## **Vale Fr Dennis Cales**

Born in the UK Midlands, Fr Dennis migrated to Australia with Mary and their four children as "ten pound Poms" in 1968, and soon settled at Christies Beach. A toolmaker by trade, Fr Dennis worked for GMH and for Chrysler before feeling a call to ministry in the prison system and working at Pentridge Prison, Victoria. Returning to live at Christies Beach he was employed by OARS (Offenders Aid and Rehabilitation System) working with ex-prisoners with complex needs.

He was made a Deacon in 1991 and ordained priest in 2003, serving as parish priest at St Nicholas', Seaford. In 2004 he retired from secular work. He was appointed parish priest of Southern Vales (now known as Western Fleurieu) 2005-2009, and later served at Yankalilla. Fr Dennis will long be remembered for his loving ministry and his gentle sense of humour. AC

## News from St Ann's, Aldinga



“And now for the hard part...”

As we write this instalment, the parish has just celebrated our combined service at St Ann's. It was wonderful to see so many from each centre commemorating our Lord's day, Mothering Sunday and a farewell to our Vicar, Fr Brenton, and his wife Lyn. Sitting at the front of the church allowed me to hear our voices raise the roof, as we sang the hymns Brian had so carefully chosen to fit the readings and themes of the day.

Fr Brenton's sermon on the “Prodigal Son”, or, as he put it, “The Forgiving Father” was a challenge to return to God if we have strayed, and to see our God as the loving Father He really is.

I must admit, I wasn't prepared for parts two and three of his message—the second part being a story, and finally, as he said, “Now for the hard part” - his message of conclusion and farewell, which he spoke from the heart and with such sincerity. We will greatly miss his and Lyn's ministries to us, but are grateful they have chosen to live in the District after his retirement, so I imagine many will continue to catch up with them from time to time. Thankfully, we will have three more weeks before Fr Brenton officially retires. If the fellowship afterwards at morning tea and the BBQ was anything to go by, they will be in our lives for a long time. A thank you must go to everyone who made this day such a beautiful success.

Sunara's birthday celebration at the end of the service, the recognition of Mothering Sunday with simnel cake and a floral bookmark (real flowers being so hard to source from our drought-affected gardens), and the delicious food for morning tea and lunch, topped off a great day! Other services through the month have gone well. A few people have indicated that they would like to give their testimony, so we look forward to seeing where and how God has been and is taking them.

As far as maintenance goes, the door to the hall will need to be rubbed back and re-painted as the paint is buckling badly. The painter will come back once the heat dissipates. New fly screens for the double doors are to be installed too. A big thank you to Bill, Barry and NZ Brian

who erected the “No Entry” and “One Way” signs to help with the flow of traffic around the church. The gardening team and helpers continue to keep the grounds and cemetery tidy.

A small group of us recently met with two members of the South Road Alliance to discuss the ground water problem. We have had the driest year in decades but it is noticeable that groundwater has been damaging the stonework of the church. Unfortunately, no solutions were provided, but they did say they will take our concerns back to those in a higher authority. We hope we will have a suitable resolution to this ongoing problem.

As a fundraiser to help repairs caused by this situation we are having a 'Sunset Soirée' at Brian McMillan's home (Hay's House) on Saturday 26<sup>th</sup> April. 

Numbers attending the vestry this year were somewhat down on last year, but this may have been due to the sweltering 36 degree heat that day. Those attending were grateful to the St Margaret's team for putting the air conditioning on well in advance so the Sunday School Room was cool.

The reports for the meeting were circulated to all the faith centres before the meeting and so do not require repeating here. As this was Fr Brenton's last Vestry meeting as Vicar, a vote of thanks and appreciation was given for his time with us. Speaking to this, Brian noted that in all Fr Brenton's dealings with "unchurched" people who came to him, most of whom were dealing with situations involving births or deaths, he had a great gift of getting alongside them and bringing them to where they wanted to be. Lyn Dick was also thanked, for all the gardening work she had put in to the houses they had lived in.

Those who attend or work on the big annual event in Yankalilla will be delighted to hear that the Big Strawberry is likely to appear again this year!

A question had been raised about the longer term plan for the parish and the diocese, as it is now over a year since the Bishop was suspended from duties on 16<sup>th</sup> January 2024. The situation continues to be addressed by the Episcopal Standards Commission. Thus, the Diocese cannot undertake longer term forward planning until the situation with the Bishop is resolved, although Diocesan Council, and Synod at its meeting in June 2025, will deal with immediate requirements.

In answer to a question raised about our parish's involvement with the national church Hope 25 Programme (see p. 2), consideration was being given to our meeting up with the diocesan Murray River

Venture at one of its stopping points.

A local example of the church getting alongside others was the connection with the Aldinga-Sellicks Alliance, which addresses the social needs of the community. Margaret Cale is involved in their meetings and is regularly amazed at all she learns from them.

The Treasurer reported a year of consolidation of finances, mainly due to our having to pay only one stipend. However, giving in 2024 was down \$6,000. With a cheerfully coloured graph Margaret illustrated how our parish finances were spent. In a question about the diocesan assessment we pay annually, she explained that the diocese required that to cover administrative functions such as payroll, insurance and the like which are delivered by the Diocese on behalf of the parishes.

As we are still in the triennium there were no elections needed except those required through resignations. Steve Banner will be away at the time of Synod. Peter Filsell was appointed a Synod Representative and Christi Banner and Anne Chittleborough as substitutionary reps. Synod 2025 will be at Seaford Christian Churches, June 20-21<sup>st</sup>.

A splendid afternoon tea and a chance to mingle and catch up with friends from other centres concluded the Vestry meeting.

## News from St Stephen's, Willunga

March was an eventful month in many ways, starting with the return of Jo Parsons and her husband Neil from the UK. Although their stay in Australia will only be a temporary one, we were all very happy to see them both and made sure they received a very warm welcome back into our congregation.

Given that March falls during a period of the year when the weather is changing from one season to the next, we usually expect a bit of unsettled weather activity in our town that includes rain and strong winds. Even though the rain decided not to make anything other than a short cameo appearance, Windy Willunga lived up to its reputation to the extent that the wooden fence on the northern side of the church property was blown over. The photo shows how things looked after the storm, but at the time of writing this piece, the fallen fence had been removed entirely. In other words, several days after the storm it appears that someone took offence, (but where that fence was taken to I do not know)!

Fortunately, the collapse of the fence took place some distance away from the new plants that our faithful team of gardeners has installed and thus no damage was

done to the new plantings. Our gardening team in fact has shown themselves to be an example of the gospel of the fig tree from Luke that we read during the month, where the gardener made it clear that plants must be cared for and attended to on a regular basis if we are to expect them to thrive and bear the fruit of which they are capable. Of course, the same principle applies to ourselves, where we must continually feed and nurture our own faith to become truly fruitful Christians.

During the month we continued our preparation for "life after Brenton" with a lay-led Evening Prayer service on the first Saturday and Prayer, Praise and Proclamation on the third. Meanwhile, Fr. Brenton conducted a Holy Eucharist service on the second and fourth Saturdays, and a Contemplative Prayer service on the fifth Saturday. And rather than relying solely on Fr Brenton, our weekly Tuesday morning Meditation services are now being led by a different member of the congregation each week.



### Heritage Grant Application for Christ Church

At the March Council meeting it was decided that we would apply for a State Heritage Grant for the following work –

- \* Repairs to the cracks in the main room of the Hall and repair of plaster work above the veranda by the door.
- \* Repairs to cracks and damaged timber in various parts of the Church.
- \* Painting the interior of the Church.
- \* Painting the roof of the Church.

We have received quotes totalling about \$24,000, so we will be applying for a grant of about \$12,000.

If we are successful with our application, we will have 12 months to complete the work. This would allow us to get Peter Russell to do the plaster work early in the process and allow it to cure before we paint the interior.

If we are successful with our application, we will need to work out how to fund our share of the work. (If we are not successful, we may still be able to do the repair work, at least, as the quote for this was \$3550.)

Since our Sunday services have changed from 9am to 11am, we are now missing out on our post-service fellowship over a cuppa. So we have introduced a once a month opportunity to catch up at 10.30am on the second Sunday of each month in the hall. Though this is a brief time, we would love to see everyone pop in and let us know how you are.

On Sunday 30<sup>th</sup> March a number from Christ Church were able to join the Combined Service at St Ann's and contribute to and enjoy the day's celebration and farewell to Fr Brenton (photos pp 4, 13-15).

### EAT TOGETHER, PRAY TOGETHER

On Sunday March 2<sup>nd</sup>, a meeting called "Eat Together, Pray Together" was held in the Yankalilla Community Church at 5.30pm. Denominations represented were the

Jesus Community Church, Christ Church Anglican, Yankalilla Uniting Church, and the Yankalilla Lutheran Fellowship. It was organised by the Yankalilla District Interchurch Council.

We were introduced to the process of Visitor Welcoming in which Church teams visit new folks coming into the district and present them with a Welcome Pack containing information about our churches. A new magazine is being developed for inclusion.

### "Walking with Jesus"

#### "I am the Truth" study led by Wendy Lindsay

Our Bible study text was John 18, 28-38, where Jesus was tried by Pilate after being handed over to him by the Jews. Jesus explained to Pilate that his kingdom was a spiritual one and was not of this world. He said that the reason he came into the world was – "to testify to the truth". Pilate's cynical answer to this was "What is truth?" after which he tried one last time to have Jesus released since it was the custom at the time of Passover; but the crowd chose Barrabas.

We remembered the experience of Jesus in the wilderness where he was tempted by the devil to bow down to him in exchange for "all the kingdoms of the world". Jesus resisted with the words of scripture; "Worship only the Lord and serve Him alone".

In another place he said, "The kingdom of God is within you". This was the truth that he wanted to reveal. We contrasted this with two world leaders who are presently trying to extend their kingdoms by invading other countries with little appreciation of true greatness.

Discussing Pilate's question about the nature of truth we found that sometimes it is indeed very difficult to discover the truth about our world. Think of a jury which is trying to determine the truth of accusations against the defendant. Or scientific truth, where concepts of the nature of our world may be limited by information based on the technologies available at the time. Think of light, which has been described as both a wave form and as particles. Which is it? In this case we cannot presently know the real truth, but over time more investigations can refine our understanding.

We often hear people justify their beliefs based on what they call "my truth". This is fair enough since we all have different experiences. So how do we discover The TRUTH that Jesus was talking about?

It is what we read in holy scripture with the help of the Holy Spirit, who was sent to "lead us into all truth".

## News from St Nicholas', S.C.E., Seaford

Our Family Service on March 2<sup>nd</sup> took the Gospel as its inspiration. The Transfiguration can be a tricky topic to cover and explain well enough to the young people at our service. We found a great YouTube video <https://youtu.be/K7rq18BbbwA> which explained it very well, using the image of a homemade tent as the special place we can keep Jesus and the prophets, so we could all see and worship their glory. The speaker also thought we should all look at moving outside the tent and letting others see the wonder and splendour of God's glory and let Christ shine for everyone, not just us snug in the tent! The young people also saw how to make things appear and disappear, a mystery just like the disciples saw with Jesus and the prophets revealed. We used lemon juice to write messages on paper and these, as we all know, are mysteriously revealed when the paper is heated. Unfortunately, modern technology let us down a bit with the video, and we had to improvise part of the service until we could get things running again. Helen came to the rescue, finding hymn books and adding to the story of the transfiguration.

On the 9<sup>th</sup> of March our Round Table Service marked the beginning of Lent. Our theme was "Surviving the Wilderness", reflecting on the temptation of Jesus in the desert. We discussed how "desert" for us might mean a difficult life experience, rather than somewhere physical, and sometimes we may retreat to a remote place inside ourselves to survive. We looked at the tools Jesus used to survive in the face of difficult circumstances (being tempted by the devil). These were his security in his identity as the Son of God, his knowledge of Scripture, and God's instructions on how to live. Filled with the Holy Spirit and secure in the Word of God, Jesus had what he needed to survive and grow. Could we apply these same tools to our own experiences and learn and lean on Jesus' response?

Jesus quoted from the scriptures: Deuteronomy 8:3, "Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God"; Deuteronomy 6.13


"Fear the LORD your God, serve him only and take your oaths in his name"; Deuteronomy 6.16 "Do not put the Lord your God to the test as you did at Massah". We made paper rucksacks to which we added quotes from scripture, prayers, thoughts and people who could be part of our collection of "tools" to aid us in our continuing journey of faith

At our healing service on the 16<sup>th</sup> of March we were again blessed with the presence of Fr Ian Young. During the service Fr Ian anointed and prayed for those who came forward following communion. He preached on the Gospel (Luke Chapter 13) with Jesus crying over Jerusalem and the lack of understanding of the Prophets, as he foreshadowed his entry into Jerusalem.

Our Service on the 23<sup>rd</sup> of March was ably led by Fr Chris Talbot. He spoke about the importance of love and kindness to each other, forgiveness for those who, for

whatever reason, hurt or harm us, our call to see Christ in everyone and treat them accordingly, without judgement.

On the 30<sup>th</sup> of March there will be a combined service at St Ann's. At the

St Nicholas' will join with St Margaret's on Easter day.



## World Day of Prayer

World Day of Prayer 2025 was celebrated this year at the McLaren Vale Uniting Church and was attended by several from our parish. The WDP is a global ecumenical movement inviting people of all denominations to gather annually for prayer. The service is prepared by a different country each year, and locally the churches take it in turns to host the occasion. This year's service had been prepared by women of the Cook Islands and was based on the words of Psalm 139, "I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made.

Wonderful are your works; that I know right well."

"Kia orana", we greeted each other when we met for worship. The hall was decorated with fruit and foods, island-style. The singing, opening with "I danced in the morning when the world was begun", led by Paul Bagshaw on the saxophone and Rosemary Nairne on the keyboard, was a spirit-lifting introduction to stories told by women of the Cook Islands, and prayers for them and for women everywhere.

## Snippets from WFA Council, 17<sup>th</sup> March

**St James' Delamere:** Two objections to the sale had been received. Both were analysed and consideration given to all issues raised, but they were both considered to be without foundation.

**Hope 25:** The canoe trip down the Murray by Archdeacon McDougall would initiate discussions with the riverside communities on what the church could do for their community. Locally, we could be asking people in our communities – what do they want from the church? Julia to draft a survey which could go on facebook and also be put in local Community Pages. (See p. 3)

**The Secretary** reported that legislature requires all public buildings to have a defibrillator. The Diocese was offering a grant to assist parishes. Defibrillators are required for St Margaret's, St Stephen's and Christ Church

**Finances:** See Vestry report.

**St Stephen's** was working out how to manage the two months that the Banners would be away, and were meeting with St Margaret's Pastoral Assistants to make plans. Steve would be away for Synod. Instead of working with powerpoints they planned to have printed services for the Communion, PPP and Evensong services. Steve had led their first Evensong, from A Prayer Book for Australia, and it had been well received.

**St Nicholas'** would no longer hold combined services with the Uniting Church on the fifth Sundays of the month, since they have no priest. This would mean that they could join the rest of the parish on those days. Their services were being well received, especially the Round Table service, and the Family Services are enjoyed by all. St Nicholas' may not be able to have a priest for their Easter service, but could transfer their people to St Margaret's. (see p. 9)

They have no maintenance issues, only financial ones!



Our fellowship began informally with tea/coffee chocolate biscuits and the opportunity to catch up, with visitor Jo Parsons being welcomed back after 6 months in England.

Takoohi Baban (Queenie)

was in our thoughts as we wondered how she was faring in her new home in Sydney at Alexander Aged Care, Brookvale, NSW which specialises in Armenian Culture.

It had been announced that King Charles has appointed HRH Princess of Edinburgh (Sophie, wife of Prince Edward) as the Royal Patron for Mothers Union Worldwide. Her Royal Highness is known for her "experience and commitment to championing the most marginalised, particularly those who are impacted by violence and abuse in conflict".

Susan Skowronski, a Social Action & Issues Co-ordinator for MU, had written in the latest *Mia Mia* how her recent time in hospital had given her the opportunity to better appreciate the glory of God's creation, particularly the birds and flora she could observe from her hospital bed. Following the lighting of the candle, our need to appreciate our environment was echoed in our MU service, as was the task of the MU in seeking to love and serve the most marginalised and vulnerable in our communities.




