What do our hymns mean to us?

The eucharistic combined service at St Margaret's on the 29th July was, as Br Simon said, a celebration of our journey of faith, both collectively and individually. With hymns chosen and introduced by members of the congregation, they were an exploration of which hymns touch us particularly, and why. Several speakers paid tribute to hymns they had known in their younger days but found them just as relevant today as they were then.

Judith Wells chose the hymn "St Margaret of Scotland", which was appropriate in the church dedicated to St Margaret. Not her favourite hymn, she said, but her favourite saint—her loving kindness, whose faith in action was an inspiration.

Bill Cale chose "It is well with my soul", written by Horatio Spafford, remembering the tragedies suffered by Spafford, and in spite of all, his steadfast belief in the soul.

"Be still, for the presence of the Lord is moving in this place" was chosen by Julianne Bates and Susan Smith.

Julianne saw it as a recognition of the glory and majesty of God. She would choose it as her funeral hymn, she said, because she would like that to be her legacy to her children. Susan had also chosen that hymn, thinking of how the church of St Philip & St James at Old Noarlunga had seemed to call her back to the church after she had turned away from it in her teenage years.

Brian McMillan chose the hymn by Charles Wesley, "And can it be", the tune of which had resonated with him since attending the Methodist church as a child with his grandmother. The last two verses of the hymn expressed Wesley's personal experience in 1738, "I gave myself to Christ", linking his conversion experience with that of Peter's deliverance from the dungeons (*Acts 12:6-10*).

The final hymn, a "happy hymn", was chosen by Sylvia Francis, "I danced in the morning when the world was begun". She had loved dancing with Harry. Her dancing days were over now, she said, but she still loved music, and we can all dance with the Lord in our hearts. (See also p. 5)

Bishop Keith Dalby's visit to Western Fleurien Anglicans



We were very pleased this month to have a visit from Bishop Keith, which involved times of work and times of relaxation, interaction and friendship.

Arriving on Friday 22nd July, he stayed with Wendy and

Ted Sandercock, and met with the WFA Parish Council at St Ann's from 3-5 pm (see p. 11) before joining the Family Tea that evening (see pp. 6-7).

The next day he participated in the Workplace Health and

Safety Workshop at St Margaret's, led by Ted Sandercock. This was the initial such workshop for the Diocese, for local Wardens, and would be repeated later for other Faith Communities' Wardens. Bp Keith is keen for the Diocese to adopt a culture of health and safety. He participated in the Saturday evening service at St Stephen's, where he was the preacher and enjoyed their regular drinks and nibbles after the service (see p. 4).

From there he moved to the southern end of the parish, staying with Lynn and Ron King and preaching at St James' Delamere (9 am) (see p. 8) and Christ Church, Yankalilla at 11 am.

For over fifty years as a Franciscan priest, Father Richard Rohr worked to reawaken Christians to the radical and transformative message of Jesus. It's a message that is often distorted by culture and even by the Christian tradition itself. Br Simon commended the following reflection of Rohr's for our consideration.

Our religion is not working well: suffering, fear, violence, injustice, greed, and meaninglessness still abound. This is not even close to the reign of God that Jesus taught. And we must be frank: in their behaviour and impact upon the world, Christians are not much different than other people.

the "mind of Christ"; thus, they often reflect the common mind of power, greed, and war instead. The dualistic mind reads reality in simple binaries—good and bad, right and wrong—and thinks itself smart because it chooses one side. This is getting us nowhere.

Perhaps we need to rely on the mind of Christian mystics now to offer any kind of alternative—contemplative or nondual—consciousness. We need practice-based religion that teaches us *how* to connect with the Infinite in ways that actually change us from our finite perspectives.

Time to begin again?

Many Christians are not highly transformed people; instead, they tend to reflect their own culture more than they operate as any kind of leaven within it. I speak especially of American Christians, because I am one. But if you are from another country, look at the Christians where you live and see if the same is true there.

Let's be honest: religion has probably never had such a bad name. Christianity is now seen as "irrelevant" by some, "toxic" by many, and often as a large part of the problem rather than any kind of solution. Some of us are almost embarrassed to say we are Christian because of the negative images that word conjures in others' minds. Young people especially are turned off by how judgmental, exclusionary, impractical, and ineffective Christian culture seems to be.

Most Christians have not been taught how to plug into

Perhaps we must rediscover what St Francis of Assisi (1182–1226) called the "marrow of the Gospel." It's time to rebuild *from the bottom up*. If the foundation is not solid and sure, everything we try to build on top of it is weak and ineffective. Perhaps it's a blessing in disguise that so much is tumbling down around us. It's time to begin again. In the year 1205, Jesus spoke to Francis through the San Damiano cross: "Francis, rebuild my church, for you see it is falling into ruin." If Jesus himself says the church is falling into ruin, I guess we can admit it also without being accused of being negative or unbelieving.

Maybe we have to admit our tradition's faults for anything new and good to happen. Take our journey of faith in God and being reminded that God is in us. Let us never forget that loving God is loving our neighbour as ourselves.

At the beginning of our Family Service on 3rd July Sally Shaw led our Commemoration of NAIDOC Week, which began on that day.


NAIDOC originally stood for "National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee". NAIDOC Week celebrations are held across Australia each July to celebrate the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. NAIDOC is celebrated not only in Indigenous communities, but by Australians from all walks of life.

As well as the usual Acknowledgment of Country we added the Prayer,

Lord, we acknowledge our responsibility to care for and bring healing to Country and our nation. Forgive us for the times when we have failed to do so. Increase our capacity this NAIDOC Week to humble ourselves and listen afresh to truly hear the voices of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

Family Service

For our Family Service on that day, led by Doug Shaw,



the Gospel was from Luke 10:1-24, Lambs in a wolf pack. The address by Jo Parsons combined the themes of giving and receiving blessings, and the recognition of the stories of our Indigenous people, taking an example from the book Our Mob, God's Story.

In our Sending Out Prayer we asked,

Where there is conflict, let there be peace. Where there is fearfulness, let there be peace. Where there is anger, let there be peace. Where there is violence, let there be peace. May God's peace rest on our homes and all who live in them.

After the service we said goodbye (for now) to Jo's husband Neil, who had to return to the UK. We look forward to his return next year.

Owen MD (Colorado) (21 March 1949-15 May 2022) in a Service led by Deacon Peter Chapman. The tribute

provided by her sister and family in America, to whom a recording of the Service has been provided, stated that, after her move to Morphett Vale in 2017, she "began attending St Ann's" and "found a warm, caring community" and "deeply enjoyed the spiritual inspiration and nourishment she experienced in St Ann's peaceful

Prayer, Praise and Proclamation

Lord, send us out into the world, you have equipped us to serve you, alert to whatever nudges us to hear you calling, or whatever points us in your way. Make us bold to resist those who would keep us in the comfortable well-trodden paths, so that – like Mary – we can break free from time to time, to sit at your feet and receive all that you have for us.

The recent PPP conducted by Deacon Peter Chapman was much appreciated, with many favourable comments made: its peaceful, tranquil nature was particularly noted. Anglican Board of Mission (ABM)

Meagan Schwarz, Key Relationships Manager, Anglican Board of Mission (ABM) spoke at our Service on 24th July. Her theme was ABM and Western Fleurieu Anglicans: Partners in God's Mission. As she pointed out, Rowan Williams (Archbishop of Canterbury 2002-2012) had said: "Mission is finding out what God is doing and joining in". We were referred to ABM's 5 Marks of Mission:

- 1. Witness to Christ's saving, forgiving and reconciling love for all people
- 2. Build welcoming, transforming communities of faith
 - 3. Stand in solidarity with the poor and needy
- 4. Challenge violence, injustice and oppression, and work for peace and reconciliation
 - 5. Protect, care for and renew life on our planet.

Meagan reminded us that ABM is the national mission agency for the Anglican Church of Australia, locally and abroad. Anglicans in Development (AID), wholly owned by ABM, operates ABM's sustainable communities program, to deliver, with church partners, community-driven development, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander leadership, and disaster preparedness and response. Examples of this work were given, in

particular in West New Britain.


Her presentation, which was very well received, both informed and challenged us: we plan to review the ABM Project Book 2022 to see how best we can contribute to ABM's work, particularly now

It was understandable that no hotel wanted to take in someone in my situation, as Queensland was at the height of a Covid scare, but as the day wore on and it began to get dark—and after searching all day I still had no place to go—I seriously began to think of a park bench as my likely destination.

In the end, with assistance from Queensland Health, I was able to find a solution, and I concluded my quarantine in comfort. However, it has alerted me to the plight of so many people who are truly homeless and in need of help.

August 1st-7th is Homelessness Week. Through Anglicare, or through Mission Australia, we can help those who are without a roof over their head in this cold weather. AC

During his homily the Bishop said that he enjoyed coming down to St James' Church and he made passing reference to the fact the church was about four times the size of the Diocesan Cathedral in Murray Bridge. This comment was not lost on those present and during the notices it was pointed out that we have been exploring the future of our Church and Hall at Delamere and that we would willingly support exploring the option of the relocation of the Diocesan Cathedral to Delamere. Perhaps, the Warden suggested, the News from St James should be headed:

On the previous day, the WFA had held a Work Safety & Health Workshop which was led by Bishop Keith and Ted Sandercock to discuss what we need to do to identify any risks within our Faith Centres, and also to ensure that we have a safe environment and that our people are adequately informed of their responsibilities and know what to do in case of emergencies. In view of what we had been told at the workshop we decided that the last Hymn on Sunday would be renamed "The Evacuation Hymn" so as we could practice our evacuation procedures. Consequently everyone left the Church in an

orderly fashion and assembled in the Hall for a cuppa with the Bishop to discuss the plans for the consecration of the new Cathedral.

Although many people do not identify as "religious" – it does not mean they do not believe in God, they just don't trust or have faith in the formal church.

The monthly contemplative prayer service is also going well with many attendees who are not part of the regular Sunday worship.

Our services

Our services this month followed the usual pattern, our only glitch being the absence of our pianist, Cathy More, for a couple of weeks, in isolation with COVID! Ann Wilson was also missing in action as she and her family contracted COVID, so we were looking like a sad lot, with the possibility of no music and no birthdays for a few weeks. Fortunately, Ian Richter who plays the organ/piano for us on the first Sunday of the Month, kindly volunteered to play for us on the third Sunday. So really, we only had one week with YouTube Hymns and a said Great Thanksgiving Service.

This month we again had a 5th Sunday with a combined service at SCC with the Uniting Church and Church of Christ congregations. Rev Anne Butler led the service with Fr Ted Newing giving the message on the Old Testament reading from Hosea. Fr Ted presided over the communion service with a choice of grape juice or wine on offer at the Lord's Table. It is always a wonderful experience joining together in worship, with lots of great singing, prayers and reflection points followed by tea, coffee and fellowship in the café.

Fellowship Our meeting in July saw a small group putting together the giving envelopes for the Parish. We will finish them all at our next fellowship meeting in August.

Prayers for Peace We have now held two gatherings with the focus of praying for peace in the world, our community and our family and friends. The group comes together for a quiet time of prayer, reflection, and music, sharing their thoughts and concerns – giving all to God in Prayer. Suggested prayers and focus points for reflection are printed out in a small booklet, which then can be given to others or placed on notice boards as a way of

spreading the word in the wider community.

Prayer chain and pastoral care
Father Ted has been kept busy giving home communion to those who are unable to attend services. We have had quite a few prayers on our prayer chain this month, mostly for those who have contracted and

those recovering from COVID. We sent special prayers for Frank and Sue, St Margaret's congregation, and continue to add them to our prayer points in the weekly pew sheet. Finally, one of our congregation has suffered a broken leg and is slowly mending in Flinders before going into rehab once she is stabilized.

Who was Mary Sumner?

Mary Sumner, the founder of the Mothers' Union, would be amazed to see what had grown from her first nervous meeting at the old Alresford Rectory in 1876 to affirm the importance of motherhood, hoping to call women of all social classes to support one another.

Mothers' Union now has more than four million members in 84 countries. There have been huge changes in society since Mary Sumner's day, and the nature of MU has also changed, but it continues to support family life while at the same time upholding families affected by homelessness, imprisonment and relationship breakdown. With its global membership it is able to maintain a constant chain of intercessions.

Mothers' Union in Australia was formed in 1892; among the first nations to adopt Mothers' Union outside of the UK. Today, by supporting marriage and family life, especially through times of adversity, more than 6,000 members of Mothers' Union in Australia are tackling the most urgent and pressing needs that are challenging relationships and communities.

At the meeting on Monday 1st August it was reported that knitted items had gone to Genesis Pregnancy Support, and a number of articles had been donated to assist homeless people and those in need, and would be forwarded to Anglicare. They included boxes of essential items (toiletries etc) given to Fr Brenton by the McLaren Vale RSL..

As well as the regular worldwide Wave of Prayer, we prayed for the Lambeth Conference which was meeting at that time, and those affected buy the NSW floods.

Anne's recent experience as a traveller in trouble prompted discussion on how such experiences give insights into what others in the community have to deal with on a daily basis, and could provide a basis for further outreach activities.

WFA Council meeting with the Bishop



During the afternoon of 22 July 2022 members of the Parish Council met informally with Bishop Keith at St Ann's Room. He stressed the importance of continuing the discussion on the Ordination of Women, and of being welcoming and inclusive, and he also referred to the continuing necessity to be flexible to the changing environment, as he had said at the June 2022 Synod, but, at the same time, scrupulously to observe accountability for funds and for safety.

The Parish results of the Church Life Survey (of which a copy was later provided to Bishop Keith) and of the 2021 Census (which showed that in Aldinga 70% of respondents ticked the No Religion box –the highest such response in South Australia) were discussed, as was the

effectiveness of the arrangements in the Parish for Lay Led Services and the positive responses to them.

Bishop Keith indicated that he strongly supports a teams-based environment in Parishes, which would enhance the well-being of clergy, and he described the various new measures, such as Supervision, Professional Development and Ministry Review also in that regard. He trusts the Parish Council and Clergy to manage the Parish under and pursuant to the *Parochial Administration Ordinance 2021* and to seek such assistance in that respect as may be needed.


Bishop Keith pointed to the reference, in *Romans 2:4*. to the kindness, forbearance and patience of God, quoted "Do you not realise that God's kindness is meant to lead you to repentance?", and pointed out that repentance leads to a change of direction (which reinforced his earlier reference to flexibility in accordance with his Charge to Synod).

Bishop Keith shared some valuable precepts: "Be kind." "Love as Jesus loved". "God is at work – collaborate with him." "Engage with people where they are at.".

Those attending this meeting were most grateful to have been enabled to engage with our Bishop, to appreciate his support for what we are doing in this Parish, and, in turn, to let him know of our support for him.




