Hope 25

As people of faith we have great joy in the hope that we have in Jesus at Easter and his victory over death. As a national church we as Anglicans have found that in the time after Easter and towards Pentecost is a perfect time to engage in a mission of hope across Australia.



In the Diocese of The Murray, one of the 23 dioceses in the national church, we have chosen to embrace this Hope 25 mission project with a journey of listening. Listening to God in the natural beauty of our diocese and in listening to the needs/hopes of the broad diversity of the population in our diocesan region.

Hope is a reframing of our sense of identity, of being, of purpose and of future planning. During this Hope 25 mission journey therefore we endeavour to collect the stories of need and hope to inform and enrich our future missional planning as parishes and as the whole diocese.

As we have travelled down the river, following the pathway of the old Home Mission paddle steamer 'PS *Etona*', we have visited churches and communities, shared stories, meals, and the Eucharist with them. There has been a collective sense of dignity as people feel that they have been acknowledged and heard as we are invited into their space.

At the conclusion of this mission journey we will create a document containing the feedback from the shared stories and the voices of all we have encountered on this journey and let this inform our diocesan mission strategy in sharing the Good News that the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand in the years ahead.

Fr Brenton writes...



From my journal, 12th July 2015

"THE DAY IS HERE! Well, the day is here when I am to be ordained a priest. Feeling quite calm at the moment but expect nerves to kick in. Have a house full of people. Mum, Vicki (Lyn's sister) Nigel and Tessa. Organized my first Eucharist for tomorrow and went for a nice long walk. Felt good. Brother Leon and Dot should be here soon and it will be great to have big brother to share this moment with me. Stay tuned and watch this space.

2pm. Ordination is at 3pm. Brother Leon arrived and had lunch. A few nerves starting. Great to have support of family.

Well, what a day! WOW! Fairly nervy at the beginning but a calm came over me a little into the service. Hard to explain. The Bishop asked me to make a cross that I could be crucified on and it turned out a bit bigger than I thought. At least 195cm high. I dragged it down the aisle from the rear of the church when everyone was quiet. You could have heard a pin drop. All I could hear was the scrape of the cross on the floor. A very powerful moment. Then I stood before the Bishop and he started the examination. I prostrated myself before the altar for prayers. Still calm, with a sense of belonging. I knelt before the Bishop and when he and the other priests laid hands on me – well I got this incredible feeling of love and the power of the Holy Spirit. Just too hard to explain. The rest of the service went well and after we processed out the Bishop knelt and said, "Father, I ask for your blessing." I laid hands on the Bishop and gave him a blessing, and he stood and bowed and kissed my hands. A very powerful moment."

And the rest, folks, is history.

My ministry will change after my retirement? and will continue on in a different way.

Vale Joyce Newing 10/4/1930—7/4/2025

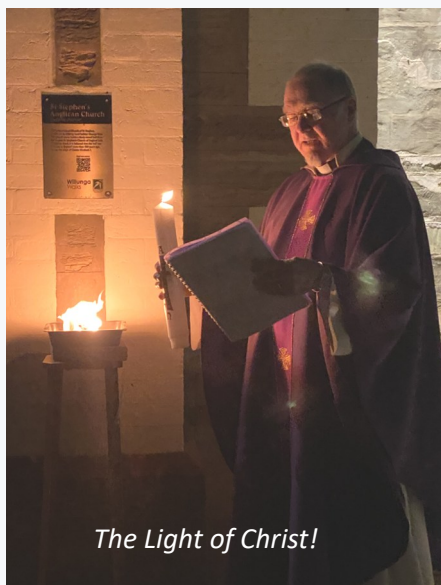

The Light of Christ!

It feels like the month of April arrived at St Stephen's and left almost before we knew it. We had been preparing for both Easter and the eventual retirement of Fr Brenton several months in advance, but the weeks of April just flew by. As per our "post-Brenton" schedule, the lay-led service of Evening Prayer took place on the first Saturday of the month, followed by Fr Brenton conducting Holy Eucharist on the second Saturday. This latter service was, as usual, followed by our monthly night out with dinner at the middle pub. Although we will miss having Fr Brenton at the dinner table with us, please rest assured that this monthly tradition will most definitely continue! (See below for further details).

On the third Saturday of the month, Fr Brenton conducted the Lighting of the New Fire service, the first Easter service in the parish, with the lighting of the Paschal Candle, the renewal of baptism vows, and asperges. (*More photos p. 13*) It was a beautiful service, and well attended.

But all too soon the calendar ticked over inevitably to the fourth and last Saturday of the month and Fr Brenton celebrated his final Eucharist service at St Stephen's before his retirement. We could not pass up the opportunity to

wish him a long, happy and healthy retirement while we presented him with a gift basket of donations by St Stephen's parishioners.

Looking to the future, our schedule for each month will be a lay-led Evening Prayer service on the first Saturday, and a lay-led Prayer, Praise and Proclamation (PPP) on the third. Meanwhile, visiting priests will conduct Holy Eucharist service on the second and fourth Saturdays. When a fifth Saturday occurs there will be a lay-led Contemplative Prayer service. Our weekly 9am Tuesday morning Meditation services will continue, led by a different member of the congregation each week. This general schedule of services will continue for the foreseeable future, although there will be some minor changes during the next few months while Christi and I are away on holiday in the United States from May 24th to August 1st. During that 10-week period we are very fortunate to have some volunteers from St Margaret's and St Ann's who will help to lead services and assist our visiting priests. I want to extend a big thank you to all who are helping – in particular John Strachan who will lead Evening Prayer, and Judy Wells who will assist the visiting priests. It is this support we show for one another that is such a special part of our parish and faith.

As a reminder, all are invited to join us on Saturday May 10th (the second Saturday) for our monthly Night Out as we visit the Hotel Willunga (the "middle pub") for dinner at 6.30pm immediately after our 5.30pm weekly service. An invitation to the dinner will be sent out via email earlier that same week, but if you're not on my mailing list and would like to attend the dinner, please feel free to contact me by email at LMESTBA@YAHOO.COM or by phone at 0404 163 940. Everyone is most welcome to join us.

Normally we are asked to make a choice from the menu in advance, so that the hotel can have our meals ready for us shortly after our arrival, and we avoid the long waiting times that sometimes occur on a busy Saturday night. When I am away in June and July, the group will simply go directly to the hotel after the 2nd Saturday service. I have reserved for 10 people each month under the name of St Stephen's.

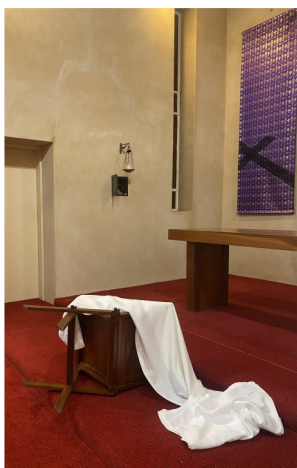
Fr Ian celebrated the Eucharist on **Palm Sunday** with palm crosses supplied by the working party at St Nicholas', and the church decorated with palms and appropriate banners by Julia.

Maundy Thursday.

Fr Brenton was available to organise and celebrate the commemoration of washing of feet and the Last Supper. After this all the reserved sacrament was consumed, the sanctuary stripped and the altar covering dragged off the altar and left draped over one of the priest's chairs, signifying



the betrayal and abandonment of Jesus. The service was conducted with only the sanctuary lights on and once the sanctuary was stripped, these too were extinguished and time was allowed for those who wished to stay, pray and meditate. The congregation left in silence. It was a very moving service.



On Good Friday the service was at St Ann's, but at St Margaret's the choir Cantate Dominum, conducted by Sue Russell, performed **Stainer's Crucifixion**, with organist Rosalind Gallasch and soloists Greg John and Curtis Antram. (Photos p. 14)

Easter day was joyous. The Easter banners were up and there were once again flowers in the church. The

congregation of St Nicholas' joined us and added their voices to ours in hymns of praise and prayers. Fr Brenton was happy to bless two Pascal Candles. He also took a great deal of delight in dowsing all present with water from the font, being very conscientious, ensuring no one missed out, including himself.

The Wednesday services have continued, followed by Bible Study. During Lent Jenny made a point of ringing the bell and ensuring that the "Church is Open" sign was out prior to the service and as a result we had a mother and son come in for some quiet time, and a previous parishioner return. The Bible study sessions included more cake than usual as we celebrated birthdays and Fr Brenton's last session as our parish priest. Both the Wednesday Service and Bible study will continue, sometimes lay led. Jenny has prepared a simple guide setting out the format of the Bible study. However it will be flexible and, as always, as the Holy Spirit moves us.

We have also had some sorrow this month. Roger Dew, a long time member of both the St Philip and St James' congregation and then St Margaret's died at the beginning of the month (*see below*). Julia's aunt also died just before Easter, as did Jac's brother. Our prayers are with their families.

As always thank you to all those people throughout the Parish who generously gave their time to help us as needed. May God continue to bless us all as we continue to step forward in faith.

Vale Roger Dew 1937-2025

Born in London, Roger Dew joined the Air Force as an engineer and was posted to Malaysia. Demobbed in 1960 he moved to Australia in 1981 and worked as a computer engineer.

He married Brenda in 1986. They enjoyed travelling, but at home they worshipped at St Philip & St James', Old Noarlunga until it closed, and following that at St Margaret's, McLaren Vale.



Gillian's Corner: For many years the North-East corner of the Sanctuary at St Ann's has been known as "Gillian's Corner", in honour of Gillian Clappett who, with her unerring artistic flair, has enriched and enlivened that space Sunday by Sunday with a display related to the Service, the Readings, or the issues of the moment. Gillian's contribution has been greatly valued and appreciated. Gillian has now relinquished that responsibility to Margaret Morgan, whose display was admired on Easter Day (*photo p. 16*).

The theme for our Family Service on 6th April, led by John Morgan, was "What really matters?" In his message Brian McMillan suggested that what *really* matters is God, His power, His love, our relationship with Jesus and knowing Him as Paul wanted to know Him, above all else. He mentioned Mary's example of love and devotion to Jesus and how giving generously is important to Jesus, with some opportunities only coming along once! Brian finished by quoting from a homily by his old friend Father McDermott OP which concluded " . . . For us right now, Jesus is the one who tells us the way to live in the world, tells us the truth about God and about ourselves, and presents a sort of life that really matters."

Palm Sunday: The two aspects of Palm Sunday – triumph preceding tragedy – are captured in two hymns particularly apposite for this day. The first – "Trotting, trotting through Jerusalem" – "should be sung with appreciation of the good-humoured depiction of the donkey in the accompaniment, and with a jubilation like that with which children and adults greeted the Lord on the first Palm Sunday" as Professor Wesley Milgate says in *Songs of the People of God*. The words were written and the tune composed by Eric James Reid (1936-1970) whose early promise as a musician was cut short by his death in a motor vehicle accident.

The text of the second speaks for itself, with new words to a well-known tune:

Ride on, ride on, the time is right;
the roadside crowds scream with delight;
palm branches mark the pilgrim way
where beggars squat and children play.

Ride on, ride on, though blind with tears,
though dumb to speak and deaf to jeers.
Your path is clear, though few can tell
their garments pave the road to hell.

Ride on, ride on, your critics wait,
intrigue and rumour circulate;
new lies abound in word and jest,
and trust becomes a suspect guest.

Ride on, ride on, the room is let,
the wine matured, the saw is whet;
and dice your death-throes shall attend
though faith, not fate, dictates your end.

Ride on, ride on, while well aware
that those who shout and wave and stare
are mortals who, with common breath,
can crave for life and lust for death.

Ride on, ride on, God's love demands.
Justice and peace lie in your hands.
Evil and angels' voices rhyme:
this is the man and this the time.

These words were written by the well-known hymnodists Reverend John Lamberton Bell (1949-) and Graham Maule (1958-2019).

Good Friday: Stations of the cross. In the course of this sombre and contemplative service, which was led this year by Barry Bates, the journey of Christ to the Cross was symbolised by each Station being carried to and placed on the altar by the person leading each devotion, and then moved to the East Wall of the Church, where they remain as a reminder during the Easter Season. Many commented on how moving this service was and how they hadn't expected their tears to flow.

In matching the crosses our Lord had to bear with modern day happenings, it brought home to us the enormity of His sacrifice.

Easter Day: As usual, a large congregation celebrated the Resurrection. The Easter Cross, covered with ivy, awaited the placing of flowers as people arrived: despite the



absence of rain, plenty of flowers were provided – we appreciate the generosity of those who brought them. The decorated Cross remained in place in the church after the service because of the strong wind, instead of being displayed adjacent to Main South Road as it normally is, as an inspiration to passers-by.

Our last Friends meeting was combined with our AGM. All was straightforward with offices being held by the same people for the following year. Victoria gave a detailed report from the gardening team and plans for planting when the roadworks issues are resolved, relaying concerns for the health of the soil and plants in this season of drought. An outdoor table and seats have been donated to us from Natalie and Hank from Down South Distillery/Agostinos further down Stonehouse Lane, and these have already proved to be a great asset. We had a meeting with representatives from the Alliance

regarding unfinished road works issues such as the completion of the shared path, parking and water and drainage issues. It has been suggested we enquire about contacting a hydrographer to give expert advice on the water situation.

Our Family Service on April 6th

We continued following Jesus on his journey to Jerusalem. The gospel talks of Mary and Martha and the opportunity to thank Jesus once again for bringing their brother Lazarus back to life. Finding a YouTube video sometimes helps bring the story to life to both young people and adults, and gives us ideas on how we can give thanks. (<https://youtu.be/J026kmAlHow>). We learned that in following Jesus there is space, indeed need, for personal acts of kindness shown in thoughtful actions, more than just words. This is what Mary did by anointing Jesus' feet with expensive oil, not only giving thanks but showing love and care almost as if she knew that he was going to be killed. So we explored being thankful to God, appreciating the big and little things that make life special, that make us feel alive, that make our hearts sing. The young people made "chatterboxes" – brightly coloured, with suggestions inside about how they could help and show kindness to others (see p. 21).

Palm Sunday: April 13th began with our Round Table Service Coffee and Chat before we went out to join the Catholic congregation for the Liturgy of the Palms. We gathered round the Grace Fountain in the Garden,



hearing again the story of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. The palm crosses were distributed and blessed before we processed back into the church, palms waving, and singing "Hosanna to the King of Kings".

Our worship afterwards followed the story again: the image of a servant king riding on a donkey led us on this Palm Sunday to explore the nature of servanthood, and how God calls us to serve – even when we feel as if we are the most unlikely choice. We thought of the donkey and how it felt: happily minding its own business, and suddenly taken away from all that was familiar, riding with an unfamiliar human on its back, surrounded by loads of excited people shouting and calling out. God seems to have a way of calling people who are not the obvious choice. We, like the donkey, might feel totally

unprepared, but find that, nevertheless, we can do what we've been called to!

On **Good Friday** an Ecumenical Service was held at SCC with people from all congregations taking part. The story of the Passion of Jesus was read interspersed with reflections and singing. The entrance to the worship space was made to look like a tomb, with the stone being rolled to cover the entrance as we all left the service in silent meditation. A very moving service.



On **Easter Day**, April 20th there was not a service at St Nicholas'. Our congregation joined with the United Church at 9am or joined with St Margaret's Congregation at McLaren Vale. Whichever venue was chosen, we all came to sing our praises in worship of the Risen Lord. The new Pascal Candles, one for St Margaret's and one for St Nicholas' were duly blessed by Fr Brenton, ready for another year of service in their places of worship. St Margaret's congregation loudly proclaimed the day with that wonderful Easter Hymn "Christ the Lord is Risen Today". Fr Brenton preached one of his last sermons as Vicar of the WFA and as always offered words of wisdom and insight into that first Easter morning.

On the 27th April Fr Alex Bainton led us in our worship. It was great to see him and his wife Cheryl join us, and we look forward to seeing them more often in the future. The second Sunday of Easter tells of the disciples' meeting with Jesus in the upper room and their surprise and joy at realizing he was truly alive. Fr Alex spoke of the peace Jesus brought to the Upper Room, His peace offered to us all, not worldly peace, but the peace of God which passes all understanding. Jesus' meeting with the disciples and also Thomas, who wanted proof, confirmed the truth of the Resurrection and offers us, as it offered the disciples long ago, the promise of new hope and salvation in Jesus Christ. As Psalm 118 says, "The stone that the builders rejected: has become the head of the corner. 23 This is the Lord's doing: and it is marvellous in our eyes. 24 This is the day that the Lord has made: let us rejoice and be glad in it."

Fellowship A collection of people from WFA, the Catholic community and the UCA, made palm crosses for the Parish and SCC communities on Tuesday 8th April. With lots of patience and laughter we managed to make over 300 crosses, enough for everyone and a few more besides! (photos p. 20).

Schools chaplains

"The best job in the world!"

On Sunday 6th April members of our church attended a special service at the McLaren Vale Outpost Church, where they were introduced to four Pastoral Care Workers (PCWs) commissioned to provide chaplaincy support to students and staff of several local schools. Each spoke of their motivation in undertaking the role, with insights into some of their experiences.

Luke, who provides support to McLaren Vale Primary School and Willunga High School, spoke of the anxiety experienced by children transitioning from year 6 (Primary) to year 7 (High School) and how his

experience with primary school children has helped him support them at this stage of change. His role, he said, provided a voice for churches in the schools and as such was a privilege. He appreciated the financial and practical support and the prayers given by the churches. (Our Gold Coin Donation and our work on the October and November Sausage Sizzle at the Quarry Market contribute to these chaplaincies.)

Hannah (McLaren Flat Primary School) spoke of the importance of having the trust of the teaching staff in order to provide support to children in need. Chris Oxenham (Old Noarlunga Primary School) meets the children in her "office" – an interactive garden which engages children in involvement with nature and growing plants. Nick is about to start chaplaincy at Willunga Primary School – work he calls "the best job in the world".

Representatives of the churches gathered with the chaplains as they were blessed by Pastor David Busby of the Almond Grove Family Church, Aldinga.

St James', Delamere: Diocesan Council has approved the request for the sale. Parish Council representatives will visit the church to see which items need to be removed before sale.

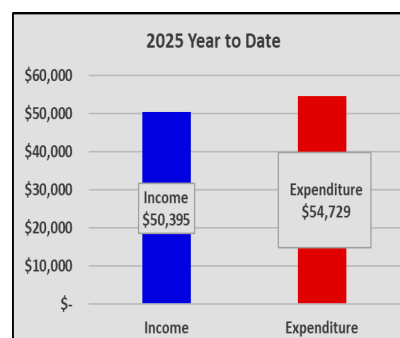
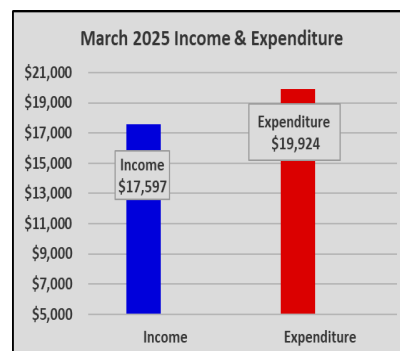

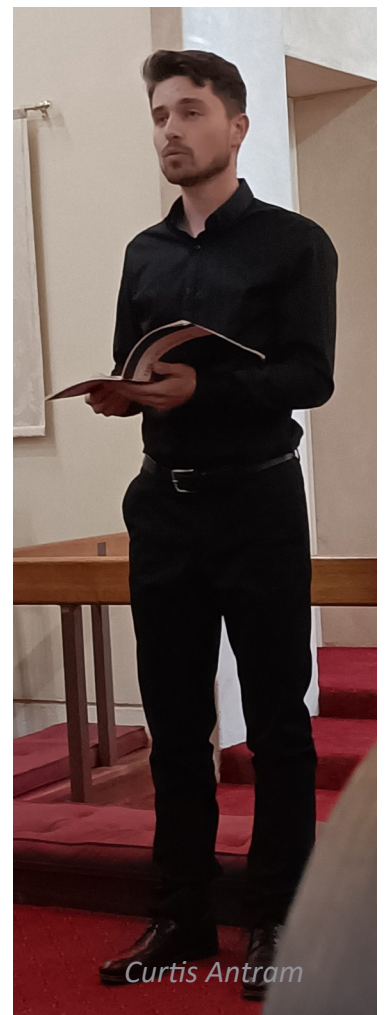

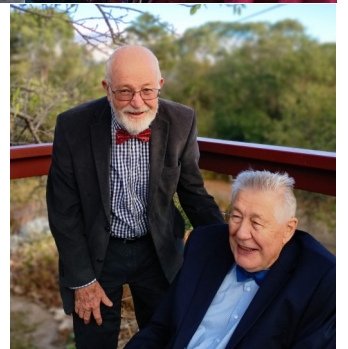

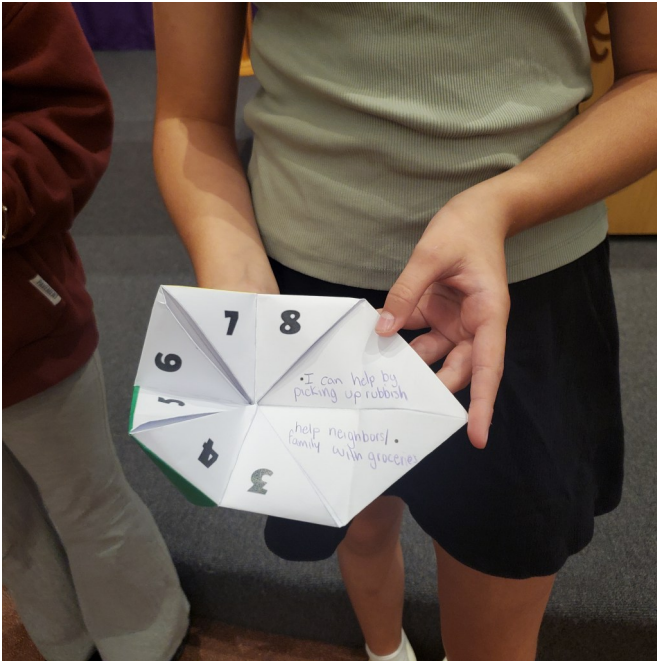
