


#### Brother Simon writes:

The WFA Council expressed its great appreciation of Ted Sandercock's work for the parish and for the Council over the years.


The **clergy team** continues to work on ways to help congregations and study groups and where possible minimise the work load for each church. We need to remember that things shouldn't be done just because they've been done before— churches are there for the people, not people for the churches.


Two weeks before **Peter's ordination**, Br Simon would be declaring a *si quis* at St Ann's – a public notice enquiring whether any impediment to the ordination could be alleged against him.

**Pewsheets**: As it seemed that the congregations had different views of what they needed in a pewsheet, it was time to review the format and content of pewsheets.

**St James, Delamere** has one service per fortnight. With a decreased population in the area, and a decreasing congregation with one couple leaving the area, there was continuing concern over the management and use of the church and hall. The repurposing of buildings is something that needs to be discussed at diocesan level.

The Secretary reported that there had been a reversal of onus of proof in matters of **safe ministry**. Instead of it being up to the victim to prove that something happened, it is now up to the institution to prove that everything possible was done to prevent it happening.





**Finance Report** (see graphs). *Our income is not meeting our expenses*. Next year our utilities expenses will be up, and we will not have an income from the Yankalilla op shop.

A good way to support the ministry of our parish is to arrange a weekly offering as a direct debit. This gives a steady commitment to our church even when we miss a Sunday.

# News from St James, Delamere & Christ Church, Yankalilla:

With rain and storms predicted for the 30<sup>th</sup> October, the decision was made that it would not be feasible to go ahead with the Blessing of the Fleece service and barbecue at Delamere. Instead, the parish was invited to Christ Church, Yankalilla, to follow the same service, but minus the shearing. The sheep had been shorn

before the service, we were told, and was represented by a magnificent fleece.

The hymns and the readings (Ezekiel 34: 11-16, 20-24 and John 10:11-16) all carried the theme of God our caring shepherd. Then, focusing on the fleece, a sheep farmer, a sheep farmer's wife and a shearer led the congregation in giving thanks to God for all those who contribute to the industry, from the

workers on the land to the scientists who improve the soils, the stock and the produce. The service was in a church, not in a shearing shed, but the sights and the atmosphere of the shearing shed were

represented in the words of the readers: "the calloused hand, the knotted arm, the sweat of the brow, the skill of the shearer, the classing of wool. The movement of the feeding flocks, the sound of the stockman's horse, the panting of the working dogs, the gleam of freshly shorn sheep".

At our confession, we asked forgiveness for forgetting that this land is the splendour of God, and that we are God's stewards of so great a gift.

The fleece was blessed as part of the Offertory.

Following the service the congregation moved to the hall, using for the first time the second of the two new ramps which, as Fr Peter Randall pointed out, made things much easier for those with a disability. (However, he warned that the new, shiny aluminium surface might be slippery in the rain, and advised everyone to use the black temporary surface on one side. (To have a priest recommend walking "on the dark side" gave rise to hilarity!)

A basket of donuts and buns (Home Grain surplus) added to the lunch, and thanks to people's generosity, \$35 was donated from these to the Christian Care Centre at Aldinga.

Lunch was an opportunity for parishioners from the different churches to meet and relax together. (More photos in the online supplement, p. 14)

# Genesis' generous "Thank you" morning tea, Meliora House

On Tuesday 27<sup>th</sup> September five members of the WFA Mothers' Union visited the newly re-furbished Meliora House at Seaview Downs. Over morning tea its founder, Julie Bednall, told of the amazing and miraculous events which had enabled Genesis to purchase this building, and the work done by Genesis. This includes the eMbrace programme, for which the facility is

ideally suited, providing practical and emotional support to new mothers. It also includes information, understanding and support about the options available to women dealing with unplanned pregnancy, including the eMerge counselling service for those impacted by abortion. Discussing the visit, at the next meeting of the MU, we were reminded of the services which used to be available to new mothers in years past, sometimes offered by the maternity hospital or places such as Torrens House where some of the basic skills of motherhood were taught. In the absence of extended family networks, such as "hands on" grandmothers or other female relatives, and given the haste with which hospitals discharge new mothers from care, it was agreed that Genesis provides an important service, consistent with the origins and objectives of Mothers Union.



At the MU meeting on the 3<sup>rd</sup> October, members were enthralled to hear Queenie's (her formal name,Takoohi, means "Queen") story of her life in Iran as an Armenian Christian, her commitment to her music and to teaching music to children who wanted to learn.

It was sobering to know that following the revolution in Iran, Muslims have been prohibited from learning such music (the Armenian community being completely segregated in their Christian worship and music appreciation) and that any Christian who attempts to convert a Muslim or even teach music can expect to be punished by the State.

As noted in the February 2021 issue of the Grapevine:
"Following the revolution in Iran all forms of music
were banned by the new regime. If anyone was caught
having a piano they were raided, the piano destroyed,
and people punished. Despite this possibility Takoohi
continued to teach her students (including Muslim children), who had to be sworn to secrecy to protect not
only Takoohi but also themselves. The music became
an escape for the young people during the tough
regime".

Jo P read aloud this article in full which detailed Queenie's career as a founder and choir master to a number of Armenian choirs, as well as being a renowned musician - but her preference was always to teach rather than perform. Thereafter, friend Joan Dare kindly took the role of interviewer exploring the challenges of being a Christian in a Muslim country subject to such a regime of intolerance, and Queenie also was happy to answer any questions from around the table.

Queenie expressed her gratitude to God for bringing her to this country and for the friendship she has found here. In particular Queenie's story reminded us of our many blessings in living in such a free society as Australia. 
