Fr Brenton writes:

In the last two weeks we have heard a lot about sacrifice.

In Holy Week we walked with Jesus to the cross for God's sacrifice for the whole world. Jesus died for us and went willingly to the cross for

all mankind's redemption and eternal life as He overcame the sting of death. He showed us courage in the face of adversity, He was willing to stand up for what is right in the face of great odds and power-hungry authorities. We see the self-sacrificing love on the cross. We rise above the self-centredness that confines and narrows us, to the outgoing love that which expands our hearts and minds, as our hearts and minds grow to be like the heart and mind of Jesus.

I am writing this after participating in the Anzac Day dawn service in McLaren Vale, and we can see this sacrificial

love as we remember all those who have fallen in war or conflict, giving of themselves in the ultimate sacrifice so others may live in freedom. It is not always easy to stand up for what is right and just, to protect our freedom and way of life. All too often it comes at a cost, a terrible cost. We enjoy freedom today because of the generations who came before, laying that foundation with their very lives. Help us to remember, but save us from ever glorifying the horror and tragedy of war.

This morning I reflected on both sacrifices of the last weeks; Jesus and the Anzacs. May we never lose an overwhelming sense of gratitude for those that pay that ultimate price. "Greater love has no one than this, than to lay down one's life for his friends."

Lest we forget the great lesson of Easter.

Lest we forget the great lesson of the Anzac tradition.

Amen.

The appointment of a Complaints Officer (now to be called a Peace-Making Officer) was deferred.

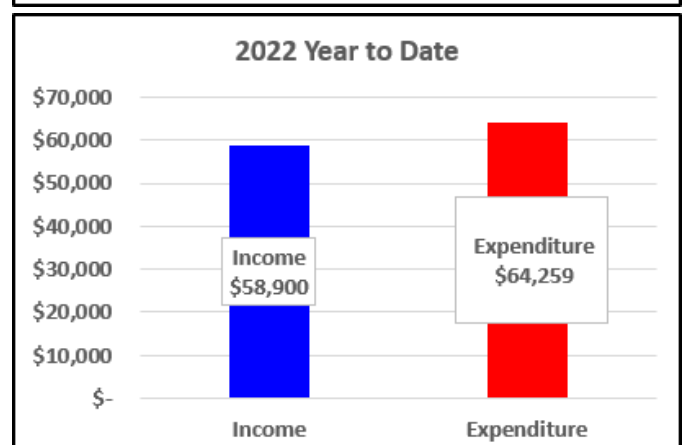
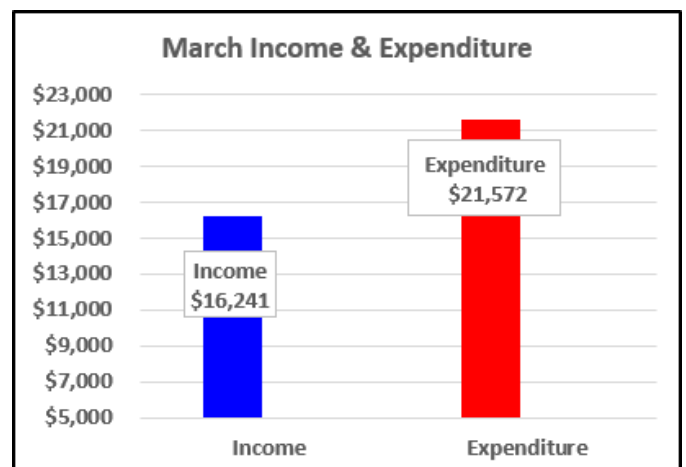
Diocesan Council's April meeting had thanked Brian McMillan and others for their work on the Legislative Review Committee.

Br Simon reflected that we had been working to ensure a safe environment for worship, including different viewpoints and theologies, the importance of listening and working through them without losing what we have here.

The Treasurer reported that income so far this year is down, and expenses higher. Sunday collections were down. Were we losing donations because COVID prevented the passing around of the collection plate? Individual churches could now make their own decisions as to how best to collect people's offerings. It was suggested that people revisit their direct debit giving—has it been updated in the last two years?

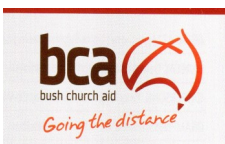
There has been an increase in cost of church insurance.

The highlight at St Stephen's in April was undoubtedly the Easter Vigil held on Holy Saturday, the 16th April. This marked the beginning of Easter. The service, taken by Fr Brenton, was divided into four parts:

1. The Service of Light
2. The Liturgy of the Word
3. The Liturgy of Baptism
4. The Liturgy of the Eucharist.

At the beginning of the service, at 7 pm, the church was in darkness. The service began outside the church and the new fire was lit and blessed. Then the Paschal Candle was prepared with Fr Brenton saying the words: "Christ yesterday and today, the beginning and the end; Alpha; all time belongs to him. To him be glory and power through every age for ever, Amen." So next time we see the Paschal Candle we will be reminded of the words of the markings.

Another highlight of the Vigil Service was that Brian Macmillan played the organ, and then we processed into the darkened church with our candles to continue the Easter Vigil. As the Paschal Candle was placed on its stand, Fr Brenton said "Alleluia, Christ is risen," to which we all replied "He is risen indeed, Alleluia". For the first parts of the service the church was lit by candle light.

We thank Ted Sandercock and Fr Brenton for their detailed preparation for the service, and Wendy Sandercock, Christi Banner and Steven Banner for preparing the church for the service. The Easter flowers were prepared by Trish Frith with roses provided by Mary Johnston. The "makeshift choir" also added to the beauty of the occasion.

At the end of the service there were chocolates and bubbles provided by Wendy Sandercock and Christi Banner, to celebrate the occasion.

This was indeed a glorious beginning to the season of Easter and we hope that you can join us for the Easter Vigil in 2023.

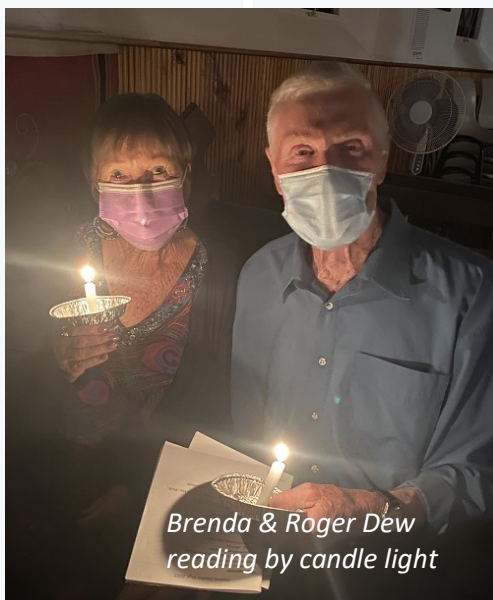

Palm Sunday

On 10th April, led by Brother Simon, we celebrated Palm Sunday, initially with a procession around the exterior of the church, following Shadow the donkey, with the congregation singing, unaccompanied, "All Glory, Praise and Honour" by Theodulph of Orleans (750-821).

As the Minutes of the April Meeting of the Friends of St Ann's note, it is a special feature of our Palm Sunday celebrations that there are people outside our usual worshipping community who are interested in making it happen: Jim Lekkas provides Shadow, and Burda Sanders brings her to us, the Aldinga Central shopping Centre Manager, Charlotte, allows the cutting of palms, Michael the shopping centre cleaner stopped for a long conversation about it last year – and this year we had a lot of help with the palms from the Six Brothers. We celebrate this support.

Good Friday

On 15th April, again led by Brother Simon, with Bill Cale as Crucifer, we followed the Stations of the Cross in the grounds of the church and in the cemetery, finishing in the church. This year we used the version created in 2004 by Ruth Burgess and Chris Polhill and published by Wild Goose Publications, the publishing division of the Iona Community. At each Station there was the Adoration, the Reading (by an individual reader), a Reflection (read by all together), a Prayer (by Brother Simon) and the Chorus "Jesus remember me when you come into your Kingdom" sung by all to the sound of Julia Drought on the Tenor Recorder. As the Minutes of the April 2022 Meeting of the Friends of St Ann's record, it was a wonderful service of Stations of the Cross, and we were fortunate in the weather. There was a lot of good feedback on the words of the Stations – short scriptures, and the commentary, said together. The words, the music and the atmosphere really came together. It was good to have Julia Drought's accompaniment on the recorder outdoors. In spite of the noise of the traffic at the front of the church, it had been important to have the last Stations there, where they could be seen from the road. Br Simon's concluding The service by removing his chasuble and stole and laying them down on the cross, was very moving.



Easter Day

On 17th April, again led by Brother Simon, we celebrated the Resurrection. As recorded in the minutes of the Friends of St Ann's, it was a beautiful service, with a wonderful atmosphere. Arrangements for the service being shared with the "overflow" in the Room worked well, even though it hadn't been possible to film

the service in the church. Thanks for all the work that was involved. Br Simon's coming over to the Room for the Asperges helped make a connection between the two parts



of the congregation, and it was good that we all received Communion in the church. Having two good singers in the Room made a huge difference to the hymns – thank you Barb and Bill! The flowers from St Stephen's also made it more special. Numbers at the service were good (100, with 81 communicants) and two new people who came said they had been looking for a church to come to. The Easter bookmark which was handed out had been something people could take away afterwards, and some had taken extra, to give away. The cross, decorated with flowers, was carried out to the street by Mark Elliott and Tristan Simon, to spread the joy of Easter, and an Easter Garden was made by Emma and Izabelle Elliott (*below*).

Family Service

We dedicated our Family Service on 3rd April to those affected by the invasion of Ukraine, so led by Sally Shaw we began with prayer, lamenting the lives lost, and praying comfort for those grieving and those who are afraid. "Hear our longing that leaders and nations will honour the worth of all people by having the courage to resolve conflict through dialogue. May all our human failings be transformed by your wonderful grace and goodness. We ask this in the name of Christ, the author of peace and sustainer of Creation."

In a sense, our theme, *Thankful Living: rejoicing in God's goodness*, might seem inappropriate in that context, but we focussed on the gifts of God, the gifts of others, and the example of Mary's anointing of Jesus (John 12:1-8): Our final hymn, "New every morning is the love", with words by the Reverend John Keble (1792-1866) includes this verse which should give us clear encouragement and guidance: The trivial round, the common task,
will give us all we need to ask:
room to deny ourselves,
a road to bring us daily nearer God.

Family Tea

On 22nd April we gathered for Family Tea, again with smaller numbers. On such occasions there is more of a dinner party atmosphere, as we sit around the table.

Visit to St David's, Burnside

News from Christ Church, Yankalilla



Palm Sunday at Christ Church was quite well attended with several visitors, including a couple from Bendigo who were here on holiday joining us, as well as a lady and her daughter who used to live here and attend Christ Church.

Fr Brenton preached about the entry of Christ into Jerusalem, particularly His humility shown by His riding on a donkey, and the way He treated people.



Maundy Thursday is the service which commemorates the Last Supper and Jesus' washing the feet of his disciples. At the end of the service all linens, hangings, candlesticks and ornaments are silently stripped from the church, designating the desolation and abandonment of the long night in Gethsemane, leaving only an overturned chair and a trailing cloth to signify the fleeing of the disciples (*centre photo*).



For our **Good Friday** service Fr Brenton chose to do the Stations of the Cross. After prayers and a couple of hymns and readings we adjourned to the grounds where the Stations of the Cross, like that above, are displayed. We stopped at all Stations, with those present taking it in turn to read the story on each and to offer a prayer.

It was good to have a small group of pilgrims who were visiting the shrine join us, with two of them participated in the story telling.

And on **Easter Day** we celebrated Jesus' Resurrection. **CHRIST IS RISEN!**



News from St James', Delamere

We continue to have our fortnightly services at Delamere with a regular attendance of between 10-12 people. We were very thankful that Fr Peter Randle was able to take a service for us on Easter Sunday as this was a third Sunday of the month when we would normally not have a service. We were blessed to have our Easter Cross beautifully covered in flowers thanks to the talented "green thumbs" from our congregation (see p. 1).

We were joined by several visitors over the Easter period who enjoyed worshipping with us.

It was nice for members from St James to be able to volunteer their time and skills to assist with the recent upgrade of the kitchen in the Christ Church Hall.

After many years of faithful service, Ann Ryan has reluctantly relinquished her title as a warden at St James. We are very appreciative of what she has done and we trust that she will continue, albeit without a title.

The Future of St James'

Towards the end of last year we started to explore what the future holds for the church, hall and cemetery that are all part of the St James' Delamere property. Over the past 6 months we have explored possible options to utilise our current assets to provide additional income streams which would allow us to stay as a viable centre, e.g. use the grounds for overnight stays for RVs, hire out the hall as a function venue or AirBnB destination. Unfortunately, after several discussions with staff from the Yankalilla Council to see what we would need to do to accommodate any of the proposed ideas, we have resolved not to pursue the concept any further in light of the following:

- The costs of upgrades would be far in excess of the monetary benefits that we may get. We would need to provide a wheelchair accessible toilet to comply with current building codes, and it would entail needing a new septic system which could cost an estimate of between \$50-75,000. There would need to be numerous other modifications to the hall.

- There is no mains water supply to support a large increase in the usage of the premises. We currently have two 4000L rainwater tanks. We have been quoted \$330 for the delivery of 14000L of potable water.

There is a lack of personnel to manage an upgraded facility.

We will now need to explore what other options may be available for us.

Our services : Brother Simon took our first service in April and Fr Ted presided over our Palm Sunday Service. Part of the service included the Litany of the Palms, which took place outside in the Grace garden with all the congregations at SCC taking part. We had a slight hiccup in the fact that the Catholic Priest was delayed because his car became "boxed in" at his first service at Noarlunga! Fortunately Ted stepped in and began the service for us, allowing us all to rejoin our individual congregations and continue with our worship.



The Good Friday Ecumenical Service was organized by the Lutheran Community with all other congregations taking part in the readings and prayers. The Service "Way of the Cross" ran with no added introductions, pauses for readings, reflection and prayer, begun and ended in silence. A very moving service.

Easter Day was a combined service with the UCA and Churches of Christ. A great day of celebration and worship as we came together to light our Pascal Candle and rejoice in the resurrection of our Lord. We all enjoyed hot cross buns, tea, coffee and of course suitable blessed Easter eggs, following the service.

As Bro Simon was unfortunately confined to barracks with COVID following Easter Day, our service on the 24th April was presided over by Fr Ted, with ample assistance from the laity.

On Saturday 23rd April we farewelled Pastor Mark Kaesler, from the Lutheran Community (*suppl. p. 15*). Pastor Mark was diagnosed with Pancreatic Cancer in 2020 and retired

last year. His life was celebrated in song, prayer and some wonderful memories from his family. The full Large Worship Space was a testament to the impact he made and will continue to make in the lives of his family, friends and fellow Christians. He would have been amazed at the number present and would certainly have enjoyed the array of food on offer following the service.

Fellowship We met on the fourth Sunday this month, with Good Friday falling on our usual meeting day. We discussed several pastoral issues and prayers, phone calls or visits to those in need. We discussed possible fundraising ideas along the lines of no bake cake stalls, raffles and a concert later in the year. We also discussed our upcoming 40th anniversary for St Nicholas' – August this year – and the planning for an afternoon of song, memories and food seems the way to go. We are still

waiting on an upgrade to our sound system in the Baptistry and hope this will be completed soon.

Bible Study We completed our Lenten Bible Study, a course of prayer, music and reflection which was enjoyed by all those who attended. We are hoping to hold another study during the next school term. We have been invited to attend the ecumenical study



held fortnightly, on Wednesdays, studying the coming week's Gospel.

Prayer chain and pastoral care We have had a few people away visiting family and friends over Easter and look forward to welcoming them back this week. Fr Ted and several others continue to take communion to those who wish it and others keep in touch by phone or short visits. Our prayer chain is as active as ever and continues to be a blessing to all of us.

SCC There is a **car boot sale** planned for May 14th, 10 till 2 pm with various stalls, Devonshire teas and sausage sizzle on offer. The Café will run a Biggest Morning Tea event in May, and Ecumenical Services are planned for Wed. 1st June at 1.30 pm in the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, and World Refugee Day, Tuesday 21st June at 11.00 am.

We are truly blessed with our congregation and their willingness to share their time, talents and gifts with us and the wider community at SCC.

Who'd like to be the donkey?

The commissioning of the Pastoral Care Workers 2022 was at a service of the

“Connect” church, which shares the Uniting Church building in McLaren Vale. The room was alive with young parents and children. The pastor, Shane Rayner, asked for volunteers to act out the gospel reading for the day – Palm Sunday – Jesus’ entry into Jerusalem. There was some hesitation about volunteering to be Jesus, but when it came to the call for a donkey there was an enthusiastic response. I think there may have been four donkeys escorting Jesus into Jerusalem!

After the play drew to its conclusion, with Jesus overturning the tables and chairs (of the temple) with great enthusiasm, the children were led off for activities in another room, while Ted Sandercock, Secretary of the SVSM Support Group, introduced the PCWs.

The last six months have been “weird” for the schools.

Each of the chaplains spoke of the strange year the teachers had been experiencing, and how particularly difficult it had been. Sue Camac (Willunga Primary) who was unable to be there that day, wrote: “In all my years as a PCW I think this has been the worst term for morale in amongst the staff. The lack of teachers to fill in, sickness, not being able to meet in person in the staff room, students unsettled with changes of relief teachers, are all factors in what has made this term feel like a long term for them.”

Chris Oxenham (Old Noarlunga Primary) was struck by the way the dynamics of the school had changed, with so

many off school from COVID, and Year 7 now moved to High School. For her, the school garden is her office, and the children grow food they can use – the boys like to prove that they can eat the garlic and chillies!

Chrisna van Zyl had just been appointed to the McLaren Flat Primary School but had already been working at Mt Compass. She likes to connect with children by “walk and talk” – laps around the oval. Sometimes the kids come for a lap but want to do as many as nine more laps! “The kids don’t have answers to things the way adults do,” she said. “They don’t have peace. CPS workers stand in the gap and fill in for parents, for churches, for Jesus.”

John Day, the Schools Ministry Group Regional Manager, the “chaplain to the Chaplains”, confirmed the value of the chaplains over the last six months, their hardest first term ever. The PCWs have had more opportunities than ever before to speak into people’s lives. They are “being Jesus” in a practical way, and need our prayer and practical support.

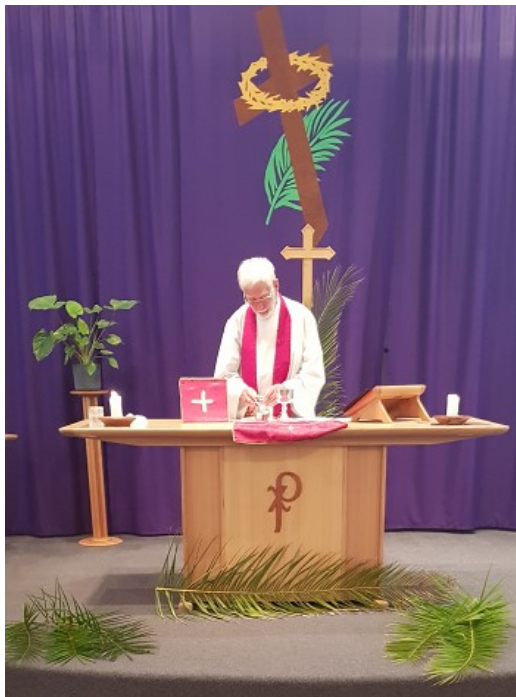

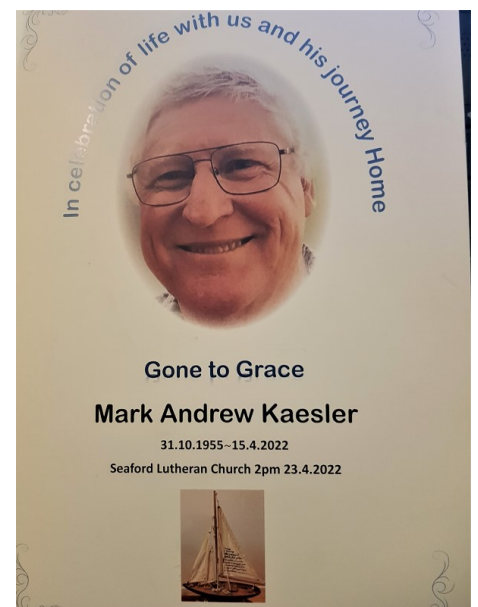
