RETREAT: a period or place of seclusion for the purposes of prayer and meditation.

Well I have just come back from our annual clergy retreat at the beautiful Sevenhills retreat centre. Some people visit a dentist once a year to

have a check-up, thinking all is well but being a little surprised at what the dentist finds. So, how much more should you and I step away from job, family, parish or whatever to connect with someone skilled at the spiritual level of being, to help us regain or grow in health in the things of the spirit?

I think that this is the great benefit of including in our yearly schedules a time away for a retreat. Retreats are not for idle self-indulgence. A retreat is for recentering, renewing, re-directing our lives into a greater, deeper harmony with God, the source of life and love. We may just discover that God's timetable is very different from ours. Perhaps what we think is "the Lord's work" may instead turn out to be our own driven needs and desires.

In a retreat, says Evelyn Underhill "we come to be with God, God first and God alone. Far from being escapism, it has been said that a retreat is possibly the most apostolic thing an apostle can do. It is to take our lead from Jesus who frequently went away from the town, or up into the hills to be alone with God, free from normal responsibilities, in order to allow a greater clarity and purpose to emerge. St Paul did the same, disappearing in solitude for up to three years before fully engaging with his mission to the Gentiles."

Our retreat director was Fr Philip Carter, a respected spirituality and retreat director. He gave us the opportunity to get away from the town, up into the hills to be alone with God and listen in silence, free from our normal responsibilities. It was a great week of quiet prayer and contemplation, and I had two wonderful talks with Fr Philip.

We owe it to ourselves, to our people, to our families, to our vocation, to retreat regularly so that we can give God some space to fill in our lives.

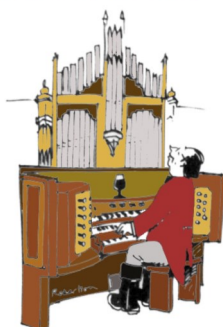

News from Christ Church, Yankalilla

This month our topic for discussion was HUMILITY and was led by Hamish Stokes.

Do not be proud but be willing to associate with people of low position. Do not be conceited.

This admonition from Romans 12, verse 16b, is the tenth so far for this year. Oh, that we could demonstrate all the virtues that we have been studying throughout the year!

To illustrate the virtue of humility, we read the story of John the Baptist (John 1:24-34 and 3:22-32). When asked if he was the Messiah, John denied it and pointed to the one who would come after him. The true Messiah was Jesus who would baptize in the Holy Spirit as well as with water as was John's custom. John demonstrated humility when he said, "He must become greater and I must become less". Jesus would be so much greater that John even felt unworthy to untie his sandal straps!

Anne Nadge of St Columba's Hawthorn wrote the following poem about Jesus' sandals:

Sandals to Follow (Matthew 3:11)

Let us look for sandals in these stained glass windows
Sandals we thought we would not ever be worthy to carry
For the one they said would follow

On donkey tracks from Bethlehem, shell grit paths by Galilee
Blood steep steps to Calvary – broken sandals came flapping
To the dry dust of our hearts.

Now let us wear bloodied sandals from these stained glass windows
Sandals we thought we were not even worthy to carry
For the One we came to follow.

Our discussion topics explored the meaning of humility which could perhaps be defined more from its opposite state - pride. In the words of Mary, "He has looked upon his handmaid's lowliness" and "he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts. He has brought down the powerful from their thrones and lifted up the lowly". Jesus himself was born into a poor family and took up the lowly profession of carpenter in his early years.

John Bell's lovely hymn "Not the powerful" expresses how we should not be obsessed by our achievements, our worldly wealth or our family tree!

For our prayer session, we were divided into three groups and asked to construct our own prayer from a pile of words we were given on tiny pieces of paper (see the photos). Each group then read out the prayer they had constructed. These were:

Please don't let me think I am smarter or better than others.

Help us to appreciate your criticism and not be discouraged.

I pray, as we gather, to be humble always.

The topic for November 17th will be Grace, and will be led by Liz Gordon-Mills.

Vale Elizabeth (Betty) Dorothy Souter

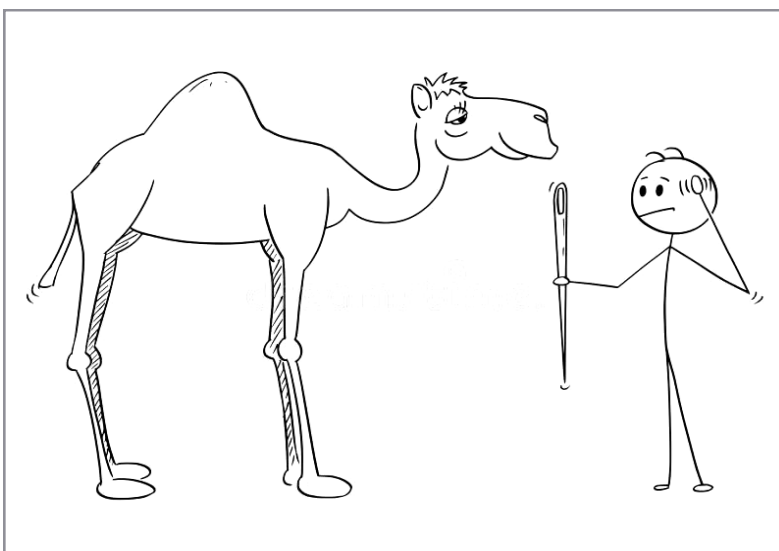
(5.10.1930 – 13.5.2024)

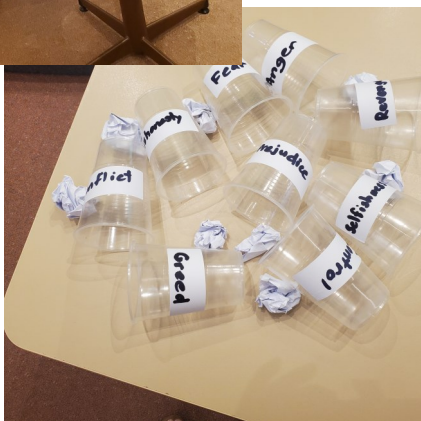
Combined Service 29th September We ended September with a combined worship service with the UCA and Church of Christ congregations. Fr Ted led us in our worship with Reverend Anne Butler giving the message talking about the importance of women in the Bible and emphasizing Esther (the first reading) and how God puts people where they need to be to further His plans. It is always great to worship with fellow Christians and have many voices raised in praise and worship. Always a great time of fellowship afterwards over morning tea.

For our Family Service on the 6th October, we took the theme of "Breaking Down Barriers". In the Gospels, Jesus frequently appears to be in conflict with various groups and individuals. He cleared the temple of moneychangers who hindered Gentile worship. He abolished religious laws and ordinances to create peace. He engaged in conversation with a Samaritan woman, breaking racial, religious, and cultural barriers. Most importantly, Jesus broke down the barrier of sin between God and humanity. Often it is people—like the Pharisees in today's gospel—who have a set idea of what God is like and what God wants from people. Because people think they know the answer, they stop listening to God, and start building all those barriers. Barriers that force separation. Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me." Try replacing the word "children" with "homeless", "depressed", "hurting" or "unloved". Are we doing all that we can to make sure everyone has the opportunity to meet and be welcomed by Jesus? Sunara and Bella built a "wall" with



paper cups. On each was a word that is often a barrier. Greed - Dishonesty - Selfishness - Revenge - Prejudice - Conflict - Fear - Control - Anger.

We gave out pieces of paper to the children and members of the congregation, on which were written words that can help break down barriers. LOVE- KINDNESS - SHARING - TRUTH- PATIENCE - PEACE - UNDERSTANDING.



We asked for these papers to be scrunched into a ball and then thrown at the wall we had built, breaking down the barriers. It took a few goes but eventually our wall came tumbling down! (See also p. 13 online supplement).

Our Round table service on the 13th of October followed the misfortunes of Job as he continued trying to find God and make him listen while he argued his case. We began the service with a visual task, lots of different mazes with everyone trying to find a way out – their way to God. Some were more successful than others, some hit walls and had to try other ways, some got lost and had to begin again. We can find God in unexpected places. Searching for God may start quite close to home. In speaking out we may find that help comes from those who listen and allow us to share our problems. Solutions may take longer, but God has a plan for us that includes this life and the next. Lots of lively discussion about how as individuals we searched for God in times of difficulty and how our own emotions can sometimes prevent us from realizing that God is always with us, in the good times and the bad.

On the 20th October, we were blessed to have Fr Brenton lead us in our worship. It was great to have Fr Brenton preach the word and spend time with us after the service over coffee. The readings of the day spoke about being called to serve and how Jesus, though the Son of God, came to be a servant to us all. Fr Brenton spoke of his own journey to Ministry and its challenges. It is hard sometimes to be sure or understand when God calls us to follow him and minister in his name. The way can be difficult, riddled with self-doubt. and sacrifice, but believing in God's plan for us all and with the support of the Holy Spirit, we can all find our path and work towards the fulfilment of God's kingdom on earth. Fr Brenton also blessed the Christmas Child Boxes put together by members of the Mothers Union and the congregation at St Nicholas. Our prayer is that those who open the boxes will feel the love that went into making them.



Our service on the 27th October was led by Fr Ted Newing. Having swapped Sundays with Fr Brenton last week, this became our healing service for the month. We are truly fortunate that Fr Ted still offers to minister to us on Sundays, thus helping with the roster planning for the Parish and enabling us to continue with our communion and healing service each month.

St Stephen's, Willunga

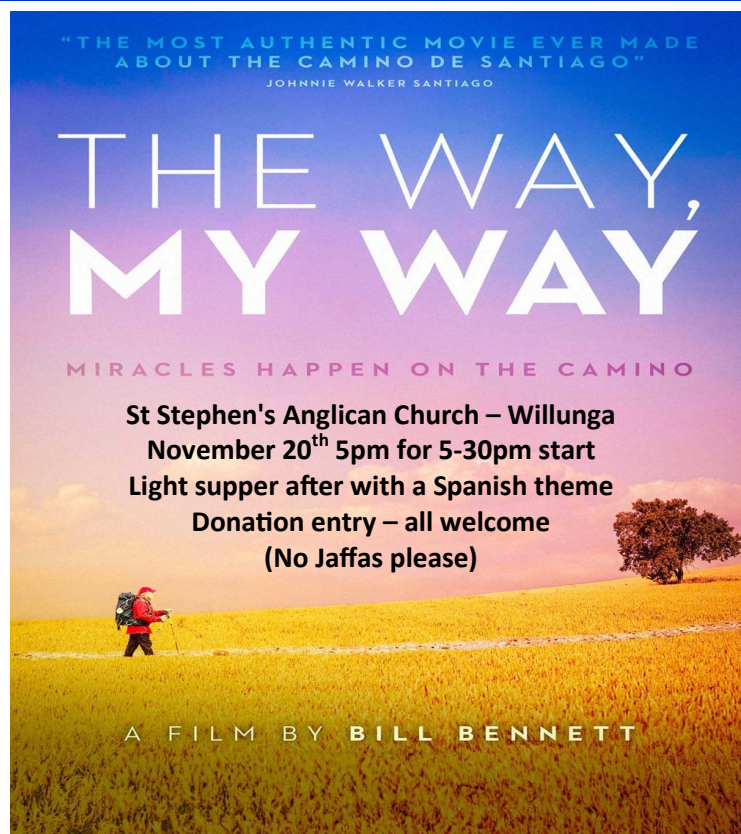

Pentecost 20

In our Family Service on 6th October which was led by De Badgery, we began a series of readings from Job, a book described by Victoria McKee, who gave the Message that day, as “an epic tragedy. A book of beautiful but dense prose and poetry”. As Eugene H Peterson says in his Introduction to Job in *The Message*, “Job suffered. His name is synonymous with suffering. He asked ‘Why?’ He asked ‘Why me?’ He asked his questions persistently, passionately, and eloquently . . . In the course of facing, questioning, and respecting suffering, Job finds himself in an even larger mystery – the mystery of God . . .”. In giving her Message, on chapter 1 and that part of Chapter 2 of Job which concludes with his question to his wife, “ . . . Should we accept only good things from the hand of God and never anything bad?”, Victoria spoke with clarity and wisdom in addressing the challenges inherent in Job. Her conclusion – “the book of Job is about suffering and salvation by grace alone. It demonstrates that it is acceptable to express your faith through lament and to question, but never to lose sight of the power of the Almighty. God demonstrates that He is sovereign over suffering. For God’s goodness is received in the midst of pain, it isn’t proven by the absence of suffering.”

This was Victoria’s first time giving a Message, and as nervous as she was about doing it, the insights given were numerous and encouraging.

Pentecost 21

We were pleased to welcome Father Chris Talbot on 13th October when he conducted our Eucharist. As he

reminded us, he had last officiated at St Ann’s on 7th September 2008! In his Message he referred to the teachings of Hildegard von Bingen OSB, (1098 - 1179), the German Benedictine abbess and polymath active as writer, composer, philosopher, mystic, visionary and medical writer and practitioner. One of her Prayers includes:

“Holy Spirit, forgiving and giving, uniting strangers, reconciling enemies, seeking the lost, and enfolding us together, fill these gathered here!”

“I surrender all”

We sang this (Hymn 310 in *Soul-Stirring Songs & Hymns* and included in 347 other Hymn Books) on 13th October. The Hymn was written by Judson Wheeler Van DeVenter (1855-1939) with the Tune *Surrender* by Winfield Scott Weedon (1847-1908). The author explained his inspiration as follows:

“For some time, I had struggled between developing my talents in the field of art and going into full-time evangelistic work. At last the pivotal hour of my life came, and I surrendered all. A new day was ushered into my life. I became an evangelist and discovered down deep in my soul a talent hitherto unknown to me. God had hidden a song in my heart, and touching a tender chord, He caused me to sing.”

As a teacher at the Florida Bible Institute, the author linked with Billy Graham (1918-2018), at that time a student there, who used the hymn in his later Crusades.

Pentecost 22

The theme for our Prayer, Praise and Proclamation Service which was led by Lorraine Colliver was *Do you know who I am?* which Kate McKechnie used in her Message to remind us of the nature of God in all three aspects, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit – and what each of those names conveys. Kate, like all of us who are privileged to be authorised to deliver a Message in a lay-led Service, is very conscious of the consequent responsibilities to enhance the faith of those listening.

One never knows what, from such a Message, will trigger a recollection in any of those listening. For one person there, it was Kate’s reference to the use of the name “Friend” for Jesus, exemplified by the 1859 Hymn by Albert Midlane (1825-1909) “There’s a Friend for little children” (Hymn 839 in *The Methodist Hymn-Book*). The last half of the first verse awakened a childhood memory: “Unlike our friends by nature, who change with changing years, this Friend is always worthy, the precious name He bears.”

Kate concluded that whatever words we use to describe Him, God is AWESOME. That theme was picked up in the prayer of praise to follow, beginning “Awesome God, we praise you...”



Jumble Sale

A major event during this month was the Jumble Sale. A call for volunteers was very fruitful and all hands were on deck. We were thankful for younger family helpers who could do some of the heavy lifting. It seemed a slow day, but when all money was tallied, we were stunned to discover that \$2082 had been raised! This would have to be one of the largest amounts to date. A huge "thank you" to



all who contributed and assisted. As always, it was lovely to be able to interact with the community, and also to get to know fellow parishioners on a different level. A highlight was watching Patrusca and Wayne selling jewellery!



Gardening Team

Many thanks must also go to the Gardening Team who have persisted with the upkeep of the cemetery and church surrounds. Flowering plants and bushes are in full bloom and the roses are delightful. Now we need to keep the water up to them through what looks as if it may be a dry summer.

Fr Brenton reported that Ukelele jam sessions are going well after the Bible Study on Friday mornings!

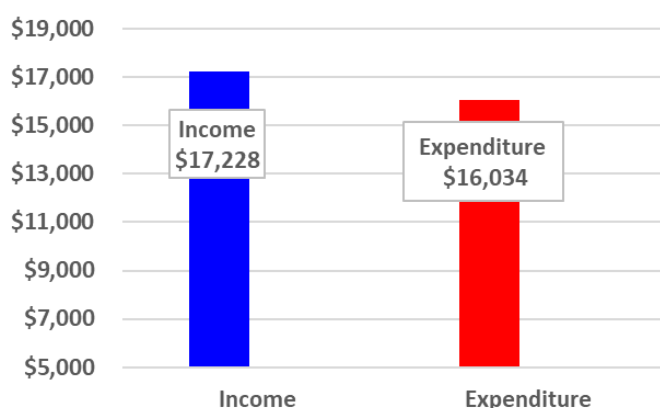

They will have a congregational lunch on 19th November, to include Fr Brenton and Lyn.

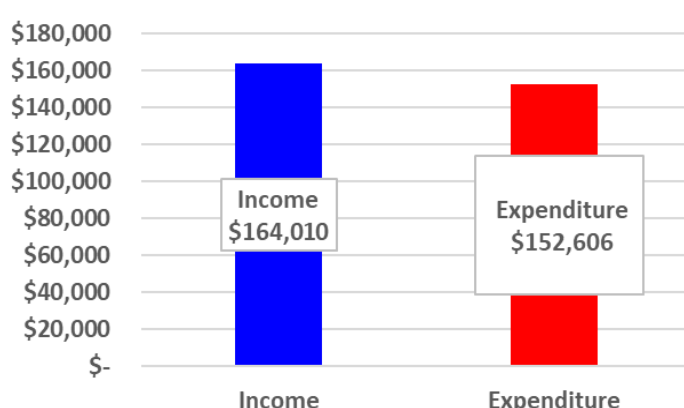
An International Day of Peace ceremony had been held at SCC with a number of people attending.

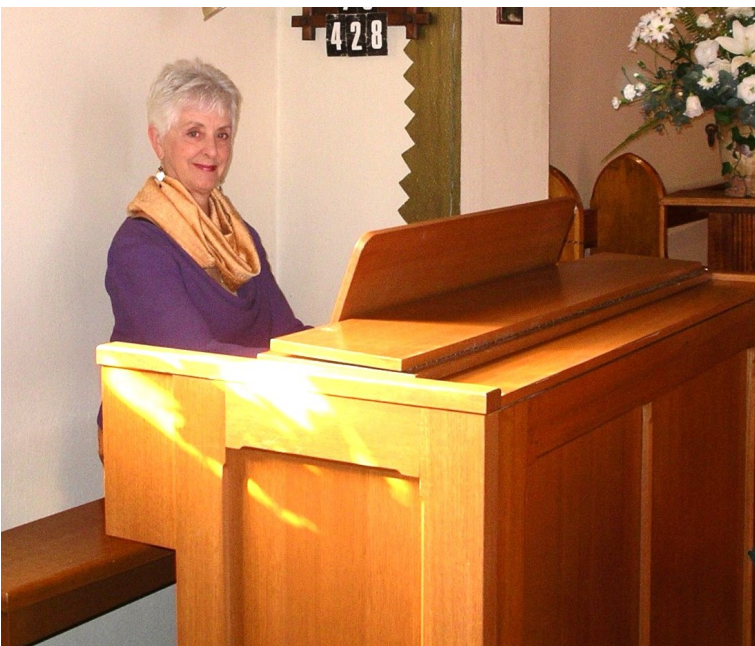

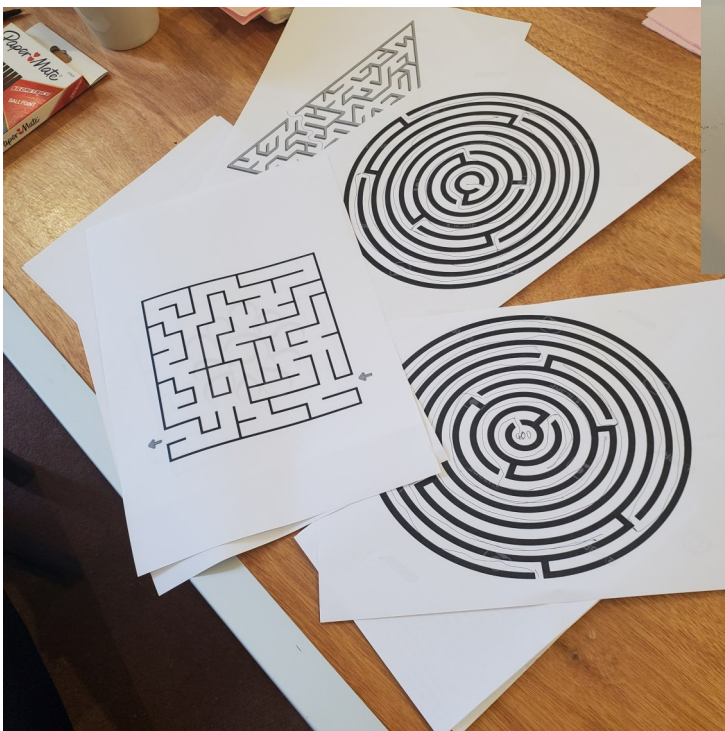
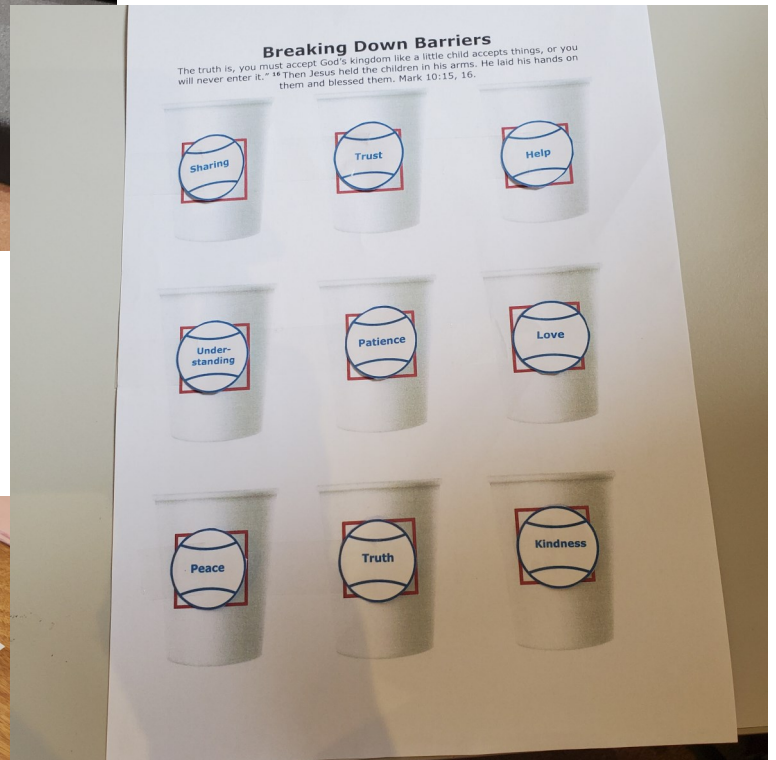
