Synod 2026

Synod 2026 was held at Christ Church, Mt Barker on the 19th-21st June, with attendees including Synod Representatives and Observers from our Parish of Western Fleurieu. What will linger in the memories of those attending will be the news and stories told, the challenges and the ideas shared, the sense of collegiality in working together in the plenary sessions and discussion groups, the companionship shared over a cuppa and over delicious meals, and the impressive teamwork of the parish of Mt Barker in making it all happen so smoothly.

The Administrator's Address on the Friday evening was a challenge to be the Church in a post-Christendom society which, while often rejecting the Church, nevertheless has a longing for spirituality; an invitation to recognise Christ walking beside us as on the road to Emmaus.

In the Saturday morning plenary session Fr Brenton Dick spoke about meditation, and after outlining its background and a way of meditation, led Synod through a ten-minute meditation as an introduction to it. (For those interested, our parish offers meditation on Tuesday mornings at St Stephen's, Willunga at 9am and on Friday mornings at Yankalilla at 9.15am.)

The afternoon session was led by Fr David McDougall. In parish groups members and observers did an audit of the community needs in their area, and a second audit - of the gifts we possess as the Church. Where our gifts offer the potential to meet the needs, was seen as a BINGO point! Where community needs and gifts coincide, Fr David pointed out, this is probably the task we are called to do.

Synod 2026 (Cont'd)

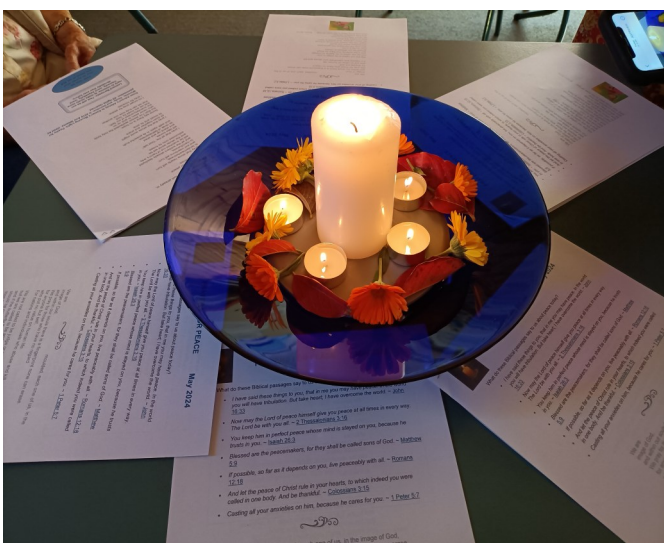
Over the three days at Synod, questions, thoughts and insights were shared and discussed, including:

- * Church begins with each one of us.
- * How can the Diocese help us be the Church in today's society?
- * Why are we being the Church? For the people around us, for our community, for those not yet known, and for the unloved...
- * Young people are asking questions – you see this on Facebook.
- * The importance of approaching schools, circumventing opposition.
- * We serve because we love. Our real business is not on Sunday!
- * Serving others means walking alongside them
- * We need to speak to others “in their local way of understanding”
- * The Church is trusted, “a safe place with good people we can trust”.
- * We have social capital – how can we use it to be more relevant to our communities?
- * Anglican worship, with its consistent pattern of liturgy can be accessible and a “safe place” for neurodivergent people.
- * Ministry in old age homes – the value of eye contact.

Synod weekend was a perfect example of how we work together, especially when the unexpected arises. Our esteemed organist, Brian, took himself off to Synod so for us it was either pre-recorded music, You Tube music or find an organist. Julianne, who hadn't touched an organ in 40 years, or played her piano for a similar time, decided to have a go. She had four hymns and four weeks to learn them. Her many thanks go to the congregation for their ability to sing along, in spite of missed or completely wrong musical notes and for stopping at the end of the third hymn when she mistook Helen's hand signal signifying one verse to go, for "Cut, No More Verses!" We had a laugh. It was a lay-led service of Prayer, Praise and Proclamation, but unfortunately our leader had an accident the evening before. Between Pat, Victoria and Rosie a new leader and reader were found that morning and everything continued as if it had been planned this way! Margaret, Anne and

Barbara were also away at Synod, so that morning Bob took on Margaret's role for the PowerPoint, Lucy gave the Mother's Union 150th anniversary prayer, Kay took up the collection, which Anne often does, Helen was asked to notify Julianne when the last verse approached, Wayne assisted, Rosie organised morning tea, De, John and Rosie gave the message, Bill took the bins out for council collection and Julianne opened up the church and hall and set up the PowerPoint and sound system. God graciously answered our prayers, giving Julianne His peace that goes beyond understanding, as well as healing to Pat and a joyous service that ran fluently. This Warden learnt a salient point that day: it takes many people working together, usually un-noticed, to run a service. More importantly though, how

Notes from Parish Council and the Mission Action Plan

Meetings to discuss the updating of the parish **Mission Action Plan** have been held at St Margaret's on the 16th May, 9th June and the 23rd June.

As time passes it's important to ask ourselves whether we need to update our earlier Mission Action Plan. A series of meetings preliminary to reviewing the M.A.P. have been spent exploring how we are shaping up as the Body of Christ in this place.

Beginning with our local context and the communities to which our five churches belong, this has involved reflecting on our

- worship and prayer
- pastoral care
- mission and service
- formation and discipleship and
- hospitality and invitation.

There will be a report on the progress of the M.A.P. at the next Parish Council meeting on 14th July.

A meeting of the **WFA Parish Council** was held on the 9th June. Among matters discussed/reported were:

Priest's Report

Rev Beck had had a request for baptisms at St Ann's and a Renewal of Marriage Vows at St Stephen's, Willunga in December.

The Secretary reported that updates for the faith centres in the parish had been sent to the Diocese to update and amend the Diocesan web page.

The Treasurer reported that ministry costs, repairs & maintenance and rates were all higher than last year and although giving was up we had a deficit this month.

Christ Church was looking at getting a second screen for power point displays to save extra printing of booklets.

St Margaret's reported a successful Combined Service with 52 attending; all receiving communion

Work was being done on the toilet doors. The deterioration of the back wall of the hall was giving concern and solutions and costs were still being explored.

A ride-on mower, offered by Peter Filsell for use wherever needed, would need a permanent home.

Seaford Christian Churches would be updating its constitution in July.

The Café is now only open Wednesday—Friday, and the Tuesday community dinner would move to the 2nd and 4th Wednesdays each month.

The 5th **Sunday Parish Combined Service** (30th August) will be at St Nicholas', Seaford at 10.30am.





It is June and the Jonquils are in flower once more.

The month started off quietly, John continues to lead us in Morning Prayer on the first Sunday of the month and this month Fr Peter Simmons led us in the Eucharist on the second Sunday.

The third Sunday was Prayer, Praise and Proclamation. It was also Synod that weekend so both Greg John and Julia Drought were otherwise engaged. We conducted the service from the Service Booklets and Rod Sandercock provided the music, playing both a Prelude and Postlude for us. As a change the hymns were chosen on the day by the congregation from the hymn book and Rod played the melody, site reading from the hymn book. I did note at least two people breaking into parts. Jac again provided mementos, this time in the shape of a black river stone with a sparrow pasted onto it, to remind us we are precious to God.

On the Monday Sylvia Francis' funeral was held and her life celebrated. The service was lovely, providing a time to say goodbye. Wendy Sandercock and Fran Pettigrew, as close friends and carers for Sylvia in her later years, read the psalm and the Bible reading. Afterwards afternoon tea was provided in the hall by the parish, and this was a chance to share memories with old friends. (*See also Supplement p. 14*)

Sylvia was an avid creator of tapestries and Harry a painter; the family brought examples of their work to decorate the hall but also to give friends a chance to choose and take home a piece of their work; a chance many were happy to avail themselves of. Thankyou to all those who helped set up and tidy up afterwards, particularly Julia Drought who had a clear picture of what Sylvia would have wanted.

The fourth Sunday is a Eucharist to be celebrated by Fr Alex Bainton.

Vale Sylvia Francis

Born near Liverpool, England, Sylvia grew up during the war years. Despite the difficulties of life in those years Sylvia was just grateful all her family survived. It was always her philosophy to count her blessings.

On finishing high school she worked in a hospital pathology department while attending a Technical College part time. Later she joined the Metropolitan Police force in London. It was here she met Harry. They married in 1952; it was to be a marriage of nearly 67 years.



For the sake of their sons David and Steve they emigrated to Australia in 1965. Sylvia began work at the Institute of Technology in the Pathology Department.

In 1987 both Sylvia and Harry retired and they moved to McLaren Vale where Sylvia joined the congregation at St Margaret's. She identified with Martha in the story of Mary and Martha and lived a life of love, kindness, compassion, service and charity as Jesus would have wanted. She was loved by the congregation of St Margaret's for many reasons including her determination (stubbornness!) and we will miss her and remember her fondly.

Sylvia died peacefully on Thursday June 11th.

Walking With Jesus, Sunday 21st June

Our gathering this month was taken by Wendy Lindsay, one of our School Chaplains in the Schools Ministry Network. Her chosen song for "The Year of the Hymn", was "To God be the Glory" by Fanny Crosby, (1820–1915) who was a blind American hymn writer, poet, and missionary who authored over 8,000 hymns and became a central figure in gospel music. She was also an ancestor of Bing Crosby! The tune was written by William Doane.

Our texts were Galatians 1, 3-5 and Psalm 145, both of which emphasise the greatness and glory of God. The group discussed how we as mere humans give the God of the Universe glory. Some suggestions were:

- * in having thankful hearts and appreciating the beauty of the universe,
- * remembering that we are children of God and finding a way to move beyond our personal problems to help others, who are also his handiwork.

We discussed the fact that the words "vilest offender" in the old wording of the song, are now replaced with "every offender". We are all guilty of sinning, even if we consider ourselves good citizens, and hence we need the same pardon as someone who may be more obviously renegade.

The phrase "opened the life gate that all may go in" refers back to Jesus' statement, "I am the gate". He has made a way of salvation that all can enter and enjoy.

We Christians have the responsibility to show the greatness of God through our daily lives, but sometimes we don't need to say anything.

The injunction to "Preach the Gospel at all times, and if necessary, use words," is widely attributed to St Francis of Assisi. The same thing is also said in other words: "Actions speak louder than words".

Update on St James' Delamere

Prior to the sale of the Church at Delamere, numerous items were removed and given to Investigator College at Victor Harbor to be used in their worship space. The items included the altar, Royal Doulton candlesticks and vases, the reredos, (B) , pulpit (C) and sanctuary lamp. Whilst this area is still being constructed, some of the items are currently being used. Pictured below (A) is the altar in use for the installation of new staff and during a collection of goods for the local welfare organisation. The historic font (D), which is over 300 years old, has been relocated to the Yankalilla Museum.



We also had full set of Priest's robes and these have been passed onto Rev Beck as she does not have her own set of robes.

It was also great to welcome Margaret Ray at our services as she is currently spending some time at her house in Moana. A shared lunch followed with lots of goodies on the table. It was a lovely time catching up with everyone.



The "Meeting with God" service on Sunday 14th June began with coffee and cake as we celebrated Ann Wilson's birthday. Apparently the cake we cut on Sunday was her 4th or 5th one that week! Obviously, lots of celebrations with family and friends.

Our service led us to explore how sharing the Good News with others is a key part of faith, and how we can learn to do so, even when it might feel too difficult. Like the Disciples, we are all called upon to continue sharing the Good News. We discussed who we thought were the harassed and helpless in our community, and how we could help and support them. Where were we being called to step out in faith and offer God's love to those in need? And what, realistically, could we as a small aging congregation actually do? Lots of great discussion, and although we were limited in what we could do in a practical sense, we all agreed that prayer was a vital tool in offering comfort and peace, giving guidance when needed and empowering us and others to take action and serve in His name.

On Sunday 21st June our usual Healing Service was postponed as most clergy were attending Synod. In its place we formed a circle and with hands held we offered prayers for those in need. We remembered especially Cathy More who is having surgery next week and Jo, Chris's daughter in law who is having treatment in hospital.

With Helen also at Synod, we were rather few on the ground, but all went well, with lots of help from those at the service.

Our theme for the Prayer, Praise and Proclamation service was the challenge to put Jesus first. The words of Jesus in the Gospel reading are very direct. That very directness could seem shocking to us. Jesus talks about division, swords, and not loving people... none of it sounded like the "gentle Jesus meek and mild" that we might have been brought up with, or the Prince of Peace that we hear about at Christmas. Nevertheless, we as Christians are called to follow his lead. Jesus knew it would not be easy—he never promised that following him would be. But He did promise to be with us. He does promise to acknowledge us before his Father... to tell God, "Yes, He or she is on my team". What we must

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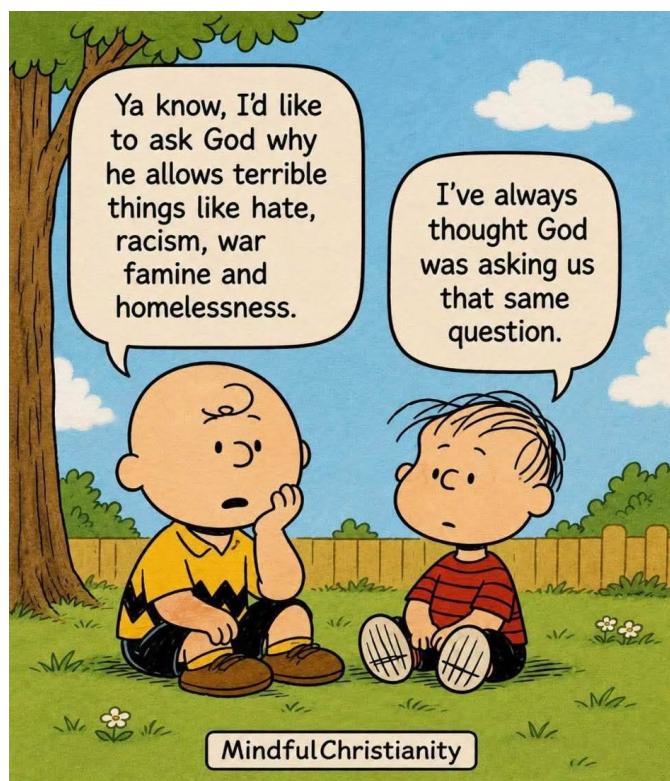
