My dear friends,

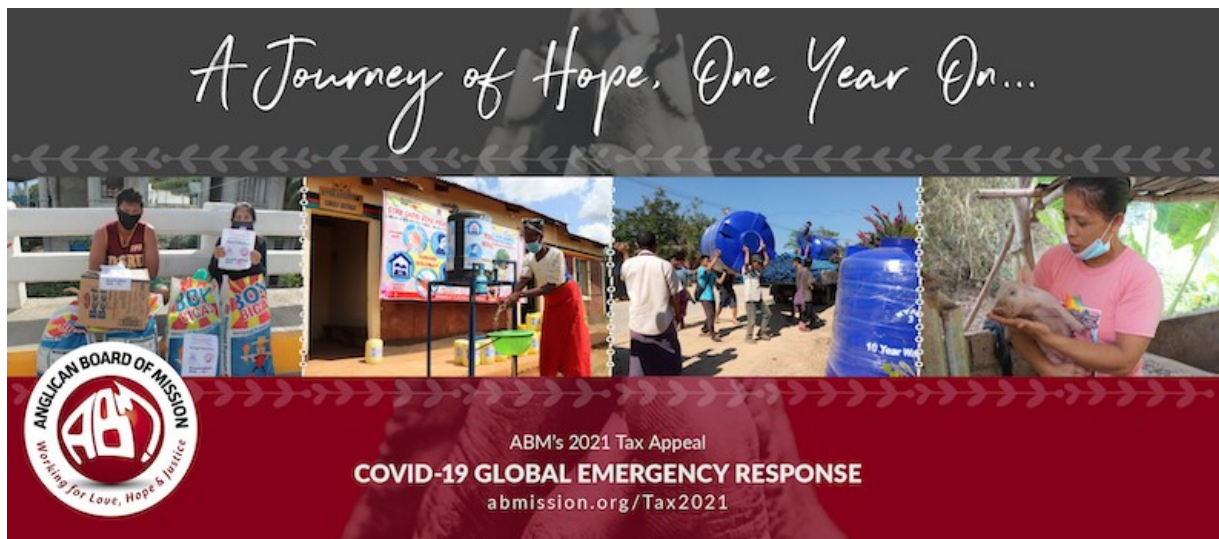

An Ecumenical Prayer Service was held at Seaford Christian Churches on Friday May 21st at 10 am. The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in 2021 was prepared by the Monastic Community of Grandchamp, Switzerland. The theme that was chosen, "Abide in my love and you shall bear much fruit", is based on John 15:1-17 and expresses the Grandchamp Community's vocation to prayer, reconciliation and unity in the church and the human family.

The service was led by Sr Bernie from the Catholic Community with representatives from the Anglican, Lutheran, Uniting and Church of Christ congregations participating in readings and prayers. Helen Cook, Ted and Wendy Sandercock were the readers from the Anglican Community. It was a great reminder of the Love of Jesus when representatives lit a candle from the Christ Candle and then proceeded to light the congregational candles given out to all at as they entered, whilst singing "Christ Be Our Light". A moving time before closing prayers followed by a cuppa with scones, jam and cream and mini fruit cakes.

News from Yankalilla & Delamere

St James' Delamere celebrates the 150th Anniversary of the dedication of the Church.

On Sunday, May 30th, 2021 we celebrated this very significant milestone in the life of our Church. 80 people gathered in St James' on a sunny Sunday with a little bit of the typical Delamere chill in the air. We were blessed to have the Bishop of The Murray, Keith Dalby, join with us to lead the service.

There can be many demands made on Bishops by the Priests who serve under them, and this day was no exception. Not only did Fr Brenton ask the Bishop to preach about the Holy Trinity, but he made him do it from the pulpit which had been moved back to its original position in the front of the church, after having been exiled to the rear of the church for the past 20 years.



Bishop Keith complied with the latter part of the request with some trepidation, and some comments to the effect of "has an OH&S risk assessment been done?"

On a cool autumnal day at the McLaren Vale Information Centre, members and friends of Southern Vales Mothers' Union met for coffee, cake, stimulating discussion and heartfelt fellowship.

Following the established MU service and prayers for others (expressly naming each individual noted as asking for prayer in the current parish pew sheet) President Trish Frith then posed the topic for our consideration - "Facing Change".

From childhood memories it was acknowledged that the support of a stable, loving (and often extended) family frequently helped weather the uncertainty of change: in today's world such family support is not so common.

Thinking about what was needed to address the problem, discussion focused on the mutual benefits of intergenerational relationships, as demonstrated in the recent ABC television programme "Old People's Home For 4 Year Olds", much like the concept of Granny Annie's at St Ann's Aldinga.

Although change is constant and inevitable, the key to responding to change, as well as building resilience, is to "take the fear out of it". As captured in the first letter of John, 4:18 - "There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear". Our job is to love others and help dispel fear by demonstrating confidence in the belief that God has been with us in the past, is with us in our present and will be with us whatever befalls us in the future.

Quoting a line from one popular movie with an Indian backdrop: "It will be all right in the end, and if it is not all right, it's not the end!".

Sunday Afternoon of Song

As Bishop James D. Conley of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Lincoln, Nebraska has stated, " 'He who sings,' said St. Augustine, 'prays twice.' "

The holy Bishop of Hippo meant that singing adds to our praise and worship of God - that our voices are gifts, with which we can make music to the Lord. Sung prayer expresses the joy of the heart, the happiness resulting from one who has encountered Jesus Christ and experienced his love. Sung prayer reminds us of the choirs of heaven, with whom we are called to praise God eternally in heaven.

Accordingly we recently invited worshippers at St Ann's to let us know their favourite hymns. Following analysis of the responses by Lorraine Nitschke, we have devised a program of favourite hymns – *Sunday Afternoon of Song* – to which all are invited, at St Ann's Aldinga, starting at 2.30 pm on Sunday 13th June, with a light supper of soup and crusty bread afterwards.

Baptism

At our Service on 2nd May 2021 we used this Prayer of Approach: Eternal God, we come as one and we come together, to draw from the source of your life-giving love, to reconnect with one another and with you, to listen to your word, to meet you in prayer and praise, and to learn and grow as your faithful disciples – in Jesus' name. Amen. The Reading, from 1 John 4, 7-21 (as presented in *The Message*) included "... Let us continue to love each other since love comes from God. Everyone who loves is born of God and experiences a relationship with God ... "

This was particularly apposite, as Julie and David Farrow had brought their daughter Georgia Grace to be baptised by Deacon Peter Chapman: we were pleased to receive and welcome her into the Church. Trish Frith on behalf of Mothers' Union provided specific words of welcome and a gift. (This Service is also shared on the WebSite under the heading *Around the Traps*.)

A special aspect of the baptism was the fact that little Georgia, who approached the ceremony with great good humour and even enthusiasm, was baptised using the silver cup given to her father David at his baptism. Peter Chapman showed Heather's father's beautiful baptism certificate (much more impressive than that given to Georgia!) and the Bible given to him at his confirmation.

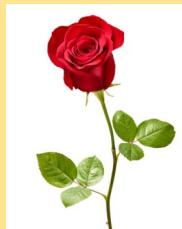
Combined service

Fellowship

The Fellowship has decided to put together a "Welcome Pack". It will include contact details, information about Western Fleurieu Parish as well as SCC and Community Activities. This will be available to new members/visitors to St Nicholas. Prayer Hubs are another initiative that we hope will come to fruition. Small groups of 3-5 people meeting in people's homes to pray either weekly or fortnightly at different times and days, depending on the host. It was with sadness that we learned of the passing of Aileen Treagus, a much loved and valued member of St Nicholas' and Seaford Mission (see p. 11). Her funeral was held at Blackwood Uniting Church on Tuesday 11th May. With COVID restrictions the local Anglican Church was not big enough, so the family decided to move the funeral to the local Uniting Church. Aileen, being very Ecumenical in her thinking, would have approved! Several members from St Nicholas and the wider Parish of Western Fleurieu attended the service.

Seaford Christian Churches.

An Ecumenical Service for the week of Christian Unity was held at SCC on Friday 21st May (see p. 2). It was well attended with representatives from the congregations taking part. For now, our emphasis is on our 25th Anniversary celebrations. There will be a combined Ecumenical Service on the first Sunday in August - to

celebrate our first services in the Centre in 1996. In November there will be a larger event with invited guests from Heads of Church, local denominations, members of parliament and local council, health, and the local community.

Additional help would be appreciated for cleaning, providing flowers, setting up for services and on a Saturday morning, to open the church and talk to visitors.

St Stephen's congregation was represented at St James' 150th by Ted Sandercock. He was accompanied by Wendy as Joan Lunn was unable to go.

Arrangements have been made to deliver and spread slate scree around the church to indicate the edge of the roadway. Then a heritage fence along the western edge of the roadway to create a shaded rest area with seating

I'm off on a challenge and I would love your support!

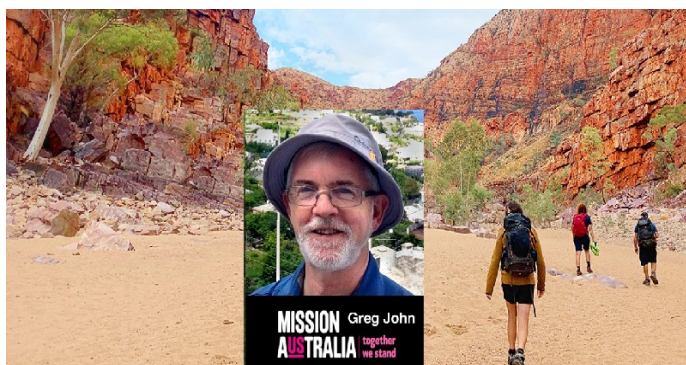

The WFA Council meeting held at Yankalilla on 11th May was largely taken up with discussion on the future of the McLaren Vale site. More on this later.

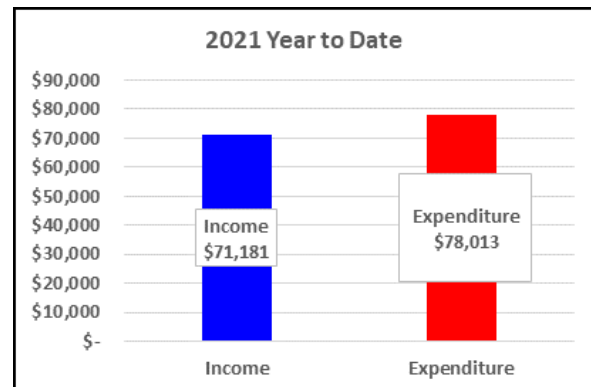
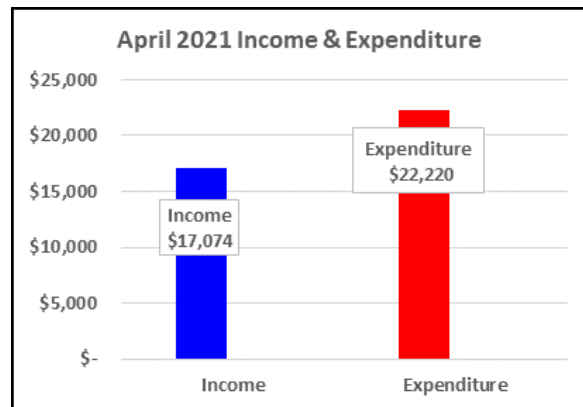
Ted Sandercock reported on the on-line conference he had attended as a member of the Audit and Risk Committee. Many of the buildings in the diocese, they observed, are not fit for purpose. We can expect an increase in insurance costs.

The Secretary reported that Governance training was obligatory for Wardens and Synod representatives. It was noted that there are other issues besides sexual predation which need to be dealt with.

An Events Committee had met to consider possible outreach activities. As there was not time to discuss them at this meeting they were circulated for consideration by Councillors.

The Treasurer reported (see graphs) that giving was up, supplemented by fund-raisers, the Op Shop at Yankalilla, and donations from visitors to the Shrine at Yankalilla. Fr Brenton said that income from the Shrine was going up, and may continue to do so, with the current COVID situation in India.

Members of **Christ Church** were meeting to plan some changes in the services; they would be getting a flat panel screen and using Powerpoint presentations.



St James Delamere reported plans under way for their sesquicentenary. They planned to take funds from a Special Purpose fund to replace the hall stove, and for printing and other sesquicentenary costs.

Aileen Treagus R J P

25th January 1929 – May 1st 2021

It was with sadness that the members of the St Nicholas' congregation learned of the death of Aileen Treagus, loving wife of Ed (deceased); a cherished mother, grandmother and great grandmother.

Aileen was a long time member of St Nicholas' and a foundation member of Seaford Ecumenical Mission until June 2012, when she moved to live at Kalyra Heights Retirement Village, Belair. Those who knew Aileen during her many years at Seaford remember her as a wonderful friend, teacher, mentor and encourager with wisdom and special gifts of caring, compassion and understanding and a wonderful ability to always have the "right" words to say, whatever the occasion. As an active member of St Nicholas' at SEM, she was a Pastoral Assistant, led prayer groups, took Communion to those home-bound, and was a much appreciated guest speaker at women's breakfasts. In her role of Lay Preacher she took Services in various churches in the Southern Vales Parish. A long time member of the Mothers Union, she received her Jubilee Membership in 2011.

Aileen was also active in the local Seaford Community as a member of the Seaford Aboriginal Reconciliation Group, a Christian Counsellor and a member of PROBUS, to mention only three.



In 1995, 52 years after her initial teacher training as a primary teacher, Aileen retired and returned to part time study at Adelaide University to complete her B.A. She majored in Aboriginal history and English. In conjunction with the National Trust of SA,

She went on to record a series of 22 oral history interviews with people who had known Daisy Bates. The subsequent work was published as "We Remember Daisy Bates" and in November 1999, became a distinguished part of an exhibition by the National Trust at Ayers House. This foundational research into Daisy Bates' life and her work among S.A. First Nation peoples made her a much sought after speaker throughout the State. It is a much referenced work by those researching in this much neglected area of Australian history in the early 20th century.

We travelled to the spacious Uniting Church at Blackwood to pay our respects and join with the many who came to thank God for a life that was lived fully for her Lord. She is now fulfilled with her beloved Ed in that Unapproachable Light.

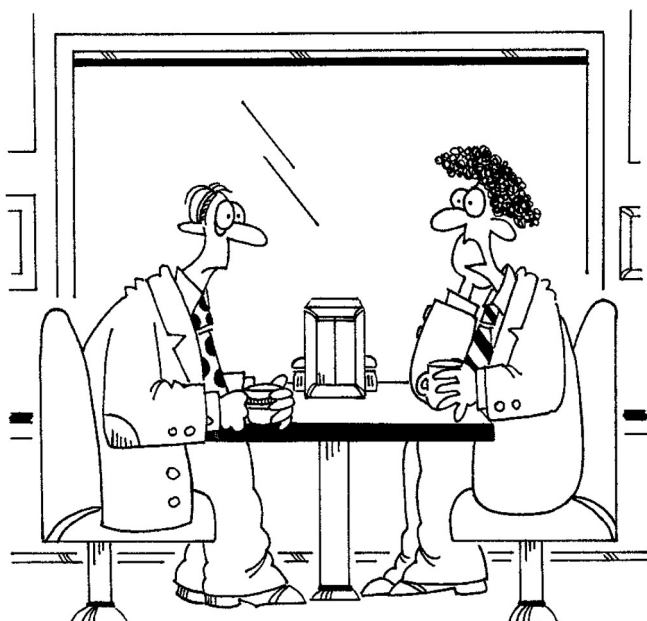

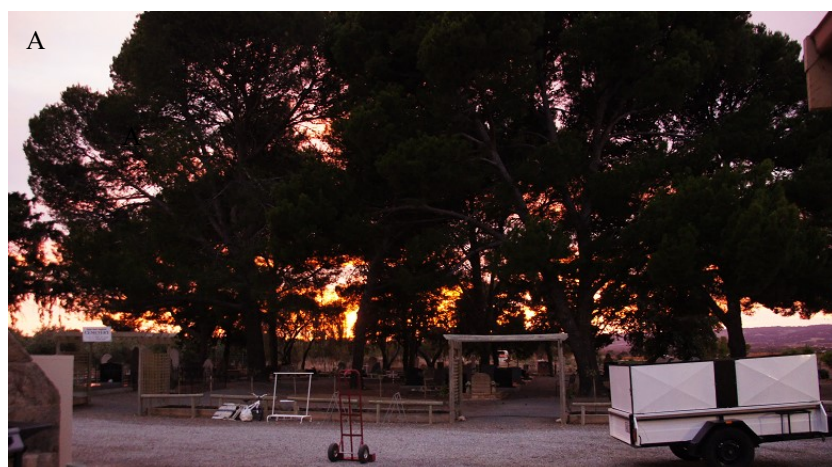

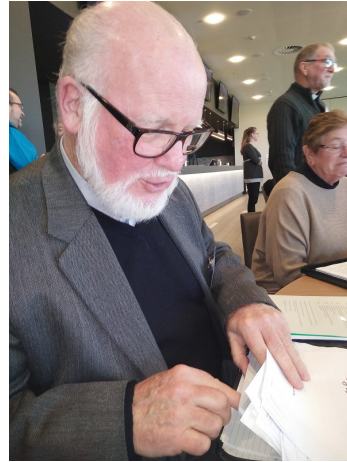
