

A word from the Administrator



On the 15th December following the breaking news of the killings at Bondi, the Administrator, Brother Simon, wrote to the Diocese calling all to prayer and reflection, and asking churches to be left open as places of silence, candlelight and prayer.

“Let our churches be spaces where grief can be carried, tears can fall, and hope can be gently spoken back into the world. Let our buildings become sanctuaries not only of faith, but of shared humanity. “

“The violent attack at Bondi”, he wrote, “has shaken our nation and wounded our shared sense of safety. We hold in our hearts those who have been killed, those who are injured, and all who are traumatised by what they have seen and endured. We grieve with families, friends, first responders, and communities whose lives have been forever altered by this horror.

“There are moments when words are inadequate. This is one of them. Our Christian response is not one to rush to explanation or easy answers. Instead, we pause. We lament. We pray. We stand alongside the broken-hearted, trusting that God is closest where pain is deepest.

“In the face of terror and violence, the Church is called not to fear, but to love more deeply. Not to divide, but to witness to our shared humanity. We reject any impulse that turns grief into blame, or sorrow into suspicion. We affirm, without qualification, that every human life is sacred, and that we all, without exception, are children held within the mercy of God. St Francis of Assisi teaches us to respond to darkness not with power, but with presence, not with hatred, but with compassion and not with despair, but with quiet faithfulness. This is not weakness. It is Gospel courage.”

A parish prayer vigil at St Margaret’s was led by Rev Beck on Monday 15th December.



Rev Beck writes on the feast of Epiphany



The Feast of the Epiphany celebrates God made visible to the whole world. Through the journey of the Magi, we are reminded that Christ comes not only for the familiar and faithful, but for all who are willing to seek Him. Guided by a single star, the Magi set out with courage, patience, and trust, even when the path ahead was uncertain.

Their journey invites us to reflect on our own. We, too, are called to follow God’s light, often without knowing exactly where it will lead. Along the way, Epiphany teaches us to stay attentive—to notice the signs of God’s presence in ordinary moments and unexpected encounters.

As the Magi offered their gifts with joy, we are invited to bring our own lives before Christ, allowing His light to transform us and to shine through us for others.

Vale Fr John Devenport, 1931- 2025

Fr John Devenport, who assisted his son Paul at the time Fr Paul was the Assistant Priest in the Southern Vales, died on the 22nd December, aged 94. He assisted Fr Paul in what were then the four churches of the Southern Vales between 2010 and 2014, taking services once a month at St Ann's.

Before entering full-time ministry he was a university lecturer in Chemistry. He was ordained deacon in 1987 and priest in 1989, serving in the Diocese of Adelaide and the Diocese of Willochra as well as The Murray.

Fr John continued his ministry in our Diocese by serving in the Riverland, Mt Barker and Mannum, Mt Pleasant and Mt Torrens until six years ago.

He died peacefully on Monday 22nd December. His funeral will be held at St Saviour's, Glen Osmond at 10 am on Tuesday 6th of January. May he rest in peace and rise in glory.

News from St Stephen's, Willunga

What happened to 2025? By the time you read this article we will already be a few days into 2026. But before we head into thoughts of the new year ahead, let's look back at the month of December, where we ended 2025 in fine style.

Early in the month our "Pilgrims' Return" event was held at St Margaret's with Fr Brenton and myself recounting some of our adventures on the Camino Frances, supported by photos and videos (see p. 4). Thank you to all who attended and shared the Spanish-themed supper with us.

A few weeks ago our regular attendance numbers at our Tuesday morning Meditation service increased by two. Lisa lives near to the church and had often walked by, wondering if she and her companion might be able to join in with us. When Lisa and Paddy came for the first time, it seemed that they both enjoyed the experience, as Paddy silently closed her eyes, seemingly doggedly contemplating the profoundness of Christian Meditation and our shared place in the world as she stretched out on her bed. We warmly welcome both Lisa and Paddy, hoping that Paddy will follow faithfully in the pawprints of Mallee, a longtime attendee at St Ann's.

On the Saturday before Christmas we were scheduled to hold our annual Crib and Carols service. A combination of improving weather conditions, the creativity of Rev Beck, and the musical flexibility of Brian McMillan meant that we were able to hold our service outdoors in the garden in front of the church (p. 1). The "Stations of the Nativity" service was designed by Beck and accompanied by Brian on his portable keyboard, while supported by the parish choir and Cantate Dominum. The service had been advertised and was attended by some 55 people including someone from Sellicks Hill who had seen the advertising. Conducting a service outside had long been a dream of ours in the past, but circumstances (most often the weather) had prevented us from following through on the idea. In this case, the service came together very well with the support of our fellow Western Fleurieu helpers from other churches who brought chairs and a loudspeaker to set out among the pews carried out from the church. The service was lovely and worked well thanks to the teamwork of Beck, Brian and our fellow parishioners.

The final Saturday of the month coincided with St Stephen's Day and we used the occasion to celebrate our Patron Saint at the regular Holy Eucharist service. Rev Beck's sermon focused on the example set for us by St Stephen, in particular his ability and willingness to forgive those who persecuted him. Also, she noted that although he had no theological training to prepare him to preach the Gospel, he nevertheless stepped boldly forward to tell the truth of Christ – even though it was to cost him his life. A good example indeed. What do **we** have to fear?

As a reminder, Our monthly Saturday Night Out takes

place at the middle pub in Willunga immediately following the 5.30pm Evening Prayer service. For the next two months, these dates will be January 3rd and February 7th. All are welcome. Church Services

Advent has come and gone and Christmas is upon us with all the anticipation, joy and the associated uproar it brings. I like the prayer we say when lighting the Advent Candles about taking quiet moments to be with God, to listen and pray: it reminded me every week to take those moments.

Our services went well as usual with the input from Rev Beck, Greg and our Lay Ministry Team. The first Sunday of the month we had Morning Prayer and we switched from the First Order of Service to the Second with John Strachan preaching on the meaning of Advent. Rev Beck celebrated the Eucharist for us on the next Sunday.

The third Sunday was a Prayer, Praise and Proclamation service and instead of or as part of the address the

Christmas Tree was decorated with our Chrismons (white and gold hand-made decorations using ancient symbols to tell the story of Christ).

Margaret Cameron made them for us many years ago. Greg researched the meanings and acted as narrator during the decorating in which all present took part.

As it was a PPP service, Jac made us mementos, the wherewithal to create a

Christingle (photo p. 16): an orange to represent the world, red tape to represent God's love for the world, a candle to represent Jesus as he shows us what God is like, four cocktail sticks representing the four corners of the world and sweets to represent the good gifts given to us by God. There was also a Yule Cake for morning tea. The service ran late.

The carol service on Christmas Eve followed the pattern



from last year with a few modifications. Six lessons were read by various members of the congregation. Five young visitors brought up figures for the nativity scene, and finally one nonagenarian carried up the baby Jesus. Her daughter lit the Christ candle. Rev Beck read the last lesson and from there progressed to the celebration of Communion. Bubbles and berries followed the service. There were 56 people present and although not everyone received communion 10 people came up for a blessing.



Maintenance

Following the large amount of rain we had in November, our driveway began to suffer on the northern side from a rivulet of water coming down the slope from the rectory and its surrounds. However, with the permission of the Church Council Greg was able to organise the people who graded the road to dig a drain under it to carry the water down into the open paddock. The outlet is guarded by posts and bunting, the inlet by a plastic cone. The last-named will be replaced by a grid.

Our lawnmower service came again before Christmas so the paddock looked neat and tidy and Trish Frith came and weeded and pruned the roses. Thank you Trish. On the day before the Christmas Eve Service a few of us came together to clean and prepare the church for the service. A special thanks to Wendy who took time from her busy schedule to assist.

And as always may God continue to be with us in all we do and say, and thank you to all those who have helped us out through the year.

News from St Nicholas', S.C.C., Seaford

The Second Sunday in Advent, 7th December, saw us celebrating our Patronal Festival, as we lit our second candle for Peace. It was lovely to have Rev Beck and her family join with us in our worship and share in our lunch afterwards. In her sermon Rev Beck spoke about the life of St Nicholas and related it to the Gospel reading from Matthew, showing the similarities in John the Baptist's call



to repentance and St Nicholas's sacrificial life; how we should turn towards God and bear fruit – preparing the way of the Lord for all who follow. Sunara, with Helen's grandson Tu, gave out St Nicholas gold coins and a prayer card to the congregation to celebrate St Nicholas' Day.

The third Sunday in Advent was our Round Table service, the 14th December, and we took our theme from the lighting of the third candle for Joy. In the first reading, from Isaiah, the prophet speaks to the people in exile reminding them that there will be a joyful return, and part of this joyful restoration is healing – the eyes that do not see and ears that do not hear are opened, the immobile leap about, the silent sing for joy. Sorrow and sighing will slink off defeated and the exiles will return home rejoicing. The imagery of Isaiah 35 and the season of Advent invite us to imagine a world remade, full of the glory and majesty of God. It is a prophecy of hope and joy as we look forward to the coming of Jesus – the one who fills us with true joy.

The fourth Sunday in Advent was our Nativity Service. Unfortunately several of our young people could not attend but the slack was ably taken up by others in the congregation. Our service followed the Journey of Joseph and Mary to Bethlehem and the joy of the birth of Jesus. The story was retold interspersed with verses from well known Christmas carols and hymns. Cathy More, our pianist, sang an amazing solo rendition of "O Holy Night" as a fitting close to our Nativity. This was also our Healing Service with Fr Ted assisting in the prayers and laying on

of hands. Gifts were presented to the young people in gratitude for their participation in our services each month .



We closed our service by singing the Christmas Blessing:

May the feet of God walk with you,
And His hand hold you tight.
May the eye of God rest on you,
And His ear hear your cry.
May the smile of God be for you,

In the midst of the bright lights and joy of Christmas, we have the darkness and sorrow of the story of the "Holy Innocents" and the account of the holy family fleeing as refugees. Both the joy of the season and the sorrow at the heart of the Gospel reading remind us that all lives are precious. We also see Jesus as a human child, caught up in the politics of the region, in danger: without fleeing, his life would be short; without his parents'

Snippets from December Parish Council

Ministry report: Rev Beck reported that she felt well supported by the Ministry Team. Among other things she maintains a regular Wednesday programme involving the 9am service at St Margaret's, the weekly Bible Study at 10, then a clergy meeting.

Secretary's report: The Annual Vestry Meeting will be on Sunday 15th March. **Vestry reports to be in to Jane by 20th February.**

Christ Church reported excellent results for December's Strawberry Fete. A donation of \$1,500 from this to go to Yankalilla Interchurch Council's Pastoral Care Worker Programme.

With State Heritage grants now open, an application should be put in for replastering, and repair of the church roof. The donation box in the porch needs to be replaced. The Fleurieu Sun (Victor Harbor) was producing a flier with local church times. Yankalilla was considering being included in this.

St Ann's anticipated the Alliance having treatment done on the front doors and the windows of the church to reduce traffic noise.

The property next door (Radio Easy) had been sold and there are new neighbours.

St Margaret's was having repair work done on the

driveway. Money from the car park and from funerals to go into a Special Purpose fund to cover costs. The Treasurer pointed out that churches need to work out ways to fund their projects.

St Nicholas' reported having had a lovely service for their Patronal Festival, All Saints Day, 7th December. Uniting Church minister Rev. Darren Lovell is part of a team of UC/Churches of Christ ministers supporting churches in the area.

Next meeting: Tuesday 13th January at St Ann's, 4pm following the 3pm Ministry Team meeting.



Original plans have been changed: there will not be a MU meeting in January. The next meeting will be held at 9.30am on Monday 2nd February at the Visitors Centre, McLaren Vale.

The Mothers Union will be 150 years old next year. Diocesan celebrations are planned for Wednesday 25th March (Lady Day) at Seaford Christian Churches.

News from St Ann's, Aldinga

The season of Advent has been one of mixed emotions and responses for many at St Ann's this December. Services continue to inspire us and increase our understanding of the scriptures. From a service at the start of Advent, a prayer tree initiated by a member of the ministry team was created and crafted to be a visual reminder of the importance of surrounding others and situations dear to us with prayer. Many thanks Trish Simon for putting in the hours to make the leaves on which our requests were written. People have had the opportunity to add their requests throughout Advent services. At a future service, we are considering burning the prayer leaves as "fragrant incense" pleasing to the Lord. (Psalm 141:2 "May my prayer be set before you like incense" and Revelation 8 where incense smoke rises with all the prayers of the saints to God's throne.)



The evening of December 14th at Bondi brought the awful reality of terror to our shores. During that week, some of us attended a prayer vigil at St Margaret's which was much appreciated. St Ann's church was opened during that week for the community to come and pray. We also contributed to the prayers for the victims, families and members of the Jewish and Muslim communities. As we lit our 4th Advent candle our prayers were added to our symbolic "prayer tree". Most importantly, we have been reminded that God is on His throne, faithful and just, compassionate and true. He is amongst us and as Christmas services resounded, we know His Son has come and will return! We live in trying times, but in God, all is well.

Our Advent Bible study also reflected our varied

emotions and responses this month. It was titled "The Waiting Time" - quite appropriate for this season. Questions that at first seemed hard to answer provided much discussion once the ball started rolling. One section discussed the symbolism of God's presence in the cloud covering the Tabernacle by day and fire at night when Moses and the Israelites were in the desert for 40 years. One participant made an astute comment: "God's presence was with them visibly day and night. If you had a problem, you only had to look!" This is something to ponder.

Many thanks must go to everyone who helped prepare the church for our Christmas service; to those who erected the banners, the extra chairs, children's packs, cards with the Christmas message given to attendees, the flower providers and arrangers, Margaret Morgan for her



"corner" with its crocheted star, Margaret Cale's Power-Point presentation, Brian's beautifully selected hymns and of course, Rev Beck's message. Seventy-eight people attended, the singing was rousing and most participated in communion. What a joyful celebration!




