Fr Brenton Writes...



From the book: *The Existential Jesus* by John Carroll: "The waning of Christianity as practised in the west is easy to explain. The Christian churches have comprehensively failed in their one central task – to retell their foundation story in a way that

might speak to the times. They have failed at what the ancient Jews called *midrash* – the art of reworking stories so as to bring them up to date. The church is a wooden residue of tired doctrine about a benevolent and omnipotent Lord God up above, the Trinity, the forgiveness of sins, Holy Communion, resurrection from the dead, and so forth – little of which has cogent mainstream resonance today. The churches have not wanted anything to do with Jesus the teacher of the deep truths about human identity. They have made him superficial and boring, a backdrop prop for their own creeds, ritual, and power. This history of denial and falsification has finally caught up with the clerical elites and their priesthoods."

I have just finished the book from which this quote is taken. It is reproduced here to provide you with some time to reflect on how we as a church are bringing the message to those that have no church background – the so called "unchurched" - a term I dislike but I can find no

other way to describe. As we continue to invite other people to attend church for the very first time, I think that we have to consider telling the story "in a way that might speak to the times".

A quote from Bishop Keith - "I want us to be a thriving Diocese, and for that to happen we must have thriving parishes, and for that to happen we have to be bold, and willing to try new things. The world has changed and while the Gospel remains the same, the context in which it is proclaimed will continue to evolve. This does not mean, however, that we allow the culture to shape the Gospel, rather we have to discover how the unchanging Gospel can speak into a society that may no longer want to hear it, or may even be antagonistic to it, even though it needs desperately to hear and respond to its message. We need to take risks, and we may need to challenge certain closely held understandings. I also get that there may be a variety of factors that limit capacity for change, and that is fine. What I simply want you all to know is that as long as you sit within the boundaries you are free to experiment and explore how we might bring the Gospel afresh to our communities".

Try this – read Matthew 5:1-12 NRSV and then read the same passage from *The Message* – that is the story that speaks of the times. I would give any new comer to church two Bibles. One the NRSV and the other – have a guess. Pray, reflect and do. Blessings. *The Vicar*.

Dear friends

As I write this, we still remain firmly entrenched in Epiphanytide, with its lingering memories of a bright star hovering over that sacred place where Mary gave birth to a beautiful baby. As we gradually shift our gaze from star to cross, we are encouraged to start

thinking about our Lenten journey, and what we might be doing at this very special time.

Lent arrives early this year, so we are already starting to prepare for our series of Lenten Studies commencing at 10 am on Wednesday, 22^{nd} February at St Margaret's of Scotland, straight after our lovely 9 am mid-week service, which you are also most welcome to attend. If you can't make it to St Margaret's on Wednesdays, we are also offering studies with our friendly group at St Ann's, Aldinga on Thursdays at 7 pm.

This year, we are excited to be studying the latest offering from ABM, which is a short text titled *The Imaginary Doorway*. This text provides us with seven close studies of some of the great stories of the Gospel, written from the perspectives of the people Jesus

encountered. Along our Lenten journey this year, we meet these characters with fresh eyes – Legion, the haemorrhaging woman, Lazarus and Martha, the woman accused of adultery, Zacchaeus, the paralysed man let down through the roof – and celebrate with those at a post-resurrection BBQ breakfast on the beach.

This series of studies focuses on building an inclusive church where everyone is welcome, and dovetails nicely with Bishop Keith's address to Synod last year which states: "One of the primary tasks of the Diocese is to... make our Parishes safe places for everyone to come and be a part of. For if people do not perceive that we are a safe inclusive place, then they won't come no matter how compelling our evangelistic efforts are."

You are most welcome to attend our Lenten Studies, and I look forward to spending this special time with you in a friendly, safe space where we can share thoughts and ideas and build our faith together.

News from St James, Delamere & Christ Church, Yankalilla

The Future of St James'

In the latter part of 2021 we started to broach the realities of what the future is for the St James' Church, Hall, and Cemetery at Delamere. In November 2021 the WFA Council met at Delamere to look at the site and to discuss how we can utilise this as an asset rather that its being a burden to the Pastoral District. During the early part of 2022 we explored the options that had been suggested, and in April 2022 the following recommendation went to the WFA Council meeting from the Yankalilla/Delamere Management Committee — "That we no longer look at the commercialisation of St James".

The outcomes of all of these discussions are ongoing and we are mindful of the legacy that we have been given by our predecessors and how we can honour that legacy going forward. We have been told by Br Simon and Bishop Keith to "hasten slowly". There may be some merit in this process, but it does not address the fact that our numbers are dwindling and that it is costing us money to maintain the property, and if our numbers dwindle more, this burden will fall onto an extremely small number of people, who may not be willing to carry that burden. During 2023 we will need to examine seriously where we are going and what processes we need to go through.

January Visitors

During January we have had numerous visitors join with us for our Sunday Services.

In early January we had a carload of visitors from St Ann's and St Stephen's join with us for our 11 am Service. This was much appreciated to help swell our numbers. Please be advised that if you wish to come to our 11 am Service on the Second Sunday of the month, you are most welcome to turn up at 10.30 am and join with us for morning tea in the Hall before the Service.



In late January we were joined by the Very Reverend Chris Chataway (Dean of St George's Cathedral, Perth) and his wife Heather who were on holidays at Second Valley. Heather and Chris have been worshipping with us at St James' for many years when they stay at Second Valley, but the last few years with Covid and their move to Perth have made their visits a bit less regular.

Yankalilla and Delamere Anglican Cemeteries

The St James', Delamere cemetery has about 120 leased cemetery plots and 15 plots in their Memorial Garden. The Christ Church, Yankalilla cemetery has about 400 leased cemetery plots and 20 plots in their Memorial Garden. These plots date back to the 1870s. We have maps and records that are up to 150 years old, and these are all paper based. In 2011 the Yankalilla & District Historical Society scanned our records so that we do have a digital copy of the records up until that date. In conjunction with the Anglican Cemeteries at Aldinga and Willunga we have engaged Chronicle Rip Pty Ltd to produce a Digital map and database solution for each of our Cemeteries. This will give us an extra level of safety and preservation of our records and make it easier for our Curators to maintain the records.

The Chronicle software has the added benefit that the public can access the information via their phones and other devices. This will allow the general public to look up information on ancestors buried in the cemeteries, eg plot location, photographs of headstones and inscriptions, and historical information. It can also be used to set up virtual history tours through the Cemetery



of notable pioneers and other people of interest from the area. This would be very useful as we can link it with a lot of the information that has already been collected and collated by the Yankalilla & District Historical Society. The initial cost for our two cemeteries to set up the Chronicle software (and associated databases and maps) is \$3828 plus a further \$300 for signage.

I have recently been notified that we were successful in obtaining a Community Grant of \$2064 from the District Council of Yankalilla to help fund this project. We also contacted the Yankalilla Community Op Shop and they have very generously provided us with the rest of the funds for this project. This means that we do not need to draw on our Cemetery Trust Funds.

A first for Christ Church!

Sunday 15th January was a special day in the history of Christ Church. The service was a Prayer, Praise and Proclamation service led by Belinda Rosser with Deacon Alison Dutton assisting.

Alison, who was deaconed in December, has assisted in several services at Christ Church but this time she had a reserved sacrament which had been blessed earlier in the week, and led us through a short and simple but very moving communion service, and then with Belinda's assistance offered communion to those who wished to partake. Everyone did.

This was Alison's first solo eucharist and it was also the first time a woman has presented communion in Christ Church—which to us is a big deal, and one which will go down in the history of our church.



Our historic font

Some of you may know that the white alabaster font at Christ Church was a gift to us from Salisbury Cathedral in England, brought over by Bishop Short just after Christ Church was built. (There has been discussion in the past about whether the font was gifted to us, or whether Bishop Short purloined it.)

I received a phone call last week from a lady named Louise Fountain. Louise is a tour guide at Salisbury Cathedral and had heard of the font being here, so asked if she and her husband, Sean, could visit and see it whilst on holiday in Australia.

Louise and Sean came to Christ Church for a brief visit and I met with them along with Alison, our deacon. They were delighted to see the font still in place in the church, though a little disappointed, as are we, that it is not used often as we don't have many christenings. They did take a lot of photographs of the font and the church.


Their visit was short as they had to go elsewhere but we have exchanged email addresses and will keep in touch. It would be nice to set up a link with such an established church, over 700 years old.

News from St Ann's, Aldinga:

January has been a relatively quiet reprieve from the hurly burly of the final months of 2022.

It is to our long-terms advantage that Brother Simon's first Message of 2023 gave an insightful outline of the history behind the writings of the Gospels, putting all into the context of the day.

In recent times we have been pleased that the state of health of two of our congregation has improved sufficiently to allow them to attend Services. We have been very pleased to have been able to welcome back Trish McDonald and Barbara Walter, who have been missed.

Family Service

The first Sunday of 2023 was New Year's Day, so in our Family Service, led by Trish Frith, we were asked to consider what it was time to do now. The Message by Julianne Bates used the readings of the day, but much of it came from Ecclesiastes 3:1-8 with the challenge of accepting God in each season and seeking Him in it, whether good or bad.

Challenges were there to be considered too.

"A time to kill and a time to heal".

We know from Jesus' words that it is wrong to kill someone physically or kill them with our words, but what about killing that addiction that harms us, and instead allow healing to come into our lives through prayer, therapy, friends and family help. Being kind to ourselves helps too.

"A time to plant and a time to uproot"

How about planting ideas or activities with our children or grandchildren that create long lasting memories and uprooting the things that invade our wellbeing and peace; the things that are noxious or poisonous in our lives, like holding grudges and nursing hurt.

"A time to build and a time to tear down".

The New Year seems a good opportunity to consider prayerfully where we are as a church community. Are there things we need to stop because they are no longer fruitful? Are there things that have been started that could and should grow, that need to be built up?

Second Sunday after Epiphany

Our Prayer, Praise and Proclamation Service on 15th January was led by Julianne Bates who, with Brian McMillan, delivered the Message. Our theme was "Come, see, tell, repeat", based on John 1:29-42 where Jesus asked Andrew and John, before they could speak to him, that question fundamental to them — and to us all: What are you looking for? and where, after those disciples ended up spending the day with Jesus, Andrew went and found his brother Simon (Peter) and brought him to Jesus.

Having selected several images of Jesus for projection, Julianne asked for consideration of three questions:

- * Which of the images of Jesus are you most drawn to?
- * From that image, if Jesus looked at you right now, and asked you "What are you looking for?", what would you say?
- * Which image would you use to show Jesus to someone else?

Several people contributed to discussing those questions.

Jumble Sale

We are planning to host a Jumble Sale on 18th March. As we know, "jumble sale" means "a sale of miscellaneous, usually second-hand articles, especially for charity"; in contrast to a white elephant sale where "white elephant" means "an item or property that is no longer useful or wanted, especially one that is difficult to maintain or dispose of". Accordingly we are also planning to review our holdings, so as to separate genuine jumble from any white elephant which may have been introduced. If you can help, we'd love to see you at St Ann's. We are planning to hold our Services and Events as usual, despite the effects on access to St Ann's of the duplication of Main South Road.

Lenten Bible Study

We are planning to begin our ABM Lenten Bible Study, on Thursday 23rd February at St Ann's at 7 pm (*see p.2-3*).

Duplication of Main South Road

Works are progressing at the intersection of Main South Road and Port Road, with new arrangements for traffic to and from Aldinga/Port Willunga controlled by temporary traffic lights, and the removal of the Port Road roundabout. In Stonehouse Lane, outside St Ann's Aldinga, excavations for re-alignment of services are being undertaken, resulting, initially, in the closure (Monday to

Vale Anne Lear

Born in Balaklava in 1933, Anne Lear had a quiet, deep faith throughout her life. She was always ready to care for those around her. Where there was a need, she was there, offering good, practical help.

She and Alf moved to Aldinga in the early 1980s, where for many years they ran a deli on the seafront where the Indian restaurant is now. Anne was part of the backbone of St Ann's, back before the Room was built, and always in the centre of activities. She produced countless numbers of sandwiches, sausage rolls, slices, jams, marmalades and chutneys from her kitchen, and provided simnel cakes for Mothering Sunday for many years.

She was a staunch supporter of the Christian Care Centre, OzHarvest and Bush Church Aid. Her home was known as a "drop off centre" for huge amounts of food for

the Care Centre over many years. She felt so blessed in her own life, and she had an open heart, open arms and an open house where all comers were welcome.

On Friday 20th January 2023 she and Alf reached 67 years of a real marriage partnership, and she died on the 27th January. Hers was truly a life to be celebrated.

Then Brother Simon, assisted by Deacon Alison Dutton, led the Eucharist. We concluded with the song "Shalom My Friend" (in Yiddish and English).

Afterwards the buzz of multiple conversations could be heard, inside and outside the Room, over morning tea, before we repaired to the Aldinga Hotel across the road for our Parish Luncheon.
