Last week we celebrated (or most of us did) Australia Day. While there are still wounds to heal, we have much to celebrate. Our freedom, our way of life, this amazing land of wonder and beauty.

For those who call Australia home, regardless of their view of what happened 237 years ago and the history that is behind this day, I think that

Australia Day is an opportunity to give thanks for the land we live in. From the earliest of days of European settlement, faith in God was present. The First Fleet's chaplain, the Reverend Richard Johnson, preached his first sermon on Australian soil from Psalm 116: 12-13, "What shall I render to the Lord for all his benefits towards me? I will take the cup of salvation and call upon the name of the Lord."

There are those, especially our indigenous brothers and sisters, the first nation people, who see this day as marking the invasion of their land when white people came and took away from them what was their home. A dark day in our history. Rather than dwelling on our past, we can remember and learn from our past—the failures, and successes—and together with all Australians look with clear eyes forward to the future for all Australians.



As the Reverend Neville Naden says, "As an Indigenous Christian, I reflect on the choice I have in responding to our history. I can meditate on the wrong things that have occurred, or I can focus on the good that God has done through it all." God in his great mercy has brought hope and restoration, even in the face of pain and loss.

We see his hand in the resilience of the First Nations peoples, the richness of their contributions to Australian society, and the growing movement towards reconciliation.

As citizens of this country, let us turn our hearts to God in gratitude and commit to acknowledging our many blessings, facing the truth of our nation's history, and partnering with God's work of building meaningful relationships, and advocating for justice and equality. Together we can all

honour the past, embrace the present, and move forward in hope towards a future of unity and peace."

January has not been a busy month, with smaller numbers each week with people away visiting or being visited by family and friends. So, as our report for this month we decided to offer a Vale for Patricia Foord, a dearly loved and well remembered member of St Nicholas', Seaford from the time of its inception in the early 1980s.

Pat's funeral on Friday 24th January was attended by over 90 people, 50 of those being her family—a bonus when you have 8 children! The Baptistry was full and everyone was in great voice as we sang the lovely hymns chosen by Pat. In fact she had organized the whole service, with the music, readings, prayers and hymns mirroring her husband Fred's funeral service in 2018. *Jane Cuthbert*

The greatest aspect of living life well, is to live a life of faith. Pat, a dedicated and committed Christian, clearly displayed this in all areas of her life, as a wife, mother, grandmother and great grandmother, and as a church leader in the parish.

Her ministry at St Nicholas', SEM and in the broader Ecumenical Church community was immense, consistent, and always to the absolute best of her ability.

For as long as most of us can remember, Pat and Fred were a double act who together supported and upheld the community at SEM and the congregation of St Nicholas'. We can only marvel at Pat's and Fred's commitment, passion, and hard work in the numerous planning meetings in the years before SEM became a reality. They worked hard with representatives from the other denominations in determining the feasibility of the project, and were involved enormously in the various planning stages before we actually moved into the centre in August 1996. They both fought hard to ensure there was an Anglican presence in this massive Ecumenical undertaking. A wonderful legacy that continues today.

While we have the permanence of Fred's



amazing gift of carpentry in the lovely church furnishings we see about us today, Pat's gifts followed a different path, not visual, but so important to the success of St Nicholas'. Without her as our lynch pin, our cornerstone on which we could always rely, St Nicholas' would not have survived those first turbulent years as we learned to "row our own boat" as a member of the Seaford Ecumenical Mission. In those early years she organised for us to have ministers each week, ensuring the congregation had the teaching and ministry they needed, and the pastoral care and fellowship so important to building a new community.

Pat organised and participated in many ecumenical services, but the Taizé Services held regularly in the Baptistry for many years were close to her heart. Pat's Taizé Cross, used at those services, is still seen at other services in the Diocese, at St Stephen's, Christ Church and even further afield in Mount Barker. Pat was always pleased to see it still being used for prayer services.

Pat had a sense of quiet dignity and calmness, but a backbone of solid steel. Somehow, just by that smile and quiet request she always managed to get things done just how she wanted them. As many people found out, saying no to Pat was really difficult. But she never pushed for herself, but always in the service of her God and the furthering of His mission and ministry here on earth. Pat served faithfully as Warden, Synod Representative, Pastoral Assistant, Lay-reader, choir member, and as a committee member on parish, ecumenical and wider church councils. She was responsible for rosters, intercessions, reading, church accoutrements, cleaning, sorting, setting up and putting down, visiting, finding, greeting, arranging, and welcoming. As Pat started to step down in the last few years, it took 3 or 4 of us to manage the same duties—not nearly as well.

As time went on and others took over the roles she had so faithfully held for so long, her presence was

still, and probably always will be, felt by those around her. Her knowledge and understanding of the scriptures, her wonderful approach to prayer, her amazing generosity, not only materially but personally and spiritually, is a model we can only hope to aspire to.

But most of all we shall miss Pat's presence, her quiet smile and wise counsel, her encouragement as she fostered harmony and growth not only at St Nicholas' and SEM but throughout all aspects of her life. We will remember Pat for her goodness and greatness, for the many happy memories we all share, for her friendship and loving kindness and for her example as a strong woman of faith in our community.

We give thanks for her life, work and witness among us, as we say goodbye in the sure and certain knowledge that Pat is now reunited with Fred and safely in the arms of her God.

May they both rest in peace and rise in glory. *Amen.*

Christ Church had run out of candles, having gone through a 5kg box between Christmas and New Year! and had been helped by candles from the other churches.



St Ann's had had a lot of cases of Covid, and numbers had been lower than usual over Christmas.

News from Yankalilla & Delamere

WALKING WITH JESUS

The New Year of 2025 was kicked off on January 19th with the beginning of a new set of themes, devised by Fr Peter Randle, based on the questions of Jesus in the context of his "I am" statements. The first one was "Who do you say that I am?" (*Matthew 16, vs. 16*)



The Old Testament background to this was the experience of Moses when he saw the burning bush that was not consumed by the fire. The message from God was "I am who I am" and that he was to

tell the people of Israel that "I am" had sent him to bring deliverance to them (*Exodus 3, vs. 15 and 16*). The meaning of this was that God was the self-sustaining God who was, who is and who will be.

Jesus frequently introduced his messages and actions with a question, perhaps to gain insight about the state of mind of his followers but also to get them thinking about their understanding of him and his mission on earth. He first asked his disciples who other people said that he was and who they believed he was. Simon Peter famously answered, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God", then receiving the affirmation from Jesus that this had been revealed to him by God in heaven. Jesus advised them that he would use this statement on which to build his Church.

Who am I? Our discussion started by examining our beliefs about our own personal identities, whether based on inheritance, gender, profession or interests. Who are you in other people's eyes? We all wanted others to view us in a positive light – caring, loving, giving etc, but we realised that sometimes we can experience negative descriptions from others. Sometimes these are malicious and untrue, but we do need to spend some time thinking about how we project the love of Jesus to others, since it may be the only thing that people have experienced of Him. Are there some aspects of our identity that need improving?

The question "Who is Jesus for you?" brought out a variety of responses such as carer, friend, comforter, example, advisor and honest appraiser. We sang some lovely old songs which reinforced our understanding of our place in God's eyes. "Just as I am" and "Be still and know that I am God" helped us to focus on how precious we are in God's sight and that when we are going through difficult times, He is there to support and relieve us.

As always, services have been enlightening, challenging and engaging.

5th January 2025: The theme for our Family Service, led by Bill Cale, was A Promise Made Real, on which topic Brian McMillan gave the Message and De Badgery led the Intercessions. As this was the first Sunday of 2025, we said together:

Here on the threshold of a new beginning,
By grace forgiven, now we leave behind
Our long-repentent selfishness and sinning,
And all our blessings call again to mind:

Christ to redeem us, ransom and restore us,
The love that holds us in a Saviour's care,
Faith strong to welcome all that lies before us,
Our unknown future, knowing God is there.

These words were written by the Right Reverend Timothy Dudley-Smith OBE (26 December 1926 – 12 August 2024), who was Archdeacon of Norwich (1973-1981) and Bishop of Thetford (1981-1991) but who was more famous as writer of some 400 hymns, beginning with "Tell out, my soul" in 1962.

We also heard an excerpt from a recording of the Christmas broadcast by his late Majesty, King George VI in 1939, quoting the poem "God knows" by Minnie Louise Haskins (1875-1957):

And I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year: "Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown". And he replied: "Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the Hand of God. That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way". So I went forth, and finding the Hand of God, trod gladly into the night.

On 19th January we looked at the first recorded miraculous sign of Jesus' ministry, turning water into wine, on what was once known as "firkin Sunday".

The name was given because the six stone pots mentioned each held “two or three firkins [about 30 gallons] apiece of wine” (*King James Version*).

26th January 2025: Australia Day

As Australia Day fell on the last Sunday in January 2025, we celebrated Australia Day, concluding with (on screen) the 1987 song of which the Chorus is

We are one, but we are many
And from all the lands on earth we come.
We share a dream and sing with one voice:
I am, you are, we are Australian.

Father Brenton, in his Message, reminded us of the lavish gifts provided through the grace of God, and of the Reverend Richard Johnson’s first sermon on Australian soil, on 3rd February 1788. Appointed Chaplain to the Settlement of New South Wales in 1786, the Reverend Richard Johnson (1756-1827) sailed with the First Fleet. Those who pass the memorial at the intersection of Hunter, Bligh and Castlereagh Streets in Sydney will see there the

words he quoted from Psalm 116. (see also “Priestly Prattle”, p. 1).






