On Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> December Bishop Keith Dalby ordained Alison Dutton and Dr Rodney Fopp as Deacons, at Christ Church, Yankalilla.

Deacon Alison will serve as Deacon in our parish as well as continuing her work as a lawyer, and Deacon Rodney, formerly on the staff of St Barnabas' Theological College, Adelaide, has been appointed Director of Formation for the Diocese and will be working with the Bishop and Diocesan Council in identifying, training and deployment of lay and ordained leaders in the Diocese. Dear friends,

It was wonderful to share Christmas worship with you throughout the parish. We had a total of eight services in four days celebrating the incarnation of God in the world. For those of us attending there was comfort in the celebration of our tradi-

tion and perhaps the euphoria of experiencing the gamut of emotions that come from our own Christmas life experiences.

Though it is wonderful to be immersed in this nostalgia it is important for us to explore how we can articulate what this core part of our faith means in—and to—today's world. How do we talk with our friends and family about God coming into the world in human form to dwell amongst us, and being the word made flesh? This is our calling. It is hard but we together with all others of faith are the only ones left to do it. It is up to us!

The work we have to do, however, requires all of us to reflect on our faith and find new words, narratives and symbols to describe it, in ways that current and future generations can relate to. "Where to begin?" I imagine you are asking. Perhaps by reading and pondering on this Christmas reflection from the sisters of the order of Julian of Norwich we may have a guide as to where to start.

"In the beginning there was no Christmas tree. There was no liturgy, no vestments, no candles, no central heating, no cookies, no poinsettias. There were no carols, and nobody was singing Silent Night. There was nothing that could be called Christmas.

There was instead a young mother who had to give birth far from home, without the support of friends or family. It was some men, years later, who perhaps knew nothing of infants, who made the semantic leap that this infant called Holy was the same as that concept of God they called Word: this child and what he became was what God communicated of himself into the world. That Word which nobody would ever have been able to hear is translated into a language of earth.

But he will be heard and understood only to the extent that he is welcomed with quiet and listening hearts. More complicated still for adults, this Word is an infant, with the language of infants. They must learn anew, as those who know nothing, how to be attentive to what he has to tell them; not to surround him with more words but to let this Word speak in their idiom of flesh and blood the vaster things of the spirit that they are called to beyond every word they already know.

And this Word, this Image, is the same poor one, the same infant who comes with nothing and surrenders everything, who, like any infant, will accept only love, and will rearrange everything in them if they want to take Him in. All he asks for is a home with them. This is Christmas."

Travel well my friends, as we discover what it means to respond to our great commission in 2023.

#### News from St Ann's, Aldinga

#### **Advent**

The season of Advent is the season of preparation for the <u>Nativity of Christ</u> at <u>Christmas</u>.

During Advent we anticipate and prepare for what the hymn writers - the Reverend John Lamberton Bell (1949-) and Graham Alexander Maule (1958 - 2019) – summarise thus:

God surprises earth with Heaven Coming here on Christmas Day.

So momentous an event indeed requires preparation: for the physical nativity of Christ in Bethlehem; for the reception of Christ in the heart of the believer; and for His Second Coming – hence the Advent Bible study series, recently completed, and the content of our Advent Services, including the lighting each week of an Advent Candle.

#### **Christmas**

On a perfect, sunny, clear Australian morning we gathered at 9 am on Christmas Day to celebrate Christ's birth. We were outdoors, in the fresh air, in the area between St Ann's Church and Cemetery.

The Nativity story was told again in the words of the carols sung ("Once in Royal David's City", "Away in a Manger", "Joy to the World", "The First Noel", and "Hark the Herald Angels Sing"), of the readings, from Isaiah (read by Michael Drought) and from Luke's Gospel (read by Brother Simon, who conducted the Service), of the intercessions (led by Julia Drought); and the "single truth" — as the Poet Laureate wrote in *Christmas*, "that God was man in Palestine and lives today in Bread and Wine" — was further demonstrated in Communion.

We were pleased to have a congregation of 90, including several children, who received a Christmas activity pack created by Anne Chittleborough. As a practical and amusing response to the breezy outdoor setting, the collection was taken up in Christmas stockings.

#### The King's Speech

King Charles III continued what is now a tradition, initiated by his great-grandfather, continued by his grandfather, and duly observed by his late mother, of making a broadcast on Christmas Day.

Speaking of his mother, the late Queen Elizabeth, King Charles said: "My mother's belief in the power of [the everlasting light in the words of the carol "O Little Town of Bethlehem"] was an essential part of her faith in God, but also her faith in people and it is one which I share with my whole heart.

It is a belief in the extraordinary ability of each person to touch, with goodness and compassion, the lives of others, and to shine a light in the world around them.

This is the essence of our community and the very foundation of our society...

"While Christmas is, of course, a Christian celebration, the power of light overcoming darkness is celebrated across the boundaries of faith and belief.

So, whatever faith you have, or whether you have none, it is in this life-giving light, and with the true humility that lies in our service to others, that I believe we can find hope for the future.

Let us therefore celebrate it together, and cherish it always."

#### **Future Vision Workshop**

On 20<sup>th</sup> December 2022 Bishop Keith issued invitations to the Diocesan *Future Vision Workshop*, to be held at Sevenhill between 2<sup>nd</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> February 2023. In his invitation the Bishop stated that "The Workshop will explore ideas on how we structure our future and provide a framework for discussion at the June 2023 Synod and beyond.". To assist participants – invited members of Diocesan Council from Western Fleurieu Anglicans are Wardens Sue Smith (St Stephen's Willunga) and Brian McMillan (St Ann's Aldinga) - it is expected that local congregations and the Parish Council will take the opportunity during January to express their ideas on these topics: and it is hoped that individual parishioners might consider whether they could assist in the same way, and, if so, to make appropriate direct contact.



#### News from St Nicholas', S.C.C., Seaford

December was a busy month beginning with our Patronal Day on the 4<sup>th</sup> December and ending with a combined service with the Uniting and Church of Christ on Christmas Day, as we celebrated the birth of Jesus.

On our Patronal day, 4<sup>th</sup> December, we welcomed back Gail Barrett from her lonnning trip to the UK, and also welcomed Chris Gunn's granddaughters as visitors for the day. The girls joined in the service by lighting the Advent candles and reading prayers along with Sunara. The St Nicholas' Day service was led by Bro Simon and instead of a sermon we watched a You Tube presentation on the life of St Nicholas, the Real Santa Claus, (https://youtu.be/C1Wq4mb2Sbg)



The documentary tells us that through the centuries many stories and legends have been told of St Nicholas' life and deeds. These accounts have helped us understand his extraordinary character and why he is so beloved and revered as protector and helper of those in need – and why he is the inspiration behind Santa Claus. One story tells of a poor man with three daughters. In those days, a young woman's father had to offer prospective husbands something of value – a dowry. This poor man's daughters, without dowries, were therefore destined to be sold into slavery. Mysteriously, on three different occasions, a bag of gold appeared in their home -providing the needed dowries. The bags of gold, tossed through an open window, are said to have landed in stockings or shoes left before the fire to dry. This led to the custom of children hanging stockings or putting out shoes, eagerly awaiting gifts from Saint Nicholas.

Although we did not put out shoes at our service, we did provide everyone with a bookmark depicting St Nicholas prayer and we all enjoyed a very tasty cake, prepared and decorated for us by Helen Cook (see p. 17, online supplement).

Our Christmas services started with a service of 9 Lessons and Carols on Sunday  $18^{\rm th}$  December. The service began with lighting of the  $4^{\rm th}$  Advent Candle for Love and then

continued uninterrupted as we retold the story from the

fall of Adam to the birth of Jesus and the promise of eternal salvation in Him. Our pianist Cathy More, once again gave a wonderful and moving performance of "Holy Night". We concluded the service by singing the Christmas Blessing.



The service was repeated again in the

afternoon but as an Ecumenical Service, with readers from all four congregations taking part. The service was led by the Lutheran Pastor, Kevin Wood, and the Uniting Church minister Rev Anne Butler read the Gospel and closing prayers.

On Christmas Day our Ecumenical service was at 9 am, an Anglican service to which members from the Uniting and Church of Christ, were invited. A group of over 30 people sang carols and listened to the gospel reading from Luke telling of the birth of Jesus. Rev John Madden from the Uniting Church gave the sermon, giving us "Something to think about" as he spoke about the shepherds, the lowest of the low in Jewish society, who were the first people to hear of Jesus' birth and the first to go and visit the Holy Family. We will do turnabout on New Years' Day, with the Uniting Church leading the service at 10 am, to which we have all been invited. Fr Ted Newing will give the sermon with Rev John Madden leading the service.



Although we still work around the problems of COVID, and people being away or unable to do certain tasks, this year has been a wonderful time of fellowship and worship within our own congregation, our other partners in SCC and within the wider WFA Parish. We are all looking forward to 2023 and the opportunities it will give us all to spread the gospel message in our community.






