



Annual General Meeting (Vestry Meeting) 2022

The meeting was held at St Margaret's on Sunday 13th March, attended by 38 parishioners.

In his report to the parish, Br Simon spoke of the number of events of the past year, and the adaptations to our lives and our church as a result of these, saying, "This is a time and place people will talk about – we have lived it". He acknowledged and celebrated the work done in the past twelve months, adding that our challenge is, while keeping our traditional worship, to use it in ways that people of cultures other than ours can relate to.

Over this year we have lost some of the people we loved some of the stalwarts of the church - but we have also gained new people, and our numbers have remained much the same, which means that we have had growth! Much of our ministry has been to retirees, and to nursing homes, sharing a journey of faith with them: parishioners are ministering to each other in a natural way, not just because they are rostered to do so.

Our ministry and that of our priests is to engage with people outside our faith community as well as to those within – our mission is to every single human being - we are to look for and see God in other people. We don't have to defend God – just walk with Him. Our budget is a challenging one, but we must let our budget be our budget, and our mission be our mission.

Ministry (as shown
in the graphs in the

January *Grapevine*, p. 2) Our giving covers our ministry costs, but as the tables show, there are other expenses involved in running a six-church parish. She noted that people question our Diocesan assessments, but in reality these are our contributions to the Diocese for functions they carry out on our behalf so that we don't have to.

She presented the budget for 2022, which was, again, a deficit budget, facing increasing costs and increasing insurance. However, by careful management it was a reduced deficit. She reminded those who give to the church by electronic transfer, that these arrangements sometimes need to be updated.

Margaret was warmly thanked for the huge amount of work she does. She concluded with a prayer for vision:

Disturb us, Lord, when we are too well pleased with ourselves; when our dreams have come true because we have dreamed too little; when we arrived safely because we have sailed too close to shore.

Disturb us, Lord, when with the abundance of the things we possess, we have lost our thirst for the water of life.

Stir us, Lord, to dare more boldly, to venture on wider seas, where storms will show your mastery; where losing sight of land, we shall find the stars. We ask you to push back the horizons of our hopes and to push us into the future in strength, courage, hope and love.

Elections were at a minimum this year as the Bishop had requested that all Wardens hold the same positions for the transition year 2022 if possible. The only position change was that Susan Smith replaced Ted Sandercock as Warden at St Stephen's so Ted could put more time into his Diocesan role as Chair of the WHS and Risk Management Committee. In the current Diocesan "shakeup", previously appointed Priest's Wardens are now called "Local Wardens". People's Wardens will be members of the Parish Council, at which Local Wardens may attend, but not vote. Pamphlets explaining these changes are available from your Wardens. Br Simon has asked John Strachan to be his

Lent has been our focus for this month both in services and with the beginning of our Lenten Bible Study.

Our services: Br Simon has led our services on the first and fourth Sundays, our PPP service on the second Sunday still includes a section on Healing and Anointing led by Fr Ted, and it was lovely to have Dn Peter and Heather join us for our Family Service on the 20th of March. Following permission from Bishop Keith and the blessing of Br Simon, we used the reserved sacrament as part of the Family Service. Our older congregation much

appreciate having communion offered so frequently.

The Fourth Sunday in Lent is, of course, Mothering Sunday, and Helen Cook made a beautiful Simnel Cake for Br Simon to bless and for us all to share at morning tea.



Sunara continues to impress us all with her artwork each week. For Lent she is adding items each week to our Lenten Roadway which will conclude at Easter (for more Lenten

Fellowship meets on the 3rd Friday of each month. This month we met a little later at 2 pm, following Bible Study, to make the Palm Crosses for some Faith Communities in the parish and the SCC. Ted Sandercock kindly furnished us with palm leaves which Jane cut and trimmed ready for the Palm Crosses. A group of ten or so spent time remembering how to make the crosses, some more successfully than others; but with great fellowship, laughter, and no swearing we made 250 crosses to distribute around the parish. Thank you to everyone who assisted in this venture.

Bible Study We are using the ABM book *Repairing the Breach* for our Study this year. There are ten of us in the group, although not all manage to attend each week. Fortunately, each study in the book has a separate topic,

and can be done at home for those who have to miss a week. The reflections and questions that follow often lead to an open and sometimes far-reaching discussion – which of course is the whole point of the study.

Prayer chain and pastoral care Our prayer chain has been active this month with several people being undergoing medical treatments and others awaiting results. For those who are unable to attend our weekly services, the Sunday Table Service and Pew Sheet are delivered or emailed, and regular phone contact is kept up to ensure all are safe and well. We are fortunate to have a dedicated group of people who take on this ministry.

SCC The Ecumenical Services have been planned for the first half of the year. The UC/CC hosted the World Day of Prayer Service that proved to be an enormous success. On Palm Sunday, as usual, we will combine in the Wirra to bless the Palms. Maundy Thursday will see the "Washing of the Feet" Ecumenical Service at 7 pm with Stations of the Cross on Good Friday at 9 am. Upcoming services in the planning are: Taizé Service, Anzac Day Service at 9 am with a cuppa afterwards, and a service during the week of Christian Unity.

The notification of a successful grant application allows the instalment of a purpose-built industrial grade dishwasher in our Town Square Café.

We are truly blessed with our congregation and their willingness to share their time, talents and gifts with us and the wider community at SCC.

News from Yankalilla & Delamere

After much discussion it has been decided that we are to renovate the kitchen in Christ Church hall. It can now be termed a work safety issue, so we have received quotes for the various works involved in replacing the old cupboards on either side of the sink, together with the sink, as well as providing a hand washing basin.

The main challenge, (we don't have problems, only challenges) was that the sink was very low, much lower than the regulation safe working height. Rob and Ann Ryan kindly did the research and came up with some benches which will fit the bill. There are two of them, made of stainless steel, each with a shelf underneath rather than cupboards.

There will be a new sink for food preparation and dish washing as well as a separate smaller sink for hand washing, which is a mandatory requirement in commercial kitchens.

When we started to take out the existing cupboards it was found that these were recessed about two inches below the rest of the floor or possibly the rest of the floor was built up after the cupboards were installed. This has led to a small delay as the section of floor had to be concreted to bring it up to the main floor level. It is a work in progress.

Our team consists of Rob & Ann Ryan, Peter Filsell, Fr and Lyn Dick, and myself (Ron King) getting in the way trying to record the event.

A Men's Shed/5CY combined lunch was held in the



grounds of Christ Church in March, with meat provided by the Men's Shed and salads by the 5CY volunteers. (5CY is a group from the five churches of Yankalilla that provides food and other grocery items to people doing it tough.)

The aim of the lunch was to bring the various families serviced by 5CY together and give them an opportunity to meet each other in a spirit of fellowship. Six families attended and it is hoped the word will spread between them and increase the numbers at the next meeting.

Following on from the Men's Shed/5CY combined lunch it is hoped that we will be able to host more events now that we will have an up to date kitchen. Ron King (More photos in the online supplement p. 17)

were available for all to have!


Chittleborough girls who helped set up, and little 7-yearold Jayden removing millipedes from the hall. Those millipedes didn't stand a chance!

Reflections on Hymns

In the Gospel of the Day for 13th March 2022, being Luke 13:31-35, Jesus, referring to Jerusalem, is recorded as saying "... How often have I desired to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings...".

This concept is reflected in the words "... cover my defenceless head with the shadow of thy wing ..." from *Jesus, lover of my soul*, one of the Hymns sung on 13th March: a hymn described by Professor Wesley Milgate in *Songs of the People of God* as "One of the best loved hymns". First published in 1740 by the Reverend Charles Wesley (1707-1788), the hymn was sung to *Hollingside*, a tune published in 1861 by the Reverend John Bacchus Dykes (1823-1876) – "one of his best tunes", according to Professor Milgate.

Our final hymn was Stand up, stand up for Jesus. "Tell them to stand up for Jesus" was the deathbed message, to the YMCA in Philadelphia, from the Reverend Dudley Atkins Tyng (1825-1858), an abolitionist and Anglican evangelist, unpopular with slave owners. The Reverend George Duffield, a Presbyterian, was inspired by those words to write this hymn, which he read at his friend's funeral, conducted by him on 25th April 1858: Duffield thought that its opening words had a particular importance for Tyng, "as if he had said, 'Stand up for Jesus in the person of the downtrodden slave' (Luke 4:18)". The tune, Morning Light, was initially composed, by George James Webb (1803-1887), who emigrated in 1830 to the United States and was prominent in the musical life of Boston, to accompany other words, but has been associated with this hymn since 1864.

Snippets from WFA Council meeting, March 2022

St James', Delamere

Consideration of potential additional use of St James' Hall is continuing: any change of use would require Council approval and adherence to prescribed standards.



Br Simon spoke of the idea of a community garden at St Margaret's, being one that would create a community social environment run and managed by people outside the church. It would have the potential to make our place look lively, vibrant, used and supported, and may encourage users who are not members of the church to feel comfortable with the place and wish to see the survival of the church as a place that they want to see continue. It would be in line with our missional goals and be of value to our community. It would need to be run by a separate body with the oversight of the Parish Council. Ongoing research was still needed.

COVID regulations were changing. Buffet is now allowed, so morning tea can be by self-service again.


The Secretary reminded Council that any new people in the congregations need to complete a **Parish newsletter/website/directory form** before they can be added to the SMS message list and give permission to have details included in parish roll.


In her report the Treasurer noted that the cost of Insurance, which was calculated and paid by the Diocese and for which the Parish is now required to reimburse the Diocese, was considerably more than budgeted. This prompted discussion of the appropriate valuation, for insurance purposes, of the buildings owned by the Parish, and the nature of the risks for which the Parish is prepared to insure them: Parish Council will consider those matters further. It was suggested that a question on notice should go to the next Synod about the necessity for appropriate and effective training of lay people for the various tasks and responsibilities taken on by them to enable the Parish to function.

St Margaret's was finding that cleaning was becoming a problem as there were not as many able-bodied congregation members as previously. A cleaner was required to do toilets and floors on a twice-monthly basis. Donations from outside groups using the Sunday School Room might cover this.

St Stephen's are planning to apply for a grant under the tree-planting programme funded by the Commonwealth to commemorate the Platinum Jubilee of Her Majesty the Queen: if that application is successful an appropriate variety of trees will be planted in locations suitable for them.




