the new covenant." He was saying, "I give you my life, will you give me yours." Then He literally did give His life for us. Now every time we have communion, we are renewing

our love vow to God and in effect we are saying, "I accept your gift, and I give you my life in return. The sacramental power is not in the Priest's prayer, but in the moment when both vows come together to create the most incredible covenantal love relationship. Deacon Pete



News from Christ Church, Yankalilla and St James', Delamere




The 14th of March saw a baptism at Christ Church; the first in about a year.

Of interest is the font that was used. As many will know, Christ Church has a very old font in the entrance but it is not really a convenient place for a christening and is far too heavy to move. An alternative was a small "travelling" font which currently resides in the Yankalilla Museum.





It came from the Salisbury area in England and was brought here by Bishop Short, who used to take it with him, in a leather bag, when he was travelling round his district (which covered most of the Fleurieu Peninsula and Kangaroo Island). It finished its working life at St Thomas' Anglican Church at Inman Valley from 1885-1990. It is quite small, about the size of two wine goblets but totally adequate for the job.

A christening cake, made and decorated by Marlene Stone, was cut in the hall after the service.

Building Stronger Communities Grant

An expression of Interest was place with Rebekha Sharkie for a grant to re-lay the area of paving in the front of Christ Church, from the Dunstall Lights through the lych gates to the Main Road. Unfortunately we were not successful with this application and will now try and find other sources of funding to assist with this project. We have had a quote for \$9000 to do the work.

Heritage Grant application and the Celebration of the 150th Anniversary for St James, Delamere

We have put in a grant application for \$10000 to Heritage SA to do plaster repair work and repainting of most of the internal walls of the church as a major project in our 150th Year.

Plans are underway for St James' 150th anniversary to be celebrated on May 31st. Invitations will be sent to past parishioners and residents of the district and their families who have had connections with the Church, and to past priests.

It is planned to have a service at 11.00 am followed by a light luncheon in the hall. Unfortunately, because of COVID restrictions, we will have to limit numbers, and preference will be given to present and former parishioners. The church is only able to hold 50 people under the restrictions and the hall is the same. We would have liked to invite everyone from the pastoral district but it is not possible unless restrictions are eased.

Family Service 7th March

The Theme for this Family Service was *What does it mean* to be a church?

Julianne Bates delivered the Message and encouraged contributions from those present. One contribution was from a visitor who, driving past, noticed our sign and decided there and then to join us. Introducing herself as "a stranger in your midst" she felt sufficiently comfortable to speak up.

Our Prayer of Approach was

O Lord, clear our hearts and minds of all unrighteous clutter. As we seek to be your Church in our day, drive out all that is unworthy of you. Let us think not of human transactions — our losses and gains — for we gather under the banner of your love that demands no price but our love in return. Help us to sacrifice all that we are to your service, as Jesus sacrificed everything for us.

All together now

In the Christmas 2020 edition of *Country Life*, The Reverend Richard Coles, FRSA FKC, Vicar of St Mary's Finedon, wrote, under the above heading:

As Christmas approaches and we prepare for it as best we can, parish priests face peculiar challenges. What will a carol service without carols be like? Will a socially distanced Nativity lack narrative coherence? Will the astringent odour of sanitizer be off-putting to those receiving Christmas Communion? Will we be even be able to offer Christmas Communion at all? I very much hope that we will. Locked churches — an oxymoron at the best of time but particularly in these — have seemed desperately inadequate.

This year, I will celebrate Midnight Mass alone in a locked church, save for my congregation of two dachshunds. I have become quite used to this in the past year. However, I will place the infant Christ in the manger, light a candle, and think what I always think: *O magnum mysterium*, that God should come to us not in a blaze of power and glory, but as a newborn baby, wrapped in swaddling bands, wreathed in the misted breath of beasts, lit by starlight. And, wherever we are, whoever we are, we are together again, for we are never really apart.

Mothering Sunday 14th March

Our Service began with the presentation by Jo Parsons of a history of Mothering Sunday. Posies of flowers, provided and made by Trish Frith and Barbara Walter, and the traditional Simnel Cake, made by Margaret Cale, were blessed with these words:

Loving God, you uphold us from birth to death, and through all life's changes, with your grace and love. In gratitude for all the love we have received, throughout our lives, may we be always ready to help those who are struggling, to protect the vulnerable, to feed the hungry, and to comfort the broken. Accept our prayers and bless these flowers and cake as symbols of our ongoing love for those to whom we give them, and may we all be blessed in giving and receiving; in Jesus' name. Amen.

Posies and cake were given out at the conclusion of the Service: some were able to be delivered to those unable to attend, who were delighted to receive them.

The Rev'd Philip Carter, a former director of the Julian Centre for Spirituality in the Diocese of Adelaide, led us with anecdotes, poetry and Our Lord's words and actions before we separated to find a quiet spot to reflect on what had been spoken. The cemetery garden proved to be a blessing for the Spirit to speak to us.

One parishioner wrote: "A beautiful oasis of peace in the middle of an extraordinarily busy week - different words for the Thanksgiving Prayer, lovely poems and thoughtful meditations. Others were moved to consider their "mistaken Identity" - the voices we listen to, the "I shoulds and I shouldn'ts", the false expectations we try to live up to and find we can't.

We were asked to consider "Whose is my life?", "To whom do I belong?" not "Who am I?" Jesus exposes who I am! Philip suggested we live in the higher truth which is that Peace and Truth are always in us. The lower truth is that we don't always feel Peace and Love, we are simply to live in the former.

The day finished with an opening for questions and responses to the day, all of which were enlightening, Informative, and a hope for another opportunity to have such a collective experience.

Bible Study

A small group has also met for a five session Bible study by John Birch, "Walking with Jesus". Our journey has raised productive discussion and new insights. Two young parishioners, new to the Bible, have joined us and it has been a delight to see their enquiring minds soak up God's Word.

School visit






