A word from Brother Simon



My dear friends,

This 2021 year in South Australia has not been without difficulties for us all. We now find ourselves at the Advent of Christmas with all that this time represents for us.

Despite the challenges of preparing for the season's events we all, I am sure, experience a pang of nostalgia

from our youth, a reminder of the "magical time" that Christmas memories elicit from our childhood. I hope that was your experience.

Looking back on those moments, the Christmas tree with the blinking lights, all the surprises stored in the bright wrappings under it, and the midnight Christmas Eve service where as young children we were so tired but excited about the new day to start, it was like preparing to enter another world, the world as it's meant to be, a little bit of heaven on earth. This experience helps us to encounter not only the magical but also the mystical element of our faith; what our theologians mean when they are talking about the incarnational theology of Christmas, describing a reality where "God our very foundation is love and God is in Everything".

Howard Thurman (1900–1981), the theologian and mystic, wrote:

The symbol of Christmas—what is it? It is the rainbow arched over the roof of the sky when the clouds are heavy with foreboding. It is the cry of life in the newborn babe when, forced from its mother's nest, it claims its right to live. It is the brooding Presence of the Eternal Spirit making crooked paths straight, rough places smooth, tired hearts refreshed, dead hopes stir with newness of life. It is the promise of tomorrow at the close of every day, the movement of life in defiance of death, and the assurance that love is sturdier than hate, that right is more confident than wrong, that good is more permanent than evil.

Dear friends, I pray that during this Christmas, we each receive the gift of a magical and mystical experience, reminding us that we are beloved, we are part of a good world, and that we will be invigorated by an awareness of the newness of life in God every new day.

Pavers

The saga of the paving at the front of Christ Church is almost over. On Tuesday 23rd Nov. our contractor turned up to start the job, which comprised initially of removing all the pavers between the Dunstall lights and the public footpath. Peter Filsell, who is a member of the local Lions Club, had arranged for some of their members to come and help, and six of them turned up. This, combined with our



own members, gave us a workforce of 10. Working in teams we had over 2,000 pavers lifted, cleaned and stored on pallets in a little over two hours. This saved the contractor about a day's work, which we hope will be reflected in his final bill. Later that afternoon the ground where the pavers had been was cleared of sand and rubbish and they were able to scrape some of the offending tree roots down by a few millimetres ready for the re-laying. This scraping will not damage the trees but will enable a flat surface for the next stage. On Wednesday the ground was filled with sand and the re-laying of the



pavers began. By Thursday afternoon the job was finished.

A letter of thanks has been sent to the Yankalilla Lions Club, as without their help the job would have taken a lot longer.

Snippets from WFA Council


Delamere: The WFA Council meeting was held at Delamere, and a serious matter discussed was the future of the church property, a strategic site at the southern tip of the parish. Delamere was once a thriving area with mining and agriculture, but the population has shrunk enormously, and the church, the cemetery and the grounds and hall are being maintained by a very small congregation. Thought needs to be given to the future of the property and buildings, which have been kept in very good condition.


Members of the Council walked around the site and considered possibilities for the use of the buildings and land. Does it have potential for use as an RV/caravan stopover point? Air B and B? For conference gatherings? Retreats? For exhibitions/concerts/bush dances? Business plans should be considered, exploring options but noting costs (and hidden costs) involved.

The Diocesan Work Health and Safety Programme, which will be trialled soon, will need a person who would be responsible as parish coordinator and Diocesan contact. Anyone interested in volunteering to Parish Council to be that person please contact Ted Sandercock.

Mothers' Union



We have been pleased in recent months to welcome some new people into our Branch, and we look forward to having them MOTHERS UNION officially inducted as members.

One of our Aims as MU members is to support families and children, and at our meetings we have discussed ways we might be able to support young mums in our area. In this context Trish Frith made contact with the Aldinga Beach Children's Centre, which provided her with packages of information for those in danger of gender violence.

At the Jumble Sale at St Ann's, Trish set up an information table using this material, signified by a butterfly cut-out. In doing this she met with a local woman who had recently taken in a homeless mother and child and was glad to get some information about how to help them. In these small ways we can make a difference!

Our last meeting for this year will be our Wave of Prayer Service. The Mothers' Union Wave of Prayer is a special way of connecting MU members with each other around the world through the ministry of prayer. MU members are asked to pray for rostered dioceses at midday local time, so that each MU diocese is prayed for on five consecutive days each year.

The concept of this continuous Wave of Prayer came about after the First World War. During the war, members had been praying for each other as their countries engaged in the conflict in many different areas. When the war finished, MU members decided that they would like to continue with this prayer link-up, and so a roster was put in place, linking a diocese in the UK with other dioceses around the world. As new dioceses join MU they are added to the roster, and the idea of friendship links with the other dioceses prayed for at the same time has grown, along with the prayer. Because of our MU Wave of Prayer, which has been in place for 100 years, since 1921, there has been continuous prayer for MU and its work. As the different time zones move around the world, there is sure to be someone praying for you! What an encouragement - both for us to be aware of this

support, and as an encouragement to make sure that we are part of that prayer by our own regular involvement.

³⁸⁻³⁹ Pilate said, "What is truth?".

We sang something a little out of the ordinary: the traditional English folk carol, "The Truth from above" to the traditional tune collected early in the 20th Century by Ralph Vaughan Williams OM (1872-1958).

Frank urged his guests to reflect on their good fortunes and encouraged them to do something selfless to bring relief and hope to refugees who had fled the horrors of World War II.

Today the Christmas Bowl appeal has grown to become a much-loved ecumenical tradition in which 2,000 churches from 19 denominations and untold numbers of individuals take part each year.
