



The sun shone as parishioners and visitors from Adelaide arrived at the church, and it continued to shine on the shared lunch which followed the service. During the administration of Communion the organist, Ya-Hua was joined by Christine, her daughter and Hamish her husband in some lovely pieces including a particularly beautiful rendition of "Amazing Grace".

The final song, "Walking in the light of God" was a chance for everyone in the congregation to let their hair down and raise castanets and voices together. Lunch on the lawns made an opportunity to meet those coming from further afield, including a family from Frewville, down for the day, accompanied by a Kerala family now living in Victoria.



Gee these months are slipping by quickly. We get so immersed in the business of life that we sometimes forget to slow down and “smell the roses”, so to speak. How many times have we all said, “I’m too busy, I can’t do that, I’ll get back to that later.” So much that we miss out on, with our busyness that shuts out family, friends, relaxation and community.

It makes clear how to re-prioritise your life, how to re-allocate your time and energy, to slow down and “smell the roses.” We all need that time in this troubled world today.

One of the special things about Christ Church is the people who visit from Adelaide or further afield. A family visiting from Frewville was accompanied by relatives from Kerala, India, currently living in Melbourne, and shared some of the lunch.

Walking with Jesus 15th September: Peace.

This was the 9th in our series on the ways we can express the love of God in our lives, and was led by Belinda Rosser.

“Live in harmony with one another. If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone”.
(Romans 12: 16a and 18)

When Jesus appeared to Mary outside the tomb and subsequently to the disciples (John 20:11-18) he brought his message, “Peace be with you” three times. Peace had come to Mary when she regained her friend and master, but now it came to the other disciples who were perplexed after hearing the stories of Jesus’ appearance.

We shared three beautiful songs about Peace: “Make me a channel of your peace” (prayer of St Francis), “Let there be peace on earth and let it begin with me”, and “Peace with the Father”, to the lovely Gibbons tune Song 47. This last one has been our hymn of the month, sung every Sunday in September .

Jesus used the term “peace” many times before his resurrection. On one such occasion (John 14, verse 27) he says: “Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid”. This had a special significance to the disciples, because this peace

We realised that lack of peace often comes with a feeling of being weighed down with care. Jesus invites us to take off the cumbersome backpack we've been lugging around and exchange it for His “yoke” which He describes as easy and light (Matthew 11, verses 29-30). We can also bring peace to others by bearing their burdens.

Allison, above all else, was a faithful, devout and committed Christian, and as such she supported her church and local

community in so many ways.

Allison and her late husband George were long time members and supporters of the South Adelaide football club, and Southport Surf Life Saving Club, with both being active fundraisers for the clubs as well as mentoring the young players and "nippers".

Allison was very passionate about her involvement with SCC and the community, believing in the importance of Christian Communities working together for the benefit of all. She was a member of the SURF team supporting



people doing it tough, and she did it with compassion and practical advice. She also supported the SCC Café as it was being developed, offering her experience after working in large canteens and kitchens. Allison helped cook food and volunteered in the café, adding her wealth of experience in cooking to those who wished to learn.

She held many roles at St Nicholas', being an enthusiastic member of the choir and a very well organised sacristan. She was a mentor, a teacher and role model to others, training young volunteers in the cafe, teaching many how to set up the altar and care for the various elements of worship. Allison was always reliable, hard working, and willing to be involved in any way she could to further the mission of the church. As a member of the St Nicholas' Guild/Fellowship, Allison took part along with other members in fundraising breakfast, lunches, band concerts and fetes, setting up for shared meals, catering for Baptisms, confirmations and funerals, with an almost obsessive attention to detail. She was a hard act to follow. Allison had a no nonsense personality, with a dry sense of humour, and was always happy to speak out on issues dear to her heart. She was a loving, loyal, caring, encouraging and supportive friend who will be missed by us all.

Family Service, 1st of September – Unfortunately this was the same weekend as Father's Day and the Show! and we could not really compete with them. We did have a wonderful service, though. We began with a special prayer for fathers and father figures everywhere, asking for strength, wisdom, tenderness, and patience as they give their support to those in their care. Father Ted gave us all a talk on his recent trip to Korea, visiting for a family event (such a long trip on his own, we were all pleased when he returned home safe and sound). The service was followed by a shared lunch as usual with lots of time for further talks and fellowship.

Our "round table" service on the 8th of September ran with the theme of "Favouritism" based on the James reading for the day (James 2:9). We discussed how we naturally gravitate towards people who are like us; that we find places we feel comfortable and understood, or that are familiar, and how this can make our churches, sports teams and social media a bit like an "echo chamber" where we only hear voices that sound like ours, with similar opinions and experiences. We often use "We welcome all" as our Catch Phrase - It's easy to say but do we really do this? (But see p. 10! Ed.)

Fortified with coffee and baked goodies, we had a lively discussion about how we as a small ageing congregation could "Welcome All". Lots of ideas and thoughts grew from our own community involvement both past and

present. As in all things, we found that holding all in prayer and supporting those in need enabled us to "welcome" all into our church family.

At our healing service on the 15th of September, we were blessed to have the Rev'd Margo Holt lead us in our worship. She generously allowed us to add to the service a memorial to Allison Hann, one of our parishioners who had passed away peacefully a few weeks before. As Allison did not have a funeral service, those of us who knew her well felt we needed to remember her and say prayers for her repose. We sang



Allison's favourite hymns, "My faith looks up to Thee", "Just as I am, without one plea", "There is a Redeemer", and "O Jesus I have promised", and Cathy

More sang "The Lord is my Shepherd" during Communion. We gave thanks for Allison's life, work and witness amongst us and the wider community and prayed that her soul would rest in peace in the loving arms of her God. A slide show of photos of Allison was shown to the song by Celtic Women, "The Parting Glass".



Our service on the 22nd of September was led by Fr Peter Simmons. It will be his last service with us for quite a few months as he takes up work at St Paul's, Port

Adelaide – his former church. We also celebrated the wedding anniversaries of Fr Ted and Joyce Newing (70 years) and Fr Dennis and Mary Eales (64 years), presenting them both with cards and flowers from the congregation. The Old Testament reading – which Fr Ted read – was from Proverbs and began most fortuitously with the words:

"A capable wife who can find? She is far more precious than jewels. The heart of her husband trusts in her, and he will have no lack of gain."

Fr Peter gave another challenging sermon, based on the James reading and the Gospel, about the power of the tongue; how it can be used for good or ill, and how sometimes the best use of it is to keep it still, to listen and not talk. We will miss seeing him each month but wish him well in his new endeavours in Port Adelaide. At least he will be nearer Alberton Oval!

Coffee time included the last of the chocolates given to us by Takoohi. Chat time over, a main item for the agenda was to complete the collection of Christmas Child Boxes. The mission of Operation Christmas Child is to provide God's love in a tangible way to children in need around the world, and together with the local church worldwide, to share the Good News of Jesus Christ. It is a hands-on way to bless children in need across the world by filling

shoeboxes, provided, with toys, hygiene items, school supplies, and fun gifts. Boxes have been filled lovingly throughout the year, and we completed 12 boxes. They will be collected by a representative and distributed in the name of Jesus Christ to children living in vulnerable situations.

After our formal time of worship and prayer, we heard from Anne Chittleborough, who with her husband Fr Martin had spent some years in PNG. She explained something of the background to PNG Martyrs Day, which is observed in the Anglican calendar worldwide on 2nd September; a commemoration of 12 people who were serving the Anglican church in Papua and New Guinea when the events of Second World War, and particularly the Japanese invasion of PNG, impacted them.

Teachers, nurses, priests, lay workers and missionaries, they were mostly Australian or English but included two Papuans – Lucien Tapiedi, and Leslie Gariardi.

Having been given the opportunity to leave safely as the war drew closer in 1942 they decided to stay and continue their work, and were killed by the Japanese.

As the first Monday in October is a public holiday it was decided that those who could, would meet at the **Visitor Centre at McLaren Vale for Coffee and Chat on October 7th**. Our **November meeting, on November 4th**, will be at the home of Helen Cook, to be followed by a BBQ lunch. (Helen providing the sausages, T. Simon and A. Chittleborough a salad each and T. Frith a sweet.

News from St Ann's, Aldinga

September 1st, 2024, the first day of Spring, happened to fall on a Sunday. In honour of the change of season, Trish Frith picked a sprig of cassia on the way to St Ann's and laid it on the altar, where it remained during the service. Coincidentally, the Psalm of the Day was Psalm 45, which includes "Myrrh, aloes, and cassia perfume your robes .".

As September was designated as the season of Creation, our Collect and Creed throughout the month reflected varying aspects of God's creation. His handiwork and the splendour of creation, His unchangeable power, the goodness of the land, richness of the seas and rhythm of the seasons brought to our minds God's goodness and grace. Having a change of words in the liturgy had the effect of energizing us and reminding us of how marvelous are the deeds of our God.

The readings for the day gave us the theme, "Actions speak louder than words." The Message was well received, and there was a very telling response to a silent video at the end, complementing the message, contrasting the beauty of creation with the destructive damage done to the earth by man and machine. The tone for the remainder of the service was sombre, but reflective. Our God has His many ways to get our attention! The theme was summed up in our prayer:

Act in us, O God.
Care through us, O God.
Teach us to be gentle with the whole of creation.
Inspire us to live as Jesus taught us.
Open our hearts to your ways.
Nurture us in your compassion.

The Message for our Prayer, Praise and Proclamation Service was given by Brian McMillan and was based on Mark 8, 27-38, where Jesus, alone with his disciples, spoke simply and clearly about his death and Resurrection, asking them: "Who do the people say I am?"; "And you —what are you saying about me? Who am I?" The message concluded with a reference to the second of those questions: being followers of the way of Jesus, our task is to talk about Him and about His way. What we speak and how we speak it must not lead us into shaming the Son of Man. Brian left us to ponder what we ourselves say about Jesus.

From time to time we have been privileged to welcome Father Peter Simmons to lead our worship; most recently on 22nd September when he conducted our Eucharist. It is always a pleasure to have him with us, but as he has accepted the Locum Tenens position as Priest at St Paul's, Port Adelaide for the rest of 2024, that is a pleasure which we must defer until 2025.

It has been a tradition at St Ann's to sing "Happy Birthday" to those having one. Trish Frith happened to

turn 85 years young this month, so it was her turn to receive our congratulations. This turned out to be a dual celebration! It is her custom to award and present chocolate frogs to unsuspecting members of the congregation for contributions deemed deserving of recognition. It was now her turn to be unsuspecting - a Chocolate Frog, of a size more prodigious than usual, and clad in a vesture of gold, was presented to her to mark her years of pruning roses on behalf of St Ann's, both as an outreach and as a way of making money for the church. Many thanks to Trish and also to the team she led for their years of dedicated service.



Speaking of the gardening team, a recent report has shown that seasonal changes and lack of rain have dried out the ground. A suggestion of pea straw mulch would help. The growing infestation of rabbits is causing substantial problems; their digging is causing damage in the gardens and potential danger to people visiting the cemetery. Council does not allow baiting in public places, so the only answer is to destroy burrows. We are in the process of trying to rectify the problem.

Our recent quiz night, led by Burda Sanders, was a great success. Held this year back in our hall, all tickets were sold and if the noise level and laughter were anything to go by, it was a great night! Burda and her sister Vicky were glad to be back in the hall as they felt that the

WELCOME TO OUR CHURCH !



We offer a welcome to those who think that the earth is flat, who work too hard, don't work, can't spell, or are here because granny is visiting and wanted to come to church.




A good way to support the ministry of our parish is to arrange a weekly offering as a direct debit. This gives a steady commitment to our church even when we miss a Sunday.
