A word from Brother Simon



Dear Friends,

As you all have been aware, our parish has been working through our parish restructure over the past four years. The Parish map on p. 1 shows that we have a large area to minister amongst, with both urban and rural church communities and a variety of worship traditions.

As our parish council moved forward to develop our plan we chose to:

- Continue with 2 full-time clergy and 6 churches;
- Take advantage of the diversity that our lay services can provide, including committing to supporting and encouraging lay ministry of every kind within the traditions of our church;
- Ensure that we engage with the broader communities in which our churches are located; going out to them, not simply trying to get them to come to us as we have done in the past;
- Expand our ministry by enhancing our digital presence (Web, Pod Casts, On-line congregation etc);
- Manage our assets prudently and responsibly to ensure our urban and rural missional viability;
- Provide a safe pastoral environment for all.

Overall we are endeavouring to develop our missional culture and infrastructure so that we can share the good news, and create a little bit of heaven on earth in our area so it will be a valuable legacy to pass on to the next generation.

With this in mind a motion was presented to Diocesan Council: that Synod be requested to sell the property of St Margaret's of Scotland at 99 Main Road, McLaren Vale, but keeping a peppercorn lease of the church for the next 25 years. The money received was to be used to further the ongoing mission strategy of the Western Fleurieu Anglicans, including the purchase of two residential properties in strategic locations to enhance future growth; to allow for mission growth and/or be assets to fund mission into the future.

It was clear that to sell the property but then not proceed with the proposed investment in two residential assets was not an option for the parish, as this would not assist us to move forward with mission and ministry—in essence the plan was about "future proofing" for the unknown.

We have presented our case over the past two years to our Diocese. However, due to our inability to convince the Diocesan Council to allow us to complete our full restructure plan, we will need to develop our mission with our current resources.

Our mission objectives moving forward will continue as above. As part of our current configuration the two clergy will be based, one at Yankalilla and the other at McLaren Vale. We will therefore not sell the St Margaret's land, and my family and I will resume residency of the McLaren Vale rectory. The house at Seaford Meadows, having greater value for leasing, will be rented out to help cover parish costs.

We are looking forward to sharing the good news together.

Snippets from WFA Council September, 2021

The McLaren Vale site (photo p. 5): A presentation of our Parish Mission Plan had made to Diocesan Council, but with DC unable to accept the WFA plans, the motion requesting the sale of the St Margaret's site was withdrawn (see p. 2). The Bishop had applauded the work done by the WFA in working on and presenting our plan for future directions.

Meanwhile, WFA would continue with its plans for mission. There had been a presentation by the clergy at St Margaret's on Wednesday 8th September, on exploring ministry to retirees.

The Seaford Meadows site, which was a legacy from St Philip & St James', would be let to provide income. In future it could be a possible site for a church plant or other ministry. Br Simons and his family would move back to McLaren Vale. For St Margaret's there was now a certainty, and there was satisfaction that there would be a vicar in the Rectory again.

The Rectory at McLaren Vale would need some serious maintenance as it had not been able to be rented out for three years, and had been understood to be facing eventual demolition. A list needed to be made of maintenance tasks to be undertaken to bring the building to diocesan standards. They would be prioritised and the

work done as quickly as possible so that the Seaford Meadows house could be vacated and rented out.

Brian McMillan: appointed to the Legislation Review Committee.


Lay Education



Music in Church

Charles Moore (Lord Moore of Etchingham), a columnist in The Spectator, writing on reversal of parish decline in England, noted the appointment in the local parish of a young organist: he continued "... A parish that cannot make its own music will tend to be a parish without a song in its heart or a means of bringing new people in. A parish with good music is unlikely to die."

Family Service 5th September

We reflected on the Letter of James from which the New Testament Reading was taken (James 2, 1-17). James refers to what he calls "the Royal Rule of the Scriptures" which, as he says, and as we all well know, is "Love others as you love yourself". James goes on to identify the principle by reference to which that Rule can be operationalised: "Talk and act like a person expecting to be judged by the Rule that sets us free".

And his best advice – which those operating in today's cancel culture, where any tiny deviation from current woke orthodoxy is greeted by screams of "outrage" in and through any and all available media, would be well advised to follow - is Kind mercy wins over harsh judgment every time.

Our Prayer of Confession referenced this:

Forgive us, Lord, for all the times we are too quick to form opinions, too quick to judge others; the times we don't give people the benefit of the doubt; or fail to consider what they might be going through. Open our eyes to see and our ears to listen, as you do.

Mothers' Union



On Monday 6th September members of Mothers Union met again for friendship and fellowship at the McLaren Vale Information Centre.

Prior to the commencement of formal proceedings, we admired the beautiful hand-knitted jumper and beanie contributed to Quickest Warmth by Lucy Creed. Lucy is a tireless worker in creating and donating such items and we are grateful for all she does.

We were pleased to welcome Joan Lunn as a visitor. Joan provided us with some interesting insights into the challenges of being a young mother with a large family in the country years ago and the obstacles she experienced in joining Mothers' Union at that time. It was great to know that she finally joined us, and we have been blessed with her presence.

We expressed gratitude for the opportunity and freedom to pray together for others. We prayed for those who were experiencing domestic violence and homelessness, asking for God's guidance and that each of us is given the confidence to shine a light in, and on, such situations, and courage to provide the help that is needed.

Matters discussed included the importance of family and neighbours as a safety net (or "safety valve") in times of trouble, especially for those with children and those who faced health issues or domestic violence or where family breakdown had left them with no family support at all.

Anne Chittleborough provided a report on MU's collection of donated items during August at St Stephen's for the Quickest Warmth Project. Despite the moving of the market some distance away from St Stephen's, a good range of blankets, pillows, quilts, and other items was delivered to the Anglicare collection centre in Elizabeth. Here packages of items such as bedding, clothes and household needs are made available to those who are homeless or have recently moved into other accommodation due to domestic violence etc.

The issue of the disposal of PFAS contaminated waste was discussed. As this is a matter that will affect the health, safety and wellbeing of children, families and the environment in the future, it was proposed, with the help of Jo Parsons and Trish McDonald, to draft a submission to the Environment, Resources and Development Committee requesting the appropriate and safe disposal of these materials. This is still in progress.

Next meeting - Monday 4th October 2021 at the McLaren Vale Information Centre, and on Monday 18th October there will be a combined meeting with the Southern Suburbs MU group at the McLaren Vale Visitor Centre, 11 am for coffee, followed by lunch.
