## The Blessing of the Fleece: A word from Fr Brenton



What an amazing day!

I didn't go to church; church came to me. Yes, it came to me in a shearing shed at Deep Creek on the Ryans' property, for the Blessing of the Fleece. No nice stone building, shiny brass candlesticks or altar cloth, no

stained glass windows, not a cross anywhere. We meandered along the dusty road in ones and twos a bit like lost sheep (some did get lost) coming to the shelter and safety of the shearing shed. A simple service where we worshipped and gave thanks for God's creation, the men and women who work the land and the care they give their stock, and the abundance of produce. A diverse group of people who heard a message of God's love and forgiveness and welcome. Of a God who loves us so much that even when we stray and scatter and stop following Him, we are forgiven—forgiven 100% and welcomed back into His fold like lost sheep. And we are not the only ones, for He has others not of this fold whom He will

forgive and welcome. We broke bread together, gave thanks, and joined in fellowship of a Christian community.

No matter what we do or how far we stray we can ask and receive God's forgiveness and accept his invitation for a welcome back. In the service there was an assurance of forgiveness including the words, "Extend to us your most gracious forgiveness, absolve us from our sins, release us from the past, renew us for the future and allow us in the power of the Holy Spirit to follow your example and to know the Father's will."

To know the Father's will. To know His comfort, His care, His support, His forgiveness. Alleluia to that! We give thanks to the creator of the universe, and when we stuff up a bit, we know that we can ask for, and receive, forgiveness to carry on.

Church is out there, folks. It is everywhere, wherever you meet and worship God, and what better place to give thanks for all we have than in the beautiful creation He has given us.

The service was led by Fr Brenton Dick with Fr Peter Randle giving the "5 minute, or was it 55 minute?" sermon. God is not like Father Christmas, he said, keeping a checklist to see if we are doing too many bad things to get our Christmas presents. He welcomes us with love and forgiveness. And for some people, the only thing they will know about Jesus, is what they see in us. We are all ambassadors of Jesus' love.

After thanks and prayers for all the blessings we are gifted with, and the story of the eighth day of creation, we then adjourned to the Ryans' beautiful gardens for a BBQ lunch which was cooked by various members of the parish, with a great selection of salads to accompany the meat. These were followed by wonderful desserts supplied by parishioners.

The weather was a bit chilly at first but became very warm later and shade from the various trees around was welcome.

Thanks must go to Rob and Ann Ryan and their son Ben for the use of the property, and to the members of St James' church for managing a beautiful occasion.



## Snippets from WFA Council October, 2021

#### Priest's report:

Br Simon delighted the council by unrolling a chart he had written "in a previous life" representing parish life and all its activities. It is to be hoped that the chart can be circulated to the churches so that everyone can see it. Following the connections on the chart, it was revealed that the whole thing was run by a little old lady on a treadmill! Not to be taken as literal truth, of course... although it could be said that a lot of the load is carried by a few.

The point he was making, though, was that we need to ask ourselves "What are we doing? Why? What is the effect of it?" It shouldn't be just management: we are here to reach into the community to share the Good News of God's Grace with current and future generations.





#### **McLaren Vale Rectory**

Adopting "Plan B" of the parish mission plan (see October *Grapevine* pp. 2 & 4) Br Simon and his family have moved back to the McLaren Vale rectory following the completion of some necessary repairs to make the building structurally sound. Thanks to help from a number of people, considerable costs were saved. The building had fallen into disrepair as it had been unoccupied for two years and was to have been pulled down, and there are still a number of other repair and maintenance tasks to be done to bring it up to Diocesan housing standards. These have been listed, costed and prioritised and can be done over time: however the Vicar General has requested all quotes to be approved by Diocesan Council (November) before works can be done.


**The House at Seaford Meadows** will be put in the hands of a Property Manager to be rented out as soon as it can be arranged, as income from rent will help to meet parish expenses.


#### A word from our Treasurer

Would you please consider the increasing costs of running the Parish and maintaining all our centres, and pray that we can continue to find ways to meet those costs and keep our churches open into the future.



## News from St Ann's, Aldinga

#### **Home Group**

Those attending Home Group have been following in the footsteps of Saint Paul, guided – on screen – by Constantine R. Campbell, Professor of New Testament at Trinity Evangelical Divinity School, Deerfield, Illinois. The series proceeds through the following parts: *Transformed; Called; Mission to the World; Wisdom of the Cross; Christ Above All; Secure in the Storm;* and *Finishing the Race*. The reality of Saint Paul's journeys is brought home more clearly when the places visited by him can be seen and appreciated in the context of his more familiar words.

#### Family Service 3 October 2021

We celebrated God's creation through a series of readings from the *Genesis* creation story, interspersed with hymns, psalms and prayers, including:

Lord of all life, you created the universe, where all living things reflect your glory. You give us this great and beautiful earth, to discover and to cherish. You give us the fish in the sea, the birds of the air, and every plant and tree; the life that sleeps in the winter earth, and awakens again in the spring. You made us all, each wonderfully different, to join with the angels and sing your praise.

The Service concluded with words of Archbishop Desmond Tutu, OMSG CH: "The future of our fragile, beautiful planet home is in our hands. As God's family, we are stewards of God's creation. We can be wantonly irresponsible, or we can be caring and compassionate. God says, 'I have set before you life and death... Choose life.'"

**Quiet Day 11<sup>th</sup> October "**Faith releases in us a power that is beyond us" (Albert Nolan).

Seventeen people attended all or part of the Quiet Day led by Fr Philip Carter on Monday 11<sup>th</sup> October at St Ann's, exploring the themes of Faith, Love and Hope. The gardens of the church and cemetery provided peaceful spots for reflecting in silence on the addresses and on the poetry Fr Philip used to lift our minds to understand better and to delight in our faith. He reminded us of Jesus' use of parables: parables, like poetry, are not bald statements; they challenge the hearer to a response..

# Prayer, Praise and Proclamation Service 17<sup>th</sup> October

The essence of this service, led by Deacon Peter Chapman, was found in words of Jesus from the Gospel of the day (*Mark* 10.35-45):

Whoever wants to be great must become a servant. Whoever wants to be first among you must be your slave. That is what the Son of Man has done: He came to serve, not to be served— and then to give away his life in exchange for many who are held hostage.

Our Prayer of Approach stimulated reflection:
Lord God, we come humbly into your presence this
morning, ready to explore our place in your
community. James and John had very set ideas
about where they wanted to sit in glory. Sometimes we

have very fixed ideas about where we want to sit in this gathering. We like to know our place. Help us to understand that you don't have favourites and we shouldn't either, and that we are a community and we are all in this together.

#### Likewise our Prayer of Confession:

Lord, sometimes we have very set ideas about communities. The ones we belong to. The ones we aspire to. The ones we stay away from. Help us to see as you do: you love every member of every community. We are all one in you. Forgive us when we look down on others, or consider our way alone to be the right one. Help us to work together with you for good, putting ourselves aside and others always first.

Jesus said, "Are you listening to this? Really listening?" (*Matthew* 13.9). Those participating in the weekly meetings of the Study Group, who are working through *A VOICE IN THE WILDERNESS: Listening to the Statement from the Heart* are indeed really listening – in every sense— and responding to material relating to issues presented from a different perspective. One example is the Lord's Prayer from the Diocese of the NT, written in conjunction with the people of Kewulyi:

- Our Father in Heaven
- We want everyone to know that your name is sacred.
- We want you to be boss of all the world.

- The same way heaven is.
- We ask you to give us all we really need today.
- We have done wrong things;
- Please forgive us the same way we forgive other people when they hurt us.
- Save us from things that are too hard for us.
- Save us from everything evil.
- We pray this because you have all the power and you are boss of all things. You are the only true God, now and always.

#### All Saints Day – a Hymn

We celebrate the Feast of All Saints on 7<sup>th</sup> November, in a Family Service commencing with "I sing a song of the saints of God". This was one of the hymns, all with words and music and illustrations by Lesbia Lesley Scott (1898-1986), published in 1929 in her book *Everyday Hymns for Children*. The words of this hymn became popular in the United States, sung to the tune which we sing, *Grand Isle* by the Rev'd John Henry Hopkins (1861-1945). Coincidentally, his uncle, another Rev'd John Henry Hopkins (1820-1891), wrote the words and music of "We Three Kings of Orient are".

The key theme in our hymn is "... the world is bright with the joyous saints who love to do Jesus' will.... and I mean to be one too". There are references to six Saints of olden times: not by name, but by description: "one was a doctor, and one was a queen, and one was a shepherdess on the green" and "one was a soldier, and one was a priest, and one was slain by a fierce wild beast".

Who, then, were the Saints who answer those descriptions?

Saint Luke was "the beloved physician" (*Colossians* 4.14). Saint Margaret of Scotland (1045-1093) was Queen of Scotland while married (1070-1093) to King Malcolm III (1031-1093). Saint Joan of Arc (1412-1431) was tending the sheep of her father when her visions began. Saint Martin of Tours (316-397) was a soldier in the Roman army until his conversion to "a soldier of Christ" who consequently refused to fight for Rome: he became Bishop of Tours in 371. John Donne (1572-1631), Dean of Saint Paul's Cathedral London (1621-1631), is commemorated as priest and poet. Saint Ignatius of Antioch (35-107) was martyred in Rome by being thrown to the lions in the Colosseum.

In our own day, the suggestion is that sainthood is within reach of any Christian who strives to do the right thing, inspired by Matthew 22: 34-40 which, in the New International Version, reads as follows:

Hearing that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees, the Pharisees got together. One of them, an expert in the law, tested him with this question: "Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?" Jesus replied: " 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: "Love your neighbour as yourself." All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments."


