#### Fr Peter writes



This report is to let you know what I do in the community, including "church" beyond my work as a hospital Chaplain. Ministry life seems to hurtle along with so much to deal with. Still, what I love about the ministry I'm involved in is that more often than not it is actually the greater

community I work with, in the many different ways I am invited to do so.

It has been a hectic couple of weeks, but very fulfilling. Bill Jeanes' requiem funeral on the 13<sup>th</sup> was very special.

Sadly, I have been working with a family that lost a member by suicide and on the 26<sup>th</sup> I held his funeral at Ashbourne. While this was happening, Patrica Ninnes passed away on the 25<sup>th</sup>. She attended St Ann's and St Stephen's in the past until she succumbed to dementia. Heather and I had known Patricia for 20 years. We attended her deathbed to pray and organize with the Nursing Home and Public Trustee about her funeral and burial, as she has no immediate family in Australia.

I attended a conference on compassion in the Medical Health Network. Statistics reveal that compassion reduces blood pressure and heart disease and promotes faster healing. I believe this is true. As Christians we should all practice Christ's compassion for one another. Its just one aspect, but an important one, of having a healthy church, both physically and spiritually.

I have been asked to say an opening prayer and reflection at the opening of the new Aldinga War Memorial on

Remembrance Day. I am now involved with Trish Frith and Anne Chittleborough in the running committee for the day. The old monument, which was previously located outside St Ann's, now has a new home on Port Road, prominent in the community.

On Saturday 21<sup>st</sup> I joined with 70 other bikers to raise money for a rider (Mumbles) who had acquired brain injury due to an accident. Then on the Sunday I was involved in a Mental Health Expo with our local councillor, Lauren Jew, and our Health Minister Chris Picton (who is also a local), at the Moana Park. Six Brothers have been supporting this expo for the last three years.

Six Brothers has loved sharing family tea with St Ann's and even though they hope to move to a new club house soon they intend to continue, as they say, to "Go to Church" on the family tea night. Fr Peter

#### News from Yankalilla & Delamere

#### St James' Cemetery clean-up

We have recently done some major tidy-up work in the St James' cemetery. A dead pencil pine tree was cut down and placed on our bonfire heap. Thanks go to the Ryan family for the use of their tractor and McKenzie Ryan for his assistance. At the same time we were able to spread 12 tonnes of gravel around the carpark and driveway to fill in the areas that had been washed out. The work in the carpark was done just prior to the hall being hired by the Electoral Commission as a Polling Place for the Referendum. The hiring of the hall clashed with the proposed date for a bonfire at Delamere. Due to the impending start of the fire danger season and the rapid drying out of the paddocks around the church it was decided to light up the bonfire anyway, even without a blessing from Fr Brenton. We had a very successful burn, without any major mishaps.

#### **St James Penultimate Service**

It had previously been decided that the final service in current format at St James' would be held on Christmas Eve. At our October Management meeting it was decided that we would like this service to be held at 11am on Sunday, Dec 24<sup>th</sup> followed by a shared lunch in the hall. This time will need to be ratified by the WFA council at their November meeting. There will also need to be decisions made regarding how the building and grounds are maintained (and who will pay these costs) in the period leading up to a final closure of the church.

The Blessing of the Fleece (see p. 1 and photos p. 13-14). The Combined Service in the Ryans' shed at Delamere was a very pleasant day, attended by about 40 people, with Ben Ryan shearing the sheep. The words of the presentation of the gifts at the altar summed up the purpose of the day: "The bread and the wine which we offer to God are symbols of ourselves and our lifestyle. To these we add our monetary gifts representing our earnings from our industry. To these things we add the fleece of a newly shorn sheep, representing as it does the labour of shepherd and shearer, the stockman and the working dog. We also present the stud records representing the skill of the breeder and the research of the scientist." (see photo)

The barbecue to follow was a wonderful chance to relax and enjoy each other's company. Many thanks to the Ryans for their work and their hospitality.

#### News from St Stephen's, Willunga



#### News from St Margaret's, McLaren Vale

Hallo Everyone,

Again a fairly quiet month; however we had some highlights and some lowlights.

Our ministry includes visiting people no longer able to attend church physically. One of these is Leonie Pettman, who is now at Colton Court where her husband, Greg, and family visit and spend time with her, as do we from the church.



The first Sunday in October, Margo Holt came and took the service and preached (see below). It was a lovely service, with Margo bringing her own style; quiet but strongly spiritual. Again her sermon gave us lots to think about. Everybody enjoyed the time together and we look forward to future visits.

Now from the sublime to the mundane. With all the rain we have been having, there was some leakage into the vestry, not a lot but enough to cause mould to grow on

our red altar frontal. It went to the drycleaners, who did a great job, however they have warned us that the spores are now present and cannot be killed, so we will need to monitor it. We have arranged a different way of storing the frontals—not perfect but a starting point. On discussion with Julia we have decided we need to store the red frontal separately in case the spores transfer to the others. We're still thinking about that.

While the frontal was at the drycleaners, we had a bird fly into the church and become trapped. It did escape later the same day, however it managed to poop on the altar, staining both the white cloth and the protective cover. It was easy enough to wash the linen altar cloth, but we had another visit to the drycleaners for the cover. We are still awaiting the outcome. We also needed to do some spot cleaning of the carpet and the pews.

Our service music continues to bring joy to us all and we are about to celebrate the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the organ with a concert to be held on the afternoon of Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> November at St Margaret's (*next page*). Tickets cost \$10 and proceeds will go towards replacing the organ's computer.

We will be celebrating St Margaret's Day on Sunday the 12<sup>th</sup> of November.

#### 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Concert for St Margaret's Pipe Organ

In 1995, McLaren Vale identity, the late Greg Trott, purchased a fine 3 manual, 40-stop English Romantic organ from Crafers Church of the Epiphany, planning to install it in his beloved Wirra Wirra winery. Organ builder Leith Jacob gradually rebuilt it, complete with an impressive new console crafted from Trott's collection of large Karri and Jarrah wine casks.

The not-quite-completed organ was in limbo after Trott's death in 2005, hidden in the darkness and heat of a 20 foot shipping container, until in 2013 the inaugural meeting of the "Friends of the Greg Trott Pipe Organ Inc." was held.

The console was placed in Greg Trott's old church, St Margaret's Anglican Church, McLaren Vale, where he had

been People's Warden for 24 years. The console was rewired, computerized and amplified to operate as a very convincing "virtual" pipe organ. Extra stops were added in 2018, bring the total to 42.

Annual concerts were held from 2013 to 2019 – then Covid hit. But now, on Sunday November 19<sup>th</sup> at 2:30pm, there will be a 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Pleasant Sunday Afternoon with stirring community hymn singing, 5 organists, choral items, vocal solos and duets. \$10 cash at the door, to assist with upgrading the computer and software for the next 10 years.

Even finding ways to remove the bees that decided to invade the church just before Kevin's funeral and the pigeon that took up roost on the ceiling joists on the day of the second funeral, flying close to the open coffin, added to the learning curve. All I can say is thank God for prayer and the grave digger's assistance, and how grateful I am to Margaret Cale, our clergy and Peter Filsell for all their help!

We also had our first **quiz night** for some years, this time held at the Aldinga Institute. Many thanks go to Burda Sanders who led the quiz, Pat and all helpers who set up and cleaned up afterwards. The night was successful, despite the sound system not working as well as we had hoped. In all \$825 was raised for St Ann's.

A recent working bee after the church service and morning tea proved productive. Hall windows and glass doors were cleaned, cupboards sorted and surplus removed. Two wool bales of pine needles were taken for burning. Afterwards we finished the remaining sausages and onion from the quarry market schools chaplains' stall and donated to them the money raised. Throughout the month a loyal group have continued to maintain the garden and cemetery. Broken water pipes have been problematic this month, so thanks must go to Tony and Barry for fixing the water leaks. The birds will now have to find another water source in which to bathe. My thanks must also go to Felicity and Sue for providing us with music each Sunday and at funerals in Brian's absence. A local stonemason is continuing to do repairs at the front entrance to the church, a grant to purchase a defibrillator has been obtained (thank you Sally and the City of Onkaparinga Council) and volunteers continue to help at the local Christian Care Centre. Many have completed the update for the parish directory and that should be circulated soon.

Our services have continued to be diverse and engaging. At our last family service Anne C gave us a memorable message about Jesus' story of the two sons and their choices. Beginning with the decisions we make just driving through Darlington these days, she ventured into life's decisions, asking us "how many decisions have we already made today?" And "what do they say about us?"

Bringing us back to the gospel, we were reminded how Jesus challenged people about their values – what was important to them and why, despite the rules they had lived by for hundreds of years that defined who they were and what they did. He was opening their understanding to

see beyond the rules and customs - even to heal a blind man on the sabbath. She suggested that sometimes we too are challenged to stop and assess what is important to us and why, and despite the good or bad decisions we make, God is with us, sometimes not stopping us, but always there to hold out His hand and help pick up the pieces when we have made wrong choices.

We have been using the end of our worship time for people to share their reflections on God speaking to them that week. From Anne's message, a few people shared their stories. I've included Victoria's here, as many in other churches in our parish contribute to the Christian Care Centre at Aldinga. She said:

"I have spent some time reflecting on Anne's message about choices. Both personally and in connection with the Aldinga Christian Care & Support Centre. Many of our clients are faced with difficult choices given the cost of living today; although at the same time, the choice is quite simple, stark even – how to put food on the table when faced with rising bills. So, I would like to thank the congregation of the Western Fleurieu Anglicans for their generosity over the past year, both in food donations and money. The parish raised \$3,276 for Christian Care in the 2022/23 financial year. With this and the food provided weekly, the Centre had 284 clients visit that year and Were able to feed 523 adults and 378 children. There were 22 new clients, and 11 people have returned after a period of 3-4 years. This reflects the need in our community. So once again, thank you. Also, thanks go to our volunteers who collect bread and those who offer their time in the Centre."

We look forward to our next Jumble Sale, which will be at St Stephen's on Saturday 18<sup>th</sup> November (see p. 5). Volunteers are needed, please, to get the goods to Willunga, to sell on the day, and, importantly, to help get the goods back to the shed and stored away afterwards.

At morning tea after church It's sometimes hard to make one's voice heard over the conversations, but everyone stopped to hear Ross Anderson and Beryl Corso's news on the 15<sup>th</sup> October that they are going to get married! We wish them every blessing. (Photo next month)

**The Road**: Finally, the Fleurieu Connections Alliance has contacted us regarding access to Stonehouse Lane and ultimately our church. On 20<sup>th</sup> October they wrote: To continue progressing tie-in works for the Port Road underpass, your access arrangements in and out of Stonehouse Lane will change from late next week to left**in and left-out only.** Please take extra care with the new traffic arrangements and observe signage, speed limits, lane restrictions and traffic controllers when travelling through the area.

A map has been included. (See the online supplement p. 17 or if you need a printed copy speak to the Wardens). Anyone coming from the south will now have to go through Aldinga and cross over the bridge to come into Stonehouse Lane via the slip lane. To return north, exit left out of Stonehouse Lane to get onto South Rd, and return via Aldinga Beach Rd or Aldinga Rd.

Brian (just back from holidays) adds: The Accommodation Works commenced on 31<sup>st</sup> October with the removal of the two trees outside the front of the Church and will continue in the Churchyard from 1 November, with the removal of the remains of the stone wall and the garden behind it, and with the preparation of the entrance/exit, driveways and car parking space—by removal of the current surface— for the necessary construction of the new drainage system and the subsequent filling and new surface creation. We expect that access by vehicle to the Churchyard will be affected while this takes place, and, as necessary, those coming to St Ann's may need to park outside the Churchyard.

#### News from St Nicholas', S.C.C., Seaford

Each month our service leadership team meets with Fr Peter to discuss our Family and Prayer, Praise & Proclamation (PPP) services as well as any other issues/ queries that may arise regarding our services at St Nicholas'. We are blessed that we have Fr Peter to assist us each month and encourage us in our worship.

With Bro Simon on leave, we were fortunate to have Fr Brenton join us for our Family Service on the 1<sup>st</sup> October. The theme "God shows us the way and we simply need to obey" was the main focus of the service, and this was reflected in the hymns and prayers we shared. Unfortunately Madeleine, one of our young people, was unwell on that day, but Mum, Sherrilee, stepped into the breach and with the assistance of Liv, her younger daughter, (standing on a couple of kneelers) we were able to continue as planned. The service was followed by a shared lunch, a great time of fellowship and food!

The PPP lay-led service on the 8<sup>th</sup> October was based on the parable from Matthew, "The Landlord, the Tenants and the Vineyard". Fr Peter kindly let us use his reflection in our service, emphasising our reliance on God and the need to follow the path chosen for us.

"The truth is, we cannot produce fruit unless we are given the gifts to cultivate the fruit. Being nice or a good person does not help; only with the gifts God provides can the fruit He wants be produced".

Our Healing Service, with the changed format, is working very well. Those wishing for prayers and anointing move toward Fr Ted after communion, where requests and concerns can be given to God and prayers for healing offered. Invitations to the Banquet were the highlight of the worship art produced by Sunara and Bella.

Bro Simon led our service on the 22<sup>nd</sup> October, with Matthew's Gospel offering up two instances of challenges to God's authority; the coins of Caesar – who gets what?— and the much wedded widow whose fate at the resurrection seemed in doubt. Bro Simon had suggested previously that we read the whole of Matthew's Gospel in an effort to understand better the audience the writer was addressing, and think how best it can be reflected into our modern world.


